





Feelings and Shiny Things

A friend of mine has a tradition on the first birthday of her children. Three items — a coin, a shot glass, and a rosary — are placed in front of the one-year-old, and whatever object he grasps supposedly bears insight into his future. A coin promises wealth, the rosary indicates holiness, and the shot glass... well, I'm sure you can guess.

Of course, the kid just grabs whatever looks coolest. They're not really choosing money or God or a party. Their choice is ruled by impulse. These days, "I'm not feeling it," is a genuine excuse to avoid something. "I feel that," we say to indicate agreement. "I feel like..." is an acceptable way to offer our opinion. Feelings carry a lot of weight.

Before Christ, there was only the law, and the law dealt primarily with actions. Do this. Do not do this. All well and good. But with the fulfillment of the law, Christ wants us to look inwardly. He wants us to consider the influence of our feelings on our actions, and to understand how our chosen actions can, in turn, inspire certain feelings.

I'm a millennial, so, depending on your age, you may think that I feel either too much or too little. One thing I have learned, though, is that when I give my feelings free rein, my instincts immediately turn into actions. I become the toddler grasping at shiny objects with no thought for what they represent. Anger becomes unkindness. Jealousy becomes cruelty. Fear becomes selfishness.

Free will, I have come to understand, means freedom from the tyranny of feelings. If a feeling is strong enough, it can build a prison.




The Our Lady of Guadalupe Knights of Columbus will be hosting their all you can eat breakfast on Sunday, February



At the Last Supper, celebrating the Passover, Jesus makes explicit that his impending death, freely embraced out of love, is sacrificial: While they were eating, Jesus took bread, said the blessing, broke it, and giving it to his disciples said, "Take and eat; this is my body." Then he took a cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, "Drink from it, all of you, for this is my blood of the covenant, which will be shed on behalf of many for the forgiveness of sins" (Mt 26:27-28). In the words and gestures of the Last Supper, Jesus makes it clear that out of love for us he is freely offering his life for the forgiveness of our sins. In doing so, he is both the priest offering a sacrifice and the victim being offered. As priest, Jesus is offering a sacrifice to God the Father, an offering prefigured by the offering of bread and wine by Melchizedek, Priest of God Most High (Gen 14: 18; see Ps 110:4; Heb 5-7

passim). Anticipating his Passion in the institution of the Eucharist, Christ has indicated the forms under which his self-offering would be sacramentally present to us until the end of time. (USCCB The Mystery of the Eucharist in the Life of the Church #13) eucharisticrevival.org

Four holy habits to teach children During Lent



The season of Lent is a call to change our ways and repent. It's also a chance to help our

youngsters grow in holiness. In turn, we will find ourselves becoming more virtuous as we "train a child in the way he should go" (Proverbs 22:6).

Patience: Children often have trouble waiting, but impatience can make us sad or mad, and lead us to stop trusting in God. Teach patience by calmly waiting your turn, don't complain when enduring difficulty, and encourage children to pray while waiting.

Kindness: Flowing out of the virtue of charity, it is best learned by feeling it so it can be reproduced. Make kindness a signature virtue your family shares.

Honesty: Deception in any form is sinful. Children may lie to get out of trouble, to get something they want, to avoid upsetting others. When they admit to wrong doing, extend mercy. If you uncover a lie, require an apology and impose steps to repair damage done.

Obedience: Our fallen nature means that disobedience is more natural to us than submitting to authority, but obedience recognizes rightful authority. This virtue encourages us to submit to God's will – a critical life skill. We can model obedience when we seek God's will in prayer and Scripture, pray for His guidance, and model those habits for our children.

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

Let me see the moves you make! PK certainly has them – especially when they're freezing like a statue! In addition to working

hard on accurately keeping the steady beat, PK is experimenting with creative movement and enjoying every minute of it! We have been working hard to wrap up our



rhythm study in all grades this quarter by keeping the beat and improvising steady beat movements, clapping and counting rhythmic patterns, successfully finding sums and differences in music math problems, building measures according to time signatures, and even coloring by music symbols (instead of coloring by number). As you can see in the picture, 4th graders are carefully collaborating in order to correctly identify and color an intricate collection of musical note and rest values – I am SO proud of their accomplishments!

We have finally been able to add pitch study to our list of objectives this quarter. Second grade will be coloring the lines and spaces of the staff, and 3rd grade is learning treble note names. Fourth grade is beginning an instruments of the orchestra unit before learning the art of recorder playing, and next month will have a picture and a report on 5th grade's brand new endeavor this year!

When ALL of those music adventures are coupled with the beginning of our spring program preparation, we end up with one very exciting 3rd quarter in the music room!
