

Sixth Sunday of Easter

Weirdly Christian

For some time, I have worn a brown scapular. If you don't know much about this devotional practice, here is a very quick-and-dirty version, greatly lacking in detail: it's two little pieces of brown cloth, connected by a cord and worn around the neck beneath one's clothing. One of the cloth pieces depicts Our Lady of Mount Carmel appearing to St. Simon Stock, and the other piece — the one that is sometimes visible at the nape of my neck — depicts Our Lady's "scapular promise:" Whosoever dies clothed in this Scapular shall not suffer eternal fire.

This reflection is not about the brown scapular, but let me just quickly say that, while I believe the scapular promise, I do not view the scapular as a get-out-of-jail-free card, and neither does the Church. I don't wear it for the purpose of avoiding eternal fire. I wear it as a reminder to myself of my Marian consecration and as an act of humility and prayer.

I have sometimes cringed at the thought of how it looks to the person standing behind me in line at the coffee shop, should they happen to glimpse my scapular and read its brazen promise. We don't go in for talk of hellfire and salvation in polite society these days. I wonder if they think I'm a crazy person. I wonder if I should try to tuck the scapular back down below my collar.

Sometimes I do. But more often than not, I take a deep breath and decide that it's okay for me to feel self-conscious and trust that, if God wants to use this moment for His glory, he will — and if He doesn't, all I've lost is the esteem of others, which isn't worth that much to begin with.

I've always heard it said that if you do Christianity right, the rest of the world should think you're just a little bit weird.

THE RIGHT CONNECTION

In the days when most people could not read or write, storytellers kept the community connected with tales that were entertaining, thought provoking, and informative. Nowadays public storytelling is almost a forgotten art. Instead, we are snowed under with information, news, and commentary by everybody about everything around the clock. Against this background, many of us must "multitask" in an attempt to be more productive and efficient. We try to get as many things done at one time as we possibly can in order to make a little free time for ourselves. Every parent knows how to multitask! But with the rise of the Internet, blogs, texting, and Twittering, something new is emerging, which has been called "continuous partial attention": paying partial attention—continuouslyscanning for the best opportunities, activities, and contacts at any given moment. In general, multitasking allows us to stay in face-to-face connection with people, but continuous partial attention can isolate us in our own little bubble, simply watching a screen, often with negative consequences. The average American watches more than four hours of TV each day. In a sixty-five-year life, that person will have spent nine years glued to the tube and seen two million commercials, with over 53 percent of viewing time focused on crime, disaster, and war. We know that Internet use is growing rapidly, and recent studies show that texting while driving makes people eight times more likely to suffer a serious car accident. Saint Peter, in today's second reading, says, "Sanctify Christ as Lord in your hearts" (Peter 3:15). This is a clear indication of what should be the single most important thing in our lives, from which everything else flows—how we prioritize our daily life, how we spend our time, our relationships with other people, how we use our abilities, and how we use our resources. Make the connection to a Christ-centered life and live!

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The Second Vatican Council teaches, "The origin and growth of the Church are symbolized by the blood and water which flowed from the open side of the crucified Jesus," and that "it was from the side of Christ as he slept the sleep of death upon the cross that there came forth the wondrous sacrament of the whole Church." In this image from the Gospel of John, we see that the Church, the Bride of the Lamb, is born from the sacrificial love of Christ in his self-offering on the cross. The Eucharist represents this one sacrifice so that we are placed in communion with it and with the divine love from which it flows forth. We are placed in communion with each other through this love which is given to us. That is why we can say, "the Eucharist makes the Church." 

Live with Easter joy throughout the year

The Church gives us a whole season to celebrate the Resurrection of Christ on Easter, ending on Pentecost (May 28). Here are five ways to spread Easter joy beyond the season:

Praise God daily together: Resurrection is a source of hope. Without it, getting to Heaven would be impossible for us. Offer prayers of praise and thanksgiving together every day.

Celebrate our new life. Plant an indoor Easter garden that you can tend all year. Point out new leaves, blossoms, or shoots when they appear, and remember that Easter brings us all new life.

"Tell me a story." Jesus told marvelous stories to help us understand God's love for us. Add Jesus' stories to your regular bedtime story selection and help children fall asleep with sweet dreams of God's love.

Fast before the feast. The pain of Good Friday makes the joy at Easter more intense. Observe every Friday as a day of penance. For example, in addition to abstaining from meat, consider making Friday night a nodessert or a no-computer game night. Then, on Sunday, treat yourselves to whatever you gave up.

Celebrate Easter every week: At every Mass, we receive the Resurrected Christ. He is as present to us as He was to Mary Magdalene outside the tomb. Don't miss a chance to celebrate "Little Easter" every Sunday.















