

Dear Priests, Religious, and Lay Faithful of the Diocese of Grand Island,

As Catholics, our faith in Jesus Christ calls us to exercise our moral responsibility on social and political issues. While involvement in politics can sometimes be perceived in a negative light, we know that Jesus has come to redeem every aspect of our lives, including our political order. He has called each of us to bear His light in the public square, and to strive for a just and good society.

As we approach this upcoming election cycle, we are called to inform our consciences on the candidates running for public office and understand the issues we will vote on, and to make good moral decisions. We do this rooted in our love of Jesus and the teachings of our Catholic faith.

Among the issues on the upcoming ballot, Nebraskans are facing an election of historic proportions on the issue of abortion. Two competing constitutional amendment initiatives have been approved for placement on the ballot, and our votes on these matters will mean the difference between life and death in our state.

Initiative 439 is a proposal that would insert a right to late-pregnancy abortion in our state constitution. I am urging all Nebraskans, especially Catholics, to vote AGAINST Initiative 439. The proposal uses vague and abstract terms that would expand elective abortions well into the second and third trimester. It also risks eliminating fifty years of widely supported and common-sense health and safety laws intended to protect women and babies from unsafe and coercive abortion practices. Initiative 439 creates a culture of abortion that is simply un-Nebraskan.

In contrast, Initiative 434 was launched by medical professionals to provide some baseline protections in the state constitution for unborn babies beginning in the second and third trimester. While imperfect in its protection for all babies, this proposal provides an important step forward in safeguarding Nebraska laws enacted to ensure the health and safety of women and babies. I am asking Catholics to vote FOR Initiative 434, especially as a defense against the morally problematic Initiative 439.

As early voting begins in the coming weeks, please take some time to learn more about why Initiative 439 would be bad for Nebraska. You can do so by visiting www.voteAGAINST439.com. I also call Catholics to take courageous action. Defeating Initiative 439 will take more than a Bishop's letter; it will take each and every one of us talking to family, friends, fellow parishioners and Nebraskans and urging them to also vote AGAINST Initiative 439.

As with all things, we rely on God's help and ask for the Blessed Mother's intercession for the protection of Nebraska's women and babies.

On the Way to Mass:

Do you think grownups and children pray in the same way? What are some differences? How do you like to pray?

On the Way Home From Mass:

I wonder how it felt to be one of the children Jesus embraced and blessed. What would you have said to him?

Living the Word:

As often as you can (maybe at dinner or before bed), let your children lead the family in prayer. If this isn't your regular practice, it might take a few times to break through any hesitancy or shyness. Early on, you could model a simple prayer like "Dear Jesus, I loved the sunshine today." Encourage them gently and treat their prayers as reverently as you would an adult's.

Parent Talk:

Sunday Mass is non-negotiable
After Tessa turned ten years old,
getting her to attend Mass on Sundays
became a challenge. She loves
Communion but said the rest of the
Mass is boring and resists going. We
frequently wrestled to get there on
time. However, weekly Mass is non-



negotiable in our household. So, how could I help her love it as much as I do? I thought we would try different Masses. We usually go to the 9:00am Sunday

Mass because the priest is very kind and delivers inspiring homilies. However, at the 5:30pm Saturday vigil Mass, children are involved in the readings and act as ushers. Tessa found that appealing.

Now, we take turns choosing the Mass we attend. When it's Tessa's turn, she always picks the children's Mass because she enjoys lectoring, ushering and handing out bulletins afterward. The joy and grace she receives from participating in Mass, rather than resisting it, are invaluable.

Why Do Catholics Do That?

Why do Catholics say "Amen" at the end of prayers?

In Hebrew, the word "amen" shares the same root as the word "believe," and expresses trustworthiness and faithfulness.

Jesus

faithfulness. Jesus sometimes said the word "Amen," twice in a row to emphasize the trustworthiness of His

teaching. For example, "Amen, amen, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you" (John 6:53). When we say "amen," we express our faith that God will hear

our prayers.


