Dear Friends in Christ,

It's March 21st, and my wife Betty just called to tell me she's all right after Clinton High School was "SWATted" this morning. In case you're not familiar with the term, "SWATting" is basically a prank, although I suppose it could be a tactic with a more deadly purpose--someone manages to give anonymous 911 calls to police, reporting a bomb threat or an active shooter/assailant in the school building. A SWAT team burst into the school, automatic weapons drawn, hustling everybody-including Betty--out. Some kids were visibly terrified, some were in tears. School was canceled for the remainder of the day. And as it turns out, whoever made this call to the Clinton police was able to simultaneously do the same thing with other cities and towns in eastern Iowa. In addition to the human cost in terms of terror over the possibility that Clinton High and other eastern Iowa schools were about to be the next victims of mass shootings, think of the cost involved with dispatching all those SWAT teams! Prank? Hardly--this is a criminal act, for which someone needs to do a lot of hard time! Of course, it's also true that whoever would do such a thing--or worse--has something wrong with them that can likely be traced back to some perceived injustice done to them in the past. And perhaps that perception is accurate. I say this to point out that immoral and criminal behavior can't be significantly reduced, nor can moral and upright behavior be encouraged without a healthy society to address it.

Needless to say, we don't *have* a healthy society; in fact, I would go so far as to say that *insane* and *malevolent* thought, speech, and behavior have become normalized. To be crazy or evil is just another thing we are told in some corners that we need to accept and tolerate. Some of it even dares to call itself "Christian"!

So what are faithful disciples of Jesus to do in the face of all this insanity and malevolence? Well, we need to remember that sin, death, and the devil have already been decisively beaten; they've been dealt a blow from which they'll never recover--something we'll be remembering and celebrating once again very soon. We don't have to worry about how all of this is going to turn out; the only question is how much suffering is going to be inflicted and absorbed until the risen Christ returns and God's Kingdom arrives in force

The forces that perpetuate all this horrible behavior are the very same forces that crucified Christ. Because they couldn't hold *him* down, they won't be able to hold *us* down, either. We need to keep getting together on a regular basis to hear that message again and again, and together take in the "blessed assurance" it gives all who take it to heart. But the war obviously isn't over--- the *issue* has been decided, but the *war* drags on.

We're here to assist God in bringing our world to its inevitable triumphant conclusion, which among other things means visibly and audibly standing against the insanity and evil all around us, and whenever possible, *go on the offensive* against it--letting it be known that, in the name of Christ, we won't tolerate it in our society, and certainly not *in the Church*. We need to let it be known that *God's* ways rule in the Body of Christ, and to tell and remind society in general that one of these days, God's ways are going to rule *it*, too.

A couple of months ago one of my former colleagues in the Central and Southern Illinois Synod sent me (and others) a copy of an article from Christianity Today called "People Perish For Lack of Religion". I've had it included in this newsletter because it touches on at least one of the reasons our society is the way it is, and because it provides us with a lot of truth to share with our unchurched or barely-churched family members, friends, and people in general.
