



Of all the many wonderful, thorough examinations of conscience I have come across, the one I normally utilize is very simple, and perfectly suited to someone like me who is not capable of profound thought at the end of the day.

It's just one very short question: Which Christs did I not recognize today?

The King always comes in disguise, and I know I miss him in so many ways every single day. I miss him in people ignored or dismissed. I miss him in opportunities avoided and in moments that could have turned into prayer but instead turned into phone-scrolling. I miss him when he is right in front of me, holding up a mirror and calling my name, begging for my conversion of heart.

The Christian life calls us to constant self-scrutiny. It's not a comfortable life, always thinking about what you could do better, but the Lord shepherds us rightly. His pastures have nothing to offer those who are perfect and strong.

He has gone in search of the lost. He has reclaimed those who have strayed, healed those who were injured, given rest to those who were weary.

We can't be followers of Christ if we are not willing to own our sins. God's mercy does not dismiss our sins, as if they never existed and were not important.

No, it does something far, far better — God's mercy absolves our sins. It sets us free from them. But to be truly free, you have to understand the tyranny of what once enslaved you.

The Liturgy Corner



The Choir

Choir The choir fosters the active participation of the faithful by means of the singing (General Instruction of the Roman Missal, 103). The choir may sing alone or in alternation with the faithful. At other times, it supports the great voice of all the faithful, lifted in praise and thanks to God.


Today Catholic congregations are expected to sing most of the music at Mass. Singing is one sign of their participation. In the past, however, choirs provided most of the music. They sang the proper Entrance and Communion Antiphons, for example, as well as the unchanging parts of the Mass, such as the Kyrie, the Gloria, the Credo, the Sanctus, and the Agnus Dei. The choir still sings at those times of the liturgy, but it shares the responsibility of singing with the entire assembly.

Choirs also share the responsibility of praying. They are to sing from a location that facilitates their active participation (294), a place that makes it evident that choir members are part of the entire gathered community and from where each member may conveniently share in Communion (312).

For some centuries, choirs sang in a loft, usually raised over the back end of the church. This made them more audible, but it questioned other values the church now tries to address. Choir members should sense that they are part of the entire gathered assembly, and they should be able to participate easily in Communion.

Choirs are usually ready to welcome new members. If you would like to join, speak up! And if you are not a member of the choir, don't forget that the choir is there to assist you, not to replace you. You share responsibilities with them. Participate and sing!

Advent Reconciliation

Wednesday December 6th - 7:00 PM

For grades 3rd - 12th

Scripture Lessons:

Matthew 25:31-46, "You did it for me."

In this Gospel reading, Jesus tells the parable of the separation of the sheep and the goats. In Jesus' time, sheep and



goats were treated similarly and were herded together, to be separated later in the herding process. Jesus compares the separation of livestock to the separation of people—between those who really believed Christ and followed Him faithfully and those who didn't.

The evidence of our faith in Christ will show in the way we act, specifically, the way we treat people in need. How do we respond to others' suffering? Do we try to alleviate it, like the "sheep?" What ultimately prevented the "goats" from entering the Kingdom of God was not that they harmed anyone, that they stood indifferently and did nothing.


What can a parent do? Teach children to look out for the needs of their peers and to treat them with kindness, as if it were Jesus Himself who was lonely, hungry, without a jacket and so on. Jesus counts even the smallest kindness done to someone in need as done to Him, personally.







