To whom it may concern,

On April 26, 2024, the City of Duquesne requested that Glenn Engineering & Associates, Ltd inspect their public works building and develop a cost estimate for repairs. The public works building is an approximately 100' x 60' concrete block structure constructed on a concrete pad. It is located at the top of Grant Avenue, in the City of Duquesne. The building has multiple safety concerns (see attached photos). The main issue being a leaning exterior wall. There are also numerous holes in the exterior structure, stormwater drainage issues and interior wall deterioration from previous salt storage. The cost to repair the exterior wall alone is shown below.

#### **Existing Building Wall Repair**

Remove existing CMU wall – (60' length) (20'Height) = 1,200 sq. ft. 1,200 sq. ft. (\$70.00 sq. ft.) = **\$84,000** 

Excavate and Install new concrete footer for new wall (60' length) (1'Height) = 60 sq. ft. 60 sq. ft. (\$35.00 sq. ft.) = **\$2,100** 

Reinstall existing CMU wall – (60' length) (20'Height) = 1,200 sq. ft. 1,200 sq. ft. (\$55.00 sq. ft.) = \$66,000

Total estimated cost = \$152,100.00 (Item does not include restoration of site.)

To make all the necessary repairs to the building, including the wall, the cost would be upwards of \$250,000. As a comparison, the cost to demolish the entire building, purchase and erect a new pole building, as well as repair the stormwater/concrete pad issues would cost approximately \$200,000. A new building would alleviate any safety concerns and provide a secure working environment for the City's employees.





































## PROJECT ADMINISTRATION AGREEMENT

This Agreement, made this	_ day of	2024
By and Between

hereinafter referred to as SRCOG, and

City of Duquesne 12 South Second Street Duquesne PA 15110

hereinafter referred to as Municipality

#### Witnesseth,

Whereas, Municipality is a member of SRCOG; and

Whereas, Municipality is desirous of obtaining Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds from Allegheny County Economic Development (ACED) under the Federal Housing and Community Development Act, and funding from other sources, including but not limited to, Federal Agencies, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Allegheny County, other municipalities, or private funding agencies; and

Whereas, SRCOG submits an application for said funding on behalf of Municipality; and

Whereas, any said funding is made available to, is received by, and is administered by SRCOG as the agent for and on behalf of Municipality; and

Whereas, pursuant to the administrative requirements of the funding agency pertaining to the granting and allocation of said funds, Municipality requests the SRCOG act as an agent and administer said projects on its behalf.

**Now, Therefore**, in consideration of the mutual covenants contained hereinafter and intending to be legally bound hereby, SRCOG and Municipality agree as follows:

1. The recitals and preamble are incorporated into this Agreement as if the same were set forth fully at length and such shall become an integral part of this Agreement.

- 2. Municipality hereby authorizes SRCOG to manage and administer projects and to act as the agent on their behalf and to utilize the funds allocated for these projects for the construction and/or program related expenses of these projects.
- 3. Municipality shall furnish, at its expense, all necessary and required engineering services, including but not limited to, preparation of a complete bid document including construction details, drawings and plans, formal review of bids received, any necessary and required on-site construction, inspection services, and problem resolution of any difficulties encountered during the course of project activities.
- 4. SRCOG shall review the bid documents and related materials provided by Municipality's engineer, architect or official managing the project to ensure compliance with program regulations. The bid documents, if required by the project, shall include instruction to bidders, any special notice to bidders, general conditions, special conditions, supplementary conditions, technical specifications, standard specifications, construction details, construction plans, federal general conditions as summarized by ACED, form of proposal, all other documents, plans, specifications, drawings and changer orders not enumerated above, all addenda and modifications to any of the above, as well as anything else deemed necessary by the engineer, architect or official managing the project. SRCOG shall secure the required wage SRCOG shall provide any required form of determination for the project. advertisement and mandated documents to be incorporated into the bid documents. SRCOG shall also provide the form of agreement that will serve as the contract between SRCOG and the successful bidder.
- 5. SRCOG shall prepare the bid advertisement in the form required by the funding entity and advertise for bids.
- 6. SRCOG shall receive and open all bids. The Municipality's engineer, architect or official managing the project shall tabulate then forward said tabulation for review to Municipality. After review of said tabulation of bids by and the issuance of written direction from Municipality or its engineer, architect or person managing the project concerning acceptance of a bid, SRCOG, as agent for Municipality, shall accept the bid and award the construction contract. Both SRCOG and Municipality retain the right to reject any bid or bidder for cause.
- 7. Municipality shall obtain, at its expense, any required federal, state and/or local permits, which may be necessary for the project.
- 8. Municipality shall be responsible, at its expense, for acquiring any and all necessary licenses, easements and rights-of-way, which may be necessary for the project.
- 9. Municipality shall furnish, at its expense, any required technical supervision and shall monitor and supervise, as required, all construction and on-site project related activities. The resources and expertise necessary to determine if the project has been executed and completed in a satisfactory manner shall be furnished by Municipality.

- Resolution of any construction problems or disputes with the contractor will be the responsibility of the Municipality.
- 10. Municipality shall be obligated, and hereby agrees, to pay any and all authorized costs in excess of those covered by the grant funds allocated for the project, said costs being the difference between the sum total of any and all construction/program related expenses as identified by the bid, together with applicable change orders, and the grant amount allocated to the project. SRCOG shall have no liability for any funds over and above those grant funds that are allocated and awarded to a project, and Municipality agrees to indemnify, defend and hold SRCOG harmless from any such liability.
- 11. Municipality, on its own or through its engineer, architect or official managing the project, shall inspect the work reflected on each invoice submitted by the contractor. Approval of the invoice and work shall be given in writing by Municipality, which shall then be submitted with the invoice to SRCOG. This approval shall not be unreasonably withheld or delayed by Municipality. SRCOG shall then prepare the cost report and request for payment and submit same to the funding agency. SRCOG will then also notify Municipality of any payment due for that invoice. If funds are due, Municipality will remit in a reasonable time the specified amount to SRCOG. Municipality shall not make any payments directly to the contractor.
- 12. SRCOG, upon receipt of funds from the granting agency and/or Municipality, shall deposit same in the account designated for such funds and then make payment directly to the contractor.
- 13. Municipality shall be responsible for, and shall make any payments or reimbursement that may be required as a result of a finding or other order generated by an audit or fiscal monitoring conducted by ACED, the Allegheny County Controller, the US Department of Housing and Urban Development, or any other department, auditor, or agency that has authority over or the right to review the activities of a funded program. Any such payments or reimbursement, if any, shall be made through SRCOG pursuant to instructions issued by SRCOG.
- 14. Municipality and/or the contractor, in accordance with the bid documents, shall be responsible for all repairs and maintenance associated with the project after it is completed. At no time shall SRCOG have any obligation to maintain and/or repair the project or to pursue any required repairs or maintenance after the project is completed.
- 15. SRCOG shall process all documents and attend all meetings required by the funding agency during the administration of the project.
- 16. Municipality will indemnify and save harmless and defend SRCOG and its Board of Directors, agents, servants, and employees from any and all claims, causes of action, damages, losses, penalties or demands, including reasonable attorney fees, made

directly or indirectly by virtue of the execution or the performance of this contract, the separate Agreement between the SRCOG, the Municipality and the Contractor for the completion of the Project which is the subject of this Agreement and any and all related matters.

- 17. Any debts or obligations incurred by Municipality pursuant to the project shall be the debt or obligations exclusively of the Municipality and not of SRCOG.
- 18. It is expressly agreed and understood by and between the parties hereto that SRCOG, as agent for Municipality, is service only as a conduit for the funds allocated as well as administrator of these projects, which services are being provided at the request of Municipality.
- 19. This agreement is effective on the date of execution by Municipality and may be terminated by either party by providing sixty (60) days written notice. Upon termination of this agreement, completion of open projects and compliance with the agencies funding the projects will be the responsibility of the Municipality.

Dear Secretary Buttigieg:

I write to provide my support for Pittsburgh Regional Transit's (PRT) application to the U.S. Department of Transportation's (USDOT) Safe Streets and Roads for All Program (SS4A). PRT will use the award to construct its Homestead to McKeesport Corridor Plan and request supplemental planning funds to solidify the link between this plan and PRT's ongoing University Line BRT project.

The Homestead to McKeesport project, a crucial initiative spanning just over seven miles in the heart of the Monongahela Valley, is set to make a significant difference. It extends from the southern end of the Homestead-Grays Bridge to the McKeesport Transportation Center along Pennsylvania (PA) State Route 837 and PA State Route 148. This busy arterial corridor is home to several major attractions, employers, and community anchors, drawing visitors from across the region.

Between 2016 and 2021, there were ten fatal crashes in the study area, and of those, four fatalities were people walking. One intersection planned for significant safety upgrades sits adjacent to PRT bus stops along Kennywood Boulevard, which has presented consistent danger to all road users. The plan emphasizes pedestrian infrastructure improvements at intersections with high turn movements and pedestrian crossings to create safer conditions, focusing on reducing injuries and deaths for people who are walking or rolling.

PRT's Equity Index of Mobility Need has identified these communities as needing additional transit, pedestrian, and vehicular infrastructure improvements. USDOT's Justice40 Initiative has also established all the census tracts along this project corridor as communities with demonstrable safety needs to address decades of underinvestment.

Our organization fully supports this SS4A application and SPC's commitment to creating safer streets and corridors for all. Should SPC receive funding through the SS4A application, we look forward to serving as a partner where the opportunity arises.

Mr. President.

We represent the 40 communities in the heart of Pennsylvania's steel country, the Monongahela Valley. We are writing because our region faces a crossroads: down one path is a reinvigorated, modern, manufacturing hub that is the envy of the world. Down the other is an unsustainable status quo of pollution and decline. Decisive leadership will be the difference.

Our Mon Valley communities are oriented around three large facilities known collectively as the Mon Valley Works owned by US Steel Corporation. The proposed sale of the US Steel to Nippon Steel has brought international attention to all of us, as it should. The future of these facilities has major implications for our communities, workers, residents, local governments, the steel making pipeline, and the Nation. Put simply, we need your help.

For our communities to survive, the US Steel Mon Valley Works <u>must remain open AND owned by a responsible steel maker</u> who will <u>invest in each facility</u> to upgrade them to meet our Nation's industry goals for 2030 and 2050.

The stakes are high. The devastation caused by the shutdown of the mills in the 1980's cannot be repeated. While we continue to carefully watch these events unfold, rhetoric is prevalent, and the volume of information is huge. At this critical time, we are relying on you, our state and federal lawmakers, the protections of the Federal government and the CFIUS process to scrutinize this sale and make sure that safeguards and incentives are in place to ensure that any future plans will achieve our shared goals and that implementation towards them begins immediately.

The Mon Valley region of post-industrial river towns has not recovered from the loss of industry former US trade policies and deindustrialization. History cannot be repeated. The US Steel Mon Valley Works supplies jobs, sustains adjacent businesses, and provides crucial tax revenues that support roads, police and emergency services. Across Pennsylvania, US Steel contributes more than \$3.6 billion to the local and state economy and supports 15,000 jobs. In our communities, US Steel owns 98 properties with assessed values over \$60 million. Collectively, these properties produce over \$2.5 million of annual real estate tax revenue that our local governments and school districts rely on to sustain. For example, twenty-eight percent (28%) of the budget of the City of Clairton comes from taxes levied on US Steel-owned properties.

If any portion of the US Steel Mon Valley Works closes, the ability of our local governments to provide basic services will suffer. That means fewer teachers in schools, fewer police officers and fire fighters keeping us safe, decreased services for seniors, and more. It will accelerate the cycle of decline that has already persisted for too long.

Yet, we cannot stop at the status quo. This time of transition is an opportunity secure improved environmental and health conditions for our people. **Investments in the steelmaking facilities must** 





significantly reduce the air pollution and environmental impacts that negatively affect the health of people living and working here.

The US Steel Mon Valley Works is responsible for almost 8% of all of the industrial emissions of greenhouse gases in Pennsylvania. Particle pollution produced by the steel-making process are responsible for increased rates of asthma and other respiratory issues, emergency room visits, and early death among our local population. Negative health effects alone cost over \$600 million per year.

Industry advancements have provided the tools to fix this problem and to set us on a path of sustainable prosperity. A few years ago, plans existed to build a cogeneration plant adjacent to the Clairton Works Coke Plant. This facility would use the problematic emissions to generate power to fuel the mills. In addition, US Steel was to build a continuous casting rolling mill at the Edgar Thompson Plant which would make the rolled steelmaking process more efficient. Unfortunately, the funds for those needed improvements were reallocated to other projects in other states. **Restarting those projects would be an excellent start to the new chapter for our facilities here.** 

The technology already exists to produce high-quality steel using natural gas instead of coal and, thanks to the Inflation Reduction Act; most experts believe hydrogen will be an even more environmentally friendly fuel by the mid 2030's. These alternative technologies dramatically reduce greenhouse gas emissions and harmful pollutants. They can be integrated into the cogeneration plant and the continuous casting mill. Whether now or in the coming years, they must be deployed in the Mon Valley in order for our communities to thrive into the future.

In short, improvements are needed now. We ask that you use all of the resources at your disposal to protect jobs, economies and public health in Western Pennsylvania by ensuring that the ultimate owner of US Steel Mon Valley Works is responsible and commits to keeping the facilities open AND to investing in cleaner, safer operations for our communities.
