



## The Twenty-Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

### The Hateful Things We Hug Tight

At the end of "Lord of the Rings: Return of the King," Gollum fights with Frodo for possession of the One Ring. He wins the fight, but in doing so topples over the edge of the mountain ledge, falling into the cavernous fires of Mount Doom. As he falls, we see him smile, and clutch the ring to his chest. He is happy. He has won what he spent his life pursuing.

It is only in the last millisecond before his face slips below the lava that we see his eyes widen in terror as he realizes the truth: the thing he clutches to his heart is the thing that killed him. In choosing the ring, he chooses death.

Sin, and the fallen nature of this world, makes us addicted to something that kills us.

Like any addiction, it is a vicious cycle. The less we forgive, the more hardhearted we become ... and the less we seek forgiveness ourselves.

What breaks the cycle? Reconciliation with God — or, Confession, as we call it. In fact, it does more than break the cycle. It turns it backward. Not only does it detoxify our souls of sin, it weakens our addiction to sin's effects — anger, vengeance, unforgiveness. The confession of evil works is the first beginning of good works, said St. Augustine.

Ultimately, I view our whole human life as a struggle on the ledge of a mountaintop. It is certain that we will choose sin — we always do. We will tumble over the side, toward ruin. But let us be Frodo, and not Gollum. Let us cling to the rock of the sacraments and accept the hand that would drag us away from the flames.

### <u>The Ambo</u>

What is the difference between an ambo, podium, and lectern?

A podium is a small platform on a stage. You stand on a podium. A *lectern* is the piece of furniture that often supports a microphone and usually has space for a speaker to place his or her notes. An *ambo* is a Greek word which means, "reading table." It was not until the liturgical renewal movement precipitated by Vatican II that the word "ambo" become part of the average

Catholic's vocabulary. Today the word, "ambo" is used to denote a special place for the proclamation of the Sacred Scripture, which is the central action of the Liturgy of the Word.

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) is the detailed document governing the celebration of Mass of the Roman Rite. The GIRM promotes more conscious, active, and full participation of the faithful in the mystery of the Eucharist. The GIRM provides specific detail about each element of the Order of Mass as well as other information related to the Mass. This is what the GIRM has to say about the ambo:

"It is appropriate that generally this place be a stationary ambo and not simply a movable lectern. The ambo must be located in keeping with the design of each church in such a way that the ordained ministers and readers may be clearly seen and heard by the faithful. From the ambo only the readings, the Responsorial Psalm, and the Easter Proclamation (Exsultet) are to be proclaimed; likewise, it may be used for giving the Homily and for announcing the intentions of the Universal Prayer. The dignity of the ambo requires that only a minister of the word should stand at it." (GIRM 309)

Some historians believe it is connected to the platform used by Jewish rabbis to read the scrip-

tures before the people. Spiritually, it is derived from the action of Jesus when he "went up on the mountain, and ... opened his mouth and taught them" (Matthew 5:1,2)

#### Reflection for this week:

With only few liturgical elements taking place at the ambo, we are alerted to how important these are. The ambo deserves to be dignified, for this is the place from where God's word is proclaimed! In preparing for Sunday's liturgy, spend time reflecting on the importance of the ambo in the sacred liturgy.





## **Budding Scientists**

Back to school means back to lots of fun and challenging learning. One activity that is loved by all are the fun experiments involved in science. The week of Sept 4-8, Mrs. Brown enjoyed watching the hands-on learning of the kindergarten mad scientists who were making alka seltzer rockets, first grade scientists who were making predictions about the best solution to dissolve candy and 3<sup>rd</sup> graders who were testing various surfaces in school to see the amount of germs growing there. The excitement

of these young learners as they made predictions, observed data then compiled final results was inspiring. Perhaps the next Albert Einstein is among our youngsters.









## **MAP Testing**

MAP (Measure of Academic Progress) is a computer adapted skills assessment that provides parents and teachers with metrics to measure a student's growth and progress. The MAP test is adaptive, meaning that the computer allows for test questions to adapt to an individual's skill level. The test covers reading, language and mathematics and helps teachers determine what skills need to be taught and how best to group children in the classroom.

Students in grades 1<sup>st</sup>-5<sup>th</sup> grade will be taking Map tests beginning Monday, September 18<sup>th</sup> -Wednesday, September 27<sup>th</sup>. We ask that you not schedule appointments during your child's scheduled testing time. If you have a need for your child to be gone, please contact the classroom teacher to attain their individual test schedule and work to avoid these times.

## **IXL** Learning

Has your student mentioned using IXL? Are you wondering what it is? IXL at its most basic, is a targeted learning tool. It offers experiences for students, tailored to their age group by specific subject and topic. By offering analytics and

recommendations, it is able to help support teaching and learning with a very focused outcome. This program is being used in grades 3-5 to target specific areas identified for individual students as needing additional focus. Mr. Polk is also using the tool with select students whom he is working with.
