



The Thirty-First Sunday in Ordinary Time

NOVEMBER 5, 2023

A Heavy Burden, Hard to Carry

"Mommy, you haven't been making any sacrifices."

My daughter was peering through the little opening in the plastic cover of the "sacrifice jar" we made for Lent this year. The repurposed oatmeal container, jazzed up with glitter glue and pictures of St. Therese of Lisieux, was more than half-filled with little slips of paper bearing descriptions of the various sacrifices family members had made for one another.

But she was right: every piece of paper bore the childlike scrawl of herself and her brother. I had not added anything to the sacrifice jar.

"If I wrote down every sacrifice I made for you in just a single day, the jar would explode," I retorted, and even though my daughter giggled, I instantly regretted the comment, sighing as I realized I did it again. I let a snide, self-pitying thought form on my lips and make its way into the world because for a brief moment I thought someone didn't appreciate my (imagine me sniffing injuredly here) hard work.

We sneer at the scribes and the Pharisees as Jesus describes them in the Gospel, lengthening their phylacteries and coveting the places of honor. But then I remember: nobody starts out *meaning* to be a jerk.

We want to do good things. We try to be holy. But it's hard, that burden weighs heavy on our back.

So, we murmur about it here and there. We stop to catch our breath. We glimpse other people looking at our burden with approval and admiration, and we breathe a little harder, groan a little deeper. And somewhere along the way the burden becomes an idol and our labor a performance. We dare not ask for help bearing it, for we prize too greatly the sweat of our own brow.

National Vocation Awareness Week

November 5-11, 2023







National Vocation Awareness Week, celebrated November 5-11, 2023, is an annual week-long celebration of the Catholic Church in the United States dedicated to promoting vocations through prayer and education, and to renewing our prayers and support for those who are considering one of these particular vocations. NVAW began in 1976 when the U. S. bishops designated the 28th Sunday of the year for NVAW. In 1997, this celebration was moved to coincide with the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, which falls on January 13, 2013. Beginning in 2014, NVAW was moved to the first full week of November.

Did you know that in our country, compared to 60 years ago, there are 20,000 fewer priests and 129,000 fewer religious sisters? At the same time, the Catholic population has grown steadily. During Vocation Awareness Week, please pray that young people in today's society will hear and respond to God's call. Please also consider doing your part to encourage them to consider the priesthood or consecrated life.

"What shall I return to the Lord for all his bounty to me?" (Psalm 116:12) We can never



repay God for His gifts to us but we can show gratitude by sharing them with others in ways that glorify Him.

During the Thanksgiving season, try these suggestions to make your holiday more meaningful:

Offer prayers of gratitude. Jesus was deeply moved when one of the ten lepers He healed came back to thank Him (Luke 17:15-19). Give thanks as a family every day this season by each offering gratitude for specific blessings received throughout the year.

Go to Mass. The word "eucharist" is from the Greek for "thanksgiving" or "gratitude." "The Eucharist" refers to the Mass and the Blessed Sacrament, the ultimate form of Thanksgiving. When we actively take part in the Mass—praying with others, offering our own prayers, reverently receiving the Blessed Sacrament, joining in the singing—we offer heartfelt Thanksgiving to God.

Send it out. Another tradition of Thanksgiving involves sending notes of appreciation and thanks to friends and loved ones, especially for kindness received throughout the year. Kind words are always a powerful and a muchneeded gift.

Share the blessings. If you know of people without holiday plans, offer them a place at your table. Adding to your family circle sets a powerful example of generosity.

Feasts and Celebrations

November 1 – All Saints Day. On All Saints Day, we honor those who lived with extraordinary virtue and are now in Heaven in God's presence.

November 2 – All Souls Day. On this day we pray for the dead, especially the souls in Purgatory. Our prayers and sacrifices can help them get to Heaven.

November 11 – St. Martin of Tours (397). The patron of soldiers, St. Martin was forced to join the army, but left to become a priest. He founded a monastery near Poitiers, France, and later became bishop of Tours

November 25 – St. Catherine of Alexandria (c.310). St. Catherine converted to Christianity after receiving a vision. She rebuked Emperor Maxentius for persecuting the Christians. While in prison, 200 people came to visit her and were convinced to convert.

November 30 – St. Andrew (1st Century). The son of a Galilean fisherman, brother of Simon Peter, and Apostle.

After the Resurrection, he conducted missions in Turkey, Greece, and Macedonia. He was martyred on a X-shaped cross.



These kids have been diligently learning music and choreography for 3 show choir numbers this year, and are MORE than excited to present them – I am so proud of their faith, commitment and teamwork!

We have accomplished much in all grade levels over the past few weeks as well; Pre-K students have been working on songs that include memory and sequencing, and have just begun exploration and identification of low and high sounds. Traveling to all of the "Lands of Musical Instruments" is certainly exhausting, but our Kindergarten students have been doing it with pizzaz and a smile!
