Dear Family of God

Have you heard about SAMARITAN PURSE? We, Brentwood Community UMC, started this ministry a long time ago. It is Pastor's Discretionary Fund that helps people in need under a strict confidentiality policy.



Through this ministry, we have helped our own church family members as well as our neighbors in need.

We call this fund "Samaritan Purse," because the inspiration came from the story of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:29-37) in which a Samaritan stopped his journey without hesitance in order to help a stranger (possibly Jewish) who got robbed and hurt seriously. A Levi and a Priest had already passed by without helping him. A Samaritan was despised by the Jew socially, religiously and historically for a long time. But he didn't mind that the one robbed was a Jew and helped him generously and courageously.

Since the Pandemic, more people have been going through tough times. Sometimes a neighbor comes for help and asks for a pastor so they could receive a prayer. Some of them looked

really stressed out and shed many tears while receiving a prayer from me. They understand that our financial support is small and limited. But all of them have expressed gratitude always.

I am so happy that we have HOPE HOUSE, a great ministry of food and clothes, to lift up our neighbors in need. As you know, we try to feed not just their stomach but also their souls through our offering of Hope, Opportunity, Prayer and Encouragement. Thanks to Director David Funk and all our volunteers for their faithful and humble services week after week! A big thank to all those who have generously donated money for this ministry month after month!

SPRC

BCUMC uses an online tool, Safe Gatherings, for training our staff and volunteers who work with the youth in our church. Their mission is to screen and educate staff and volunteers to help prevent abuse of children, youth, and vulnerable adults.

Safe gatherings began in 2012 as a project to assist the Kansas East UMC conference (now part of the great plains UMC conference) in taking advantage of technology to automate their paper-intensive protection program. Fueled by a passion for protecting vulnerable populations, they created an online tool to streamline the process and make it easier for the conference and the churches they serve—and in doing so launched Safe Gatherings.

After a year of enhancing the system, Safe Gatherings expanded to other United Methodist churches and conferences, and then to other denominations. The focus has always been abuse prevention through a system of checks and balances.

Lay Leader News By Heidi Stark

Summer showed up in a big way in July - hot, hot, hot! I hope you are all staying cool and enjoying life. I learned a lot from the sermons Pastor offered in July. We started the month learning about conflicts and how they are bound to happen when we enter relationships with others. Nothing is free – everything comes with a cost. Conflict is stressful and uncomfortable; it can be dangerous and destructive, but conflict can also be constructive and transformative. The scripture for the message was Genesis 22:1-14 – the Old Testament story of Abraham being asked by God to sacrifice his precious son.

I've always struggled to understand this story. Abraham must have struggled too. He could have tried to ignore God's instructions, or he could have responded violently to God's request. Instead, Abraham chose to work with God even though he didn't know "the why" of God's request. Abraham trusted God and believed that he would bring both Abraham and Isaac safely home. Faith means keeping your heart open to God even when you can't see the whole plan. Even in the midst of conflict, we must remember that God is in control – He is all powerful and can do more than we can ever imagine. When we face challenges, we must be willing to be vulnerable before God, ask for help, obey His will for us, and we too will be rewarded like Abraham. In the end God didn't have Abraham sacrifice his precious son, but God did sacrifice his one and only son, Jesus for our sins. God did not withhold Jesus. Jesus gave his life for our freedom. God will always show us the way so we don't have to run away or turn to violence; we can work with God and know His will for us.

Since life is challenging and conflicts are inevitable, we look for practical guidance on how to resolve conflicts. John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist Church stated, "In essentials unity, in nonessentials liberty, in all things' charity". Wonderful, but many conflicts develop because we can't agree on what is essential and what is not. This is fundamentally why we are experiencing division in the Methodist Church now. Jesus provided guidelines for conflict resolution in Matthew 18:15-20. First, Jesus instructs the offended person to have the courage to confront the offender and speak directly to that person. Sometimes, the offender doesn't even realize the offense. It is important to share how the offender caused pain. Speaking out may change the situation not just for the offended but for others too. If direct conversation doesn't resolve the issue, Jesus advises us to seek mediation. Bring others into the discussion to witness what is said and done. Mediation is hard work, but we can't give up. We must continue to work together to facilitate change. If mediation fails to resolve the issue, Jesus says the matter should be taken to the Church leadership because the matter has become more than an individual matter and now concerns the whole community. Truth needs to come out and grace needs to be given to all involved. Jesus also shares that sometimes the conflict cannot be resolved, and the offender may refuse to change. In this case it is best to respectfully separate and create a safe space where our spirituality and our faith can be maintained. God loves all of us even with all our differences

and difficulties. He wants to welcome everyone! Jesus wants us to celebrate all who find their way to God – welcome all who are lost and seeking. When you find yourself bullied or offended – show up as the light of God. Remember that we are all created in God's image, talk to each other with grace and truth. Keep showing up, keep shining your light and know that God is with you. Pastor also shared lessons from Jesus' parables. There are 27 parables in the Bible contained in the gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke. The parables explain what the kingdom of God is like – they are guidelines and encourage us to do good. First up was the parable of the Soil, Sower, and Seed from

Matthew 13:1-9. In this parable we are the soil and those that hear the word of God with an open, receptive, and hopeful heart will grow and flourish. Spiritual practices help us to mature and stay open and receptive to God's word. We are called to cultivate yourselves and our spiritual growth which in turn allows us to help others. In this parable God is the Sower. His seed is precious, but God is willing to scatter it everywhere for everyone with the hope that it will land in a receptive heart – a heart willing to learn from mistakes, repent, and keep looking for ways to grow. Everyone is loved and everyone can change and grow – God's grace is available to all. The seed in the parable is Jesus sent by God the Sower. Jesus was always willing to meet anywhere with anyone – no discrimination – open and available to all. As Christians we are "pregnant" with the seed of Christ, and we are nurtured and loved by God even as we navigate life's rocky path. God is with us always! In the parable of the Wheat and Weeds from Matthew 13:24-30 we are taught to **Do No Harm**.

A farmer planted wheat in his field, but an evil doer tried to sabotage the farmer's crop by sowing weeds among the wheat. The farmer's workers asked the farmer if he wanted them to remove the weeds immediately, but the farmer said no because at that stage it was too difficult to tell the wheat from the weeds. The farmer told his workers to wait until harvest time when it would be clear which is the good wheat and which is the bad weeds. Jesus teaches that we must coexist with the good and evil in our world.

Do No Harm – be kind – leave the judgement to God. We can't be sure of what is good or evil because we don't have the whole picture – only God knows the whole truth. Misinformation causes us to act unkindly and judgmentally. When you think of the many stories of Jacob in the Bible, you see that he had a good side and a bad side. He used other people's vulnerabilities to his advantage; he was a manipulator. Fortunately, God knew the whole story, and He still worked with Jacob; God didn't focus on Jacob's evil side – instead, God nurtured Jacob's goodness. We are like Jacob; we all struggle with the weeds in our lives, but like Jacob we need to remember that God is loving and forgiving. We need to remember God's way –

INSPIRED BY GOD, June 02 to August 2023

A comprehensive Bible study plan and spiritual practices to deepen your relationship with God. Inspired By God Student Booklet Donation of \$13.99

This summer, our Bible lessons follow the theme "**Inspired by God**" and help us look at the careful design of Scripture and the art and poetry through which it touches our hearts and minds. They then move into a consideration of one of Scripture's most practical categories, wisdom literature, followed by a look at some of Scripture's heroes, who might surprise us. The lessons in this unit look at some of the different kinds of writings we find in Scripture and how God speaks to us through writings such as the Law, the prophets, visions, and the psalms. They invite us to dwell within Scripture's reality rather than a reality of our own construction.

Wisdom, living with wisdom affects how we think, speak, act/behave, relate to God, and relate to others. What constitutes wisdom according to the Bible

is not conventional wisdom about how to stay safe and healthy or how to prosper in life. Conventional wisdom tells us not to give aid or comfort to an enemy, whereas biblical wisdom teaches us the opposite. Conventional wisdom tells us to store up our grain in barns for tomorrow, whereas biblical wisdom encourages us to share what we have with those whose need is for today.

Heroes and Anti-Heroes; The men and women of the Bible who "save the day" are not the typical heroes of Western mythology. They do not have superhuman powers; they are not mighty warriors; they are not descended from the gods. They are ordinary men and women who use their status and situation to serve God's purpose or people in need. The people who tradition prefers to make into heroes of kings and warriors frequently disappoint us by using their power to serve themselves.

2. Establish the Church budget based on recommendations from the Finance Committee and ensure adequate provisions for the financial needs of the Church.

3. Create a membership cultivation task force to grow membership through community involvement. Participate in reconciling ministry and inter-faith activities in the community.

4. Fill committees with committed, participating members. Encourage all committees to meet regularly. Encourage leaders to attend district and conference training.

5. Improve our online presence and overall connection with our congregation and the local community.

Let's think about who we are as a Church and how we can work together to help transform hearts and minds and spread the good news of Jesus and bring glory to God.
