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I know that PERFECTION is only found in Christ; this ought to stop me from requiring it from others. I will try not to expect it from you; please do not expect it from me. There is only One Who is perfect and sinless, that is our Lord.

I am being taught MY SINFULNESS and that "in my flesh dwelleth no good thing" (Romans 7:18). May the Lord, therefore, teach me to be more forbearing and tolerant of the sins of others. As the Savior said, "He that is without sin among you, let him cast the first stone" (John 8:7). "Charity shall cover the multitude of sins" (1 Peter 4:8).

David, however, realizing that God is the first cause of all things, would not permit such an act of vengeance. The king said, "Let him alone, and let him curse; for the LORD hath bidden him." # **Look and Live**

"As Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of man be lifted up: that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have eternal life" (John 3:14-15).

What a beautiful picture this is of Christ hanging on the cross of Calvary for our sins imputed to Him which brought Him under the curse of the law for us. When God sent fiery (poisonous) serpents among the unbelieving, rebellious people of Israel as a punishment for their sins, Moses interceded for the people. God "told Moses "make thee a fiery serpent, and set it upon a pole: and it shall come to pass, that every one that is bitten, when he looketh upon it, shall live. And Moses made a serpent of brass, and put it upon a pole, and it came to pass, that if a serpent had bitten any man, when he beheld the serpent of brass, he lived" (Num. 21:8-9). This is a picture of how we who have been bitten by the poison of sin must look to Christ on the cross for our healing and salvation from death.

Someone once asked me concerning the brazen serpent which Moses lifted up on the pole for the people to look at and be healed, "How could a serpent picture the Lord Jesus Christ? A serpent is identified with Satan, isn't it?" First of all, we know that Moses's brazen serpent does typify Christ on the cross, because Christ Himself said so as written in *John 3:14-15*. Secondly, it is true that Christ is in no way a serpent like Satan, nor was He made sinful or a sinner on the cross. But He is portrayed by the brazen serpent as identifying with His people, God's elect, who are fallen in Adam and born under the curse of sin brought in by Satan, the serpent. This curse was actually brought upon Christ for the sins of His people imputed to Him. Just as He was "made sin for us," (2 Cor. 5:21), He was also "made a curse for us" – "Christ hath redeemed us from the curse of the law, being made a curse for it is written, Cursed is every one that hangeth on a tree" (Gal. 3:13).

So, this picture of the brazen serpent in no way implies that when Christ was "made sin for us" (2 Cor. 5:21), that He was made to be sinful or to be a sinner. It in no way implies that He became contaminated or corrupted by our sins. It simply identifies Him as the One Who became a curse for us and Who removed that curse from us by the sacrifice of Himself on the cross as our Surety, Substitute, and Redeemer. God's Word commands us to fix our eyes upon Christ for ALL salvation, for there is no other (Isa. 45:22; Heb. 12:2).
