


OKLAHOMA ROOTS SHAPES PHARMACIST-NOVELIST

Vicki Allen wasn't born in Oklahoma. If asked, she'll tell you she was born and raised in the Deep South, by way of Alabama and Louisiana. But she moved to Oklahoma, graduated from the University of Oklahoma College of Pharmacy and embarked on a rich life as an Oklahoma City girl.



She's got an energetic vibe. One that radiates a steadfast belief that life is good and anything is possible. It is with this confidence and independence that this one-time Oklahoman recently returned to the city that she called home for 19 years-part of a summer book tour to promote her fourth novel, Drink One to Me, Christian Bennett.

In all four of Allen's novels, her characters exhibit many of the qualities she finds most endearing of her fellow Oklahomans. They are spirited, optimistic people who celebrate good times and refuse to

miles away. The days and weeks that followed were nothing short of a catastrophic, heartbreaking loss, but the perseverance and positive attitude of the city impacted her.

"It is the story of Abigail Christiansen, an American photographer who breaks free of the stifling expectations of her large political family and travels with her brother to Mexico to take pictures for an upcoming exhibit, her jaunts through the Veracruz countryside unwittingly attracting the attention of legendary drug lord, Esai Molinero."
