Dear Friends in Christ,

Presidents' Day--a way of combining into a national holiday the birthdays of what history has judged the greatest two presidents the United States has ever had. George Washington (Feb. 22) and Abraham Lincoln (Feb. 12) presided over what are the two most defining times of our nation's history--the start-up and the War Between the States, or as it's better known, in what has to be one of the biggest oxymorons ever, the "Civil" War. It's not surprising that the president ranked immediately after Washington and Lincoln is Franklin Delano Roosevelt, who had to lead our country through both the Great Depression and World War 2. There's no question at all that those three did what they did *masterfully*. After the "big three", the rankings aren't as clear-cut, probably because no other times in our history quite match the enormity of the challenges faced by Washington, Lincoln, and Roosevelt.

Our system of government involves a lot more people than the president, of course, but it's that office in particular we think of when we're pondering how our government works or *doesn't* work. The president has limits to his ("his", *so far*, that is) power, but he definitely has more clout than any other single government figure. Because of the scope of his powers, the president has (or *should* have) more *responsibility* to *us* and to *God* than anyone else, too. But whether we're talking about a U.S. president, a prime minister, chancellor, emperor, or any other kind of governmental leader, we're talking about someone whom we--as people of God-- are to respect, pray for, and obey, although the "obedience" part has some serious qualifications. As Martin Luther put it (and this is my paraphrase), "My prince, you have my loyalty and my obedience in your God-given role as my leader, but when you assume power that belongs only to God, that's when I must refuse to obey you."

When he wrote that, whether he meant to or not, Martin summed up the Bible's entire teaching about how God's people--Jewish or Christian--are to relate to the law of the land and the people who administer it. In a nutshell, here's that biblical history:

It begins with Jeremiah 29:4-7 (I suggest you take a look at it). For the first time since they entered the Promised Land, the people of Israel are now under foreign rule, no longer a theocratic monarchy. They're captive exiles in the land of Babylon, wondering what their future holds. Jeremiah tells them in so many words to "brighten the corner where they are", because they're going to be there for a long time. Though he doesn't use these exact words, Jeremiah is telling them that the emperor of Babylon is God's chosen instrument, and therefore worthy of their obedience.

Jeremiah's advice basically carried over into the Christian era. In the time of Jesus, the Holy Land was under Roman rule. Jesus himself did nothing to resist the Romans, much to the disappointment of many of his fellow Jews (we all know the famous "Render unto Caesar" story). His focus was clearly on what he called "the Kingdom of God", which he was sure was coming in its fullness with his own return in the *very* near future (Matthew 16:28). He knew the disaster that bloody revolution would bring, and made it clear in his teaching that he wanted nothing to do with that. At any rate, Jesus wanted to get along with the Romans even while he prepared his followers to be ready for the coming of God's Kingdom.

But when Jesus didn't return as the early Christians expected, Jesus' followers were left to work out *their* relationship with the Roman government. I won't quote them here, but both Peter and Paul instructed allegiance to the emperor (Romans 13:1-7 and 1 Peter 2:13-17), so in short--Christians are supposed to be good citizens, who participate in the health of their society, all the while keeping our *supreme* loyalty with God. And here's where it gets tricky...

Remember what Luther said to "my prince", and then recall what Peter and others said to the religious rulers in Jerusalem who had ordered them to stop preaching and teaching about Jesus and in His name: "We must obey God rather than any human authority." (Acts 5:29) Know, too, that the Book of Revelation was written to tell its readers that the Roman government had turned purely evil, and that it's better to suffer imprisonment, torture, and/or death than to obey the emperor's command that he be worshiped--whether you meant it or not when you did it!

This all tells us--among other things--that a Christian's relationship with secular government is neither completely *separate* nor *equal*. If only it were that easy to *always* know when to obey and when to resist! Thank God that our salvation is dependent on *God's* goodness, not *ours*! But the level of our gratitude for that will show in how seriously we take our devotion to both God and governmental authority; the best way to go about that is the way to also go about anything else which is not that cut and dried, not to mention all the things that are much clearer--a faithful commitment to worship, prayer, the study of Scripture, and never forgetting that in anything of any importance, *God always comes first*.
