Remembering Advent

It always makes the laugh a little, these apocalyptic Gospel readings that come at the beginning of Advent.

What a funny juxtaposition — all of us stringing twinkle lights and wrapping presents, with Jesus thundering on about the end of the world. It's Christmas! Don't be a downer. Pour me some more eggnog and turn up the Nat King Cole.

Well, except it's not Christmas. It's Advent.

There's nothing wrong with the cultural accessories that have developed alongside this religious holiday. There's nothing wrong with the twinkle lights and the eggnog. But here's the thing: when Satan knows we're watching the front gate, he slips in the back door. And something I've found is that one back door he likes to use in my life is Cultural Christmas.

I love Cultural Christmas. I tend to overdo Cultural Christmas. I overschedule, I overdecorate, I over gift. All this "over" leads to — you guessed it! — overwhelm. "The anxieties of daily life," as Jesus describes in today's Gospel, make my heart drowsy. My spiritual Christmas joy, time and time again, is diminished — all because I embrace Cultural Christmas and ignore Advent. Satan sneaks in with the twinkle lights and the Christmas carols and he snatches The Present like the nasty little Grinch he is. He photobombs my experience of the religious holidays with the anxieties I so willingly embrace because of the production that is Cultural Christmas.

So, remember to rest this Advent, folks. Rest your heart. Rest your hands. Watch the back door and the front. Remember that this is the perfect time to be thinking about the state of your soul and not just the state of your house.

(Even though, yes, I know, the guests are coming any minute.)




The Knights of Columbus members were able to collect 600 pounds worth of canned goods from the Scottsbluff Country Club patrons.

Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary Mass Times – 12/9/24 – 7am – Noon – 5:30 pm

Normally celebrated on Dec. 8, this feast was transferred to Monday, Dec. 9 because Dec. 8 is the Second Sunday of Advent. <u>The Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary is a holy day of obligation to attend Mass.</u>

Although we celebrate the Immaculate Conception during Advent, the season during which we prepare for the birth of Jesus, this feast is **NOT** about the conception of Jesus. This can be confusing because the Gospel reading for this holy day focuses on the angel Gabriel appearing to Mary. "The angel said to her, 'Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. Behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall name him Jesus.'" (Luke 1:30-31)

The Immaculate Conception refers to the conception of Mary, the mother of Jesus. The "immaculate" is not a reference to how she was conceived by her parents, <u>Sts. Joachim and Anne</u>. It acknowledges that God intervened and allowed her to be conceived without the stain of <u>original sin</u>.

So why does the Church use the announcement of Jesus' birth as the Gospel for this feast day? Before Gabriel tells Mary that she has been chosen to be the mother of Jesus, he greets her: "'Hail, full of grace! The Lord is with you.' But she was greatly troubled at what was said and pondered what sort of greeting this might be. Then the angel said to her, 'Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God.'" (Luke 1:28-30)

The <u>Catechism of the Catholic Church</u> explains the significance of this greeting. "To become the mother of the Savior, Mary 'was enriched by God with gifts appropriate to such a role.' The angel Gabriel at the moment of the annunciation salutes her as 'full of grace.' In fact, in order for Mary to be able to give the free assent of her faith to the annuncement of her vocation,

it was necessary that she be wholly borne by God's grace. <u>Through the centuries</u> the Church has become ever more aware that Mary, 'full of grace' through God, was redeemed from the moment of her conception."

"That is what the dogma of the Immaculate Conception confesses, as Pope Pius IX proclaimed in 1854: 'The most Blessed Virgin Mary was, from the first moment of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege of almighty God and by virtue of the merits of Jesus Christ, Savior of the human race, preserved immune from all stain of original sin.'" (nos. 490-491. See also, nos. 721-726)

The holidays are a time of joy and celebration... but not for all. Here are simple ways to reach out in mercy to

need.



those in need — a good way to prepare for Christ's coming:

Practice patience: Encourage children to deal patiently with younger siblings and peers — as they'd like to be treated.

Comfort the sorrowful: Send a handmade card with messages of kindness and love to someone you know who is struggling or grieving. Model compassionate listening for children.

Feed the hungry: Give to your local food pantry. Alternatively, have children help you bring a meal to someone who's sick or has a newborn.

Donate clothing and shoes: Donate gently used, no-longer-needed clothing, shoes, and winter wear (coats, scarves, mittens) to families in

Volunteer for the "Angel Tree": If your parish has one, encourage children to pick an ornament and give someone less fortunate a nice Christmas.

Practice forgiveness: Encourage seeking and giving forgiveness early and often. Teach children we show mercy to others since we received mercy from God (Matthew 18:33).

Pray for the holy souls: Encourage children to offer their Mass intentions for friends and family in need or who have already passed on. Also, consider adding this traditional prayer at meals: "May the souls of the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen."

This month, we've continued exploring the concept of our community. The children learned about the different roles that workers play in our community. They had fun dressing up as some of these workers and even built their own little community using Lincoln Logs.

We also celebrated Thanksgiving in the classroom by focusing on gratitude. The children created turkeys, painted wooden pumpkins, and made colorful scarecrows. These activities provided a wonderful opportunity to discuss the things we're thankful for.

A highlight of the month was our Pre-K Thanksgiving feast. The kids made turkey hats and personalized their own placemats. They had a great time helping set up the tables in a circle, eating together in the classroom, trying new foods, and even watching a movie.

It's hard to believe that there are only three weeks left in the semester! I've seen so much growth in each child, and it's truly heartwarming to watch them get excited as they achieve new things on their own. In the coming weeks, Pre-K will be practicing for their music program, enjoying a pajama day and pizza party, and finishing the year with a fun Christmas party.













Second Grade Class



Our month started off with the annual 2nd grade Saint Celebration. Each child chose a saint to research and present a report to Father Konka. The students dressed up as their saints too. I always learn about a new saint every year. The students did an amazing job!

In math, we are learning how to skip count. We have worked on counting by 2, 5, 10, and 100. The tricky part is being able to skip count by these numbers starting on any random number. Not always easy! We continue to work on improving our math fact fluency. Once a week we test our skills by trying to solve 100 math problems in five minutes. Each student is encouraged to improve upon their last score.



In science, we are learning about habitats. We are talking about how each place is different and how it provides what is necessary for the animals who live there to survive. Our next unit is on Earth's changes.

In religion, we have started learning about the Sacrament of Reconciliation. We are going through each step of the sacrament and discussing what to do and what it means. The students are also memorizing the Act of Contrition. This sacrament will be celebrated in January.
