The Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Sin and Loneliness

When I was in high school, we read "The Metamorphosis" by Franz Kafka. It's a depressing little novella about a man who (spoiler alert!) turns into a cockroach and dies of neglect, his family gradually ceasing to recognize the creature he has become.

"Never underestimate how badly human beings need touch," our teacher told us. "Without each other, we curl up and die."

Our need for communion with each other is written into our biology — breathing and heart rate of newborns regulates when they lie against the skin of their mothers, and we instinctively reach out to embrace someone who has been wounded. But it is also written into our souls. Consider the early days of the pandemic, and the emotional starvation we all experienced, prevented from gathering in groups to worship, to celebrate and to mourn. And when we did encounter other people, we kept a mutual distance. "I feel like a leper," we grumbled to our families when we returned home, because we finally understood it: the real tragedy of leprosy is not pain and disfigurement. The real tragedy of leprosy is loneliness.

"If you wish, you can make me clean," begged the leper as he knelt before Christ (Mark 1:40). He wasn't begging for deliverance from pain and disfigurement. He was begging for deliverance from isolation.

"If you wish, you can make me clean," we beg God in confession, not because we are physically withering and dying but because we are so desperate to once again be held in His embrace.

"Moved with pity, he stretched out his hand, touched him, and said to him, 'I do will it. Be made clean." — Mark 1:41

Liturgy Corner

<u>Ushers and Greeters</u> – This weekend we recognize the people who serve as ushers and greeters at St. Agnes. We want to thank those who are dedicated to the service of our church.

The ministry of ushers is the oldest lay ministry in the Catholic Church. During the time of Christ, the doorkeepers of the temple numbered in the hundreds and were the forerunners of today's ushers. The more immediate predecessor of today's usher can be found in the clerical order of ostiary (porter), instituted in the 3rd Century A.D. During those times it was the duty of the porters or ushers to guard the door of the church against any intruders who might disturb the service. The porter duties were so important that they came to be included in the rite of ordination, where they were specified as: "to ring the bells, open the church and sacristy, to open the book for the preacher." In 1972 Pope Paul VI abolished the order of porter and this important task was given over to the laity.

The ministry of greeters is that of hospitality. As you enter a Catholic church building, you say hello to those arriving with you. Your parish may have someone at the door to add to this friendly encounter. That person is the greeter. This role is fairly new. It evolved from the Church's desire to encourage the "full, conscious, and active participation" of the people in harmony with Vatican II's Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy (14). Human beings are more apt to pray together, sing together, and observe silences together if they are united in faith and service. This bonding begins at each Mass as soon as we arrive at church. Greeting one another is more than a social convention. It begins to form the Body of Christ assembled for worship on this day. Our time together at Mass is framed by the formation of community before and after the service. When Mass is over, we go in peace to love and serve the Lord. Having worshiped as one, we leave to serve as one. A greeter welcomes you to the building and helps you feel at home. If you are unfamiliar with the church you are visiting, the greeter will help you find participation aids, a place to sit, the location of restrooms, and any other useful information. Even though some people take on the role of greeter at a parish church, everyone shares this responsibility. When you greet others on your way in or out of the building, you are connecting with them in faith, acknowledging the values you share, supporting them with your prayer, and reminding them that none of us is alone. God is with us always, manifest in the simple care of Christian brothers and sisters at church.

Why Do Catholics Do That?

Why do Catholics serve pancakes on Fat Tuesday (Mardi Gras)?

In the early Church, it was customary to give up rich foods and meat during the penitential season of Lent. This

included milk, eggs, butter, cheese, and fat. On the

Tuesday before Lent began, families would rush to empty the pantry of the forbidden foods by enjoying a dinner of pancakes (or in some places, fried doughnuts). In several countries, it is even called "Pancake Tuesday." It was meant to be one final celebration of feasting before the Lenten fast.

I am very proud of my wonderful students this year! I have seen so much growth in them academically, physically, and socially. They amaze me every day with what they learn! I am very fortunate to be able to work with such an amazing group of kids.

We recently celebrated the 100th day of kindergarten. We started off first with a 100th day breakfast, and then returned to the room, where a couple of special 5th graders came and helped us out. The kids had a lot of fun rotating

through the centers and counting to 100! The Kindergartners also dressed up as 100-year-olds, so we moved a lot slower that day. They had a day of great learning experiences that revolved around the number 100!









Fourth grade has had a great start to the year 2024. As we have passed the halfway point of our year, we are slowly adding more intense work and new concepts into our studies. Students have been excited about our new science unit, Planet Earth. The rocks and minerals lesson has been a favorite so far. They enjoyed exploring the rocks with the hand lenses in our labs and classes.

In religion, we recently had Beatitudes Week. We studied the beatitudes, reflected on them, compared them to our lives, and then found examples of people who live the Beatitudes in current event articles.

Believe it or not, the class has expressed their love of our last math lesson, multiplication! Watching their excitement of learning a hard, new concept was very rewarding for me! We are currently starting division now!

Students have been learning to step up their writing by "exploding the moment" and writing a paragraph of the week! I'm proud of their creative writing talents! Students are back in their novel book clubs and we currently have 6 clubs going! Groups are reading The Witches, Number the Stars, Old Wolf (brand new for us!), The Castle Crime, Stone Fox and My Side of the Mountain, respectively. They are also working on dialogue, cause and effect and text structure within their groups and our reading class.

The students also did their first research project- penguins! In addition to nonfiction books and internet research, we also observed 3 zoo webcams to study their penguin enclosures! This was a fun project for them! Our research penguins are currently fly hanging in our hall!
