#### Citizens of Another Country

I read an article, years ago, about an American filmmaker who decided to step away from a wildly successful film franchise that had been requiring him and his family to live abroad.

It stuck in my mind because of the tongue-in-cheek reasoning he gave for the surprising decision, "My kids were starting to speak in British accents."

Sometimes, we just want to go home, don't we? Returning from a recent family vacation, I burst into tears at the airport, overcome with relief when I saw my sister's van pulling into the pickup lane. It didn't matter that I had had fun on this trip and that I was even looking forward to taking another one. In that moment, I was so tired, and all I wanted was my own bed. The smell of my own house. The feeling of not being "away."

If Jesus is our king, and his kingdom is not of this world, then we live our lives as perpetual aliens. This should reassure us in some ways. The world so often feels cold and cruel and strange to us because it *is*. We were not made for this world. We were made for heaven. We were made to yearn for the face, the presence, the protection of our King.

But this understanding of ourselves as strangers in a foreign land should also be a caution to us.

We can't get too comfortable here. We cannot become too wrapped up in the world and its temptations, its rewards, its comforts. We cannot start speaking in the language, the accent of our adopted homeland. Not if we ever want to return home and belong there. Our King looks for our return.

## Jubilee 2025 – Pilgrims of Hope

As the Universal Church looks toward the Jubilee Year 2025 (the 2,025th anniversary of the Incarnation of our Lord), the USCCB is thrilled to support the Holy Father in this **"event of great spiritual, ecclesial, and social significance in the life of the Church**."

Pope Francis stated in his February 2022 letter announcing the Jubilee 2025: "We must fan the flame of hope that has been given us and help everyone to gain new strength and certainty by looking to the future with an open spirit, a trusting heart and far-sighted vision. The forthcoming Jubilee can contribute greatly to restoring a climate of hope and trust as a prelude to the renewal and rebirth that we so urgently desire..."

he Jubilee Year will offer the faithful opportunities to participate in various jubilee events at the Vatican and in their own dioceses. The great tradition of opening the Holy Door will begin when Pope Francis opens the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica on December 24, 2024. Other holy doors will be opened at the Rome basilicas of St. John Lateran, St. Mary Major and St. Paul Outside the Walls. For pilgrims who cannot travel to Rome, bishops around the world are expected to designate their cathedrals or a popular Catholic shrine as special places of prayer for Holy Year pilgrims, offering opportunities for reconciliation, indulgences and other events intended to strengthen and revive faith.

In the Grand Island Diocese, the Rite of opening of the Jubilee Year will take place on Sunday, December 29<sup>th</sup>, The Feast of the Holy Family, at the cathedral in Grand Island. <u>At St. Agnes we will be celebrating</u> the opening of the Jubilee Year the weekend of January 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup>, Epiphany.

Pope Francis has asked that the year 2024 be dedicated to a "great symphony of prayer" as the Church prepares for the Jubilee of 2025.

**Jubilee Prayer:** Father in heaven, may the faith you have gifted us in your son Jesus Christ, our brother, and the flame of charity kindled in our hearts by the Holy Spirit, reawaken in us, the blessed hope for the coming

of your Kingdom. May your grace transform us into diligent cultivators of the evangelical seeds that make humanity, and the cosmos rise unto the confident expectation of the new heavens and the new earth, when with the powers of Evil overcome, your glory shall be manifested eternally. May the grace of the Jubilee reawaken in us, Pilgrims of Hope, the yearning for heavenly treasures and pour over all the earth the joy and peace of our Redeemer. To you God blessed in eternity, be praise and glory for ever and ever. Amen

God promised a powerful king for His people who would unite them, fight for them, and lead them to victory against their

enemies.

This image of a triumphant Messiah-king kept God's people going. When Jesus entered Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, hopes ran high: was He the one?

But on Good Friday, Jesus, bound and seemingly powerless, appeared before the powerful governor, Pontius Pilate. They rejected Christ. They didn't want a leader who talked of love, suffering, and service, but someone who would wipe their enemies off the face of the earth.

Jesus is King—not just of Israel, but of us and the whole universe. He told Pilate that His Kingdom is not of this world, not bound by the limits of an earthly kingdom.

What can a parent do? Jesus' kingship is about grace and repentance, justice and mercy, love of God and of our neighbor, especially the poor and needy. Teach children to serve Christ by showing their love, patience, and kindness to all, at home and at school. Their actions will tell others who their King is.

Why do Catholics light votive


candles? The ancient Jews kept a light perpetually burning near





### First Grade Class By Sharon Bird



During the month of November the students have been discussing kindness and gratitude. The book <u>Turkey in Trouble</u> was read. The turkey had a problem. He did not want to be Thanksgiving dinner so the turkey made different disguises. After reading the book we discussed different ideas for disguises. 100 pieces of candy and a box of toothpicks. The teams of two met to plan and started work. The students worked well together. The teams were creative problem solvers. This stem project is always such a good learning experience!

Fourth grade has been busy learning and creating! One of their favorite things we recently did was create windmills for a science lab. Students were given certain supplies and had to create a spinning windmill. This went along with our energy unit, which we just finished. We ended the unit with a connect four review game that kept them running, moving, and learning!

We have been working on learning new things in religion. We just finished learning about the Beatitudes and how they can be applied to daily life. They also wrote articles on what virtues they would possess as a future saint.

We have been adding fall and Thanksgiving activities into our daily work. Students wrote a piece about why a turkey would be a good pet.

They wrote a "thankful leaf "about why they are thankful for their friends, and will be doing a STEM project of creating a turkey trap!

We also enjoyed a class project of reading a play about Balto, the sled dog who helped deliver medicine to Nome, Alaska. One of the reading groups is also reading a book about this topic! We have created art for the hall, including a fall scene and tipis, that go along with our social studies unit.
