† Pastor's Letter †

Dear Beloved in Christ

2024 General Conference of the United Methodist Church began last Tuesday and you can find everything about it (including the link to the livestreams) here:

https://www.cnumc.org/eventdetail/18329897?month=4&year=2024&day=1&display=m.

Dates: Tuesday, April 23, 2024 to Friday, May 3, 2024

Place: Charlotte, North Carolina

Here are some reports of the General Conference from 4/23-4/29:

- Regionalization is approved: United Methodist delegates have overwhelmingly endorsed a constitutional amendment of 'regionalization' (votes 586-164) on Thursday April 25, 2024. Four regions (U.S., Africa, Europe and the Philippines) will become regional conferences with the same authority to adapt the Book of Discipline, the denominational policy book, for more missional effectiveness. This will allow each region to decide all their policies, especially over the role of LGBTQ people in the church through given rule-making autonomy. This needs to be approved by two-third votes at all the Annual Conferences of U.S. by the end of June this year.
- Revision of Social Principles is approved by the Legislative Session: "The United Methodist Church now proclaims its support "for the equal rights, liberties, and protections of all people, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity" ... people should be treated with basic human dignity regardless of whether they are male, female, intersexual, transgender or nonbinary... All around the world, we're seeing people who are trans or nonbinary or who have a diversity in terms of their gender identity be persecuted, be discriminated against both legally and in practical terms," ... "This is a really crucial statement about the sacred worth of all people, and the honoring of basic civil and human rights for all people, including those of various gender identities." Now we are waiting all these Social Principles to be approved in the final week by the full General Conference plenary.

We are still praying that the following item is approved in this week:

Removal of Exclusionary Policies in the UM Book of Discipline regarding the participation
of gays and lesbians in UMC. It is very likely that we remove phrases like "the practice of
homosexuality... is incompatible with Christian teaching" before the Conference ends on
May 3rd.

In addition to affirming the basic human rights of all people, the revised Social Principles passed on April 27:

- Reject governmental use of threats, extortion, unlawful detentions, extrajudicial killings and other forms of coercion to silence political opponents.
- Speak out against slavery, torture, genocide and war crimes.
- Reaffirm the longtime opposition to the death penalty proclaimed by The United Methodist Church and its predecessors.
- Commit to fair and proportional sentencing and to the humane treatment of those who are imprisoned, while insisting on accountability.

- Support civil disobedience in protest of "unjust or immoral laws."
- Deplore war and all other forms of violent conflict and support people who follow the nonviolent example of Jesus.
- Also support people who choose military service as a result of personal conviction and urge "that they perform their duties in harmony with the tenets of the Christian faith and in accordance with the laws of the Geneva Conventions."
- Affirm health care as a basic human right.
- Call on church and society to support and advocate for the well-being of all children and young people.
- Support the rights of Indigenous, native and aboriginal communities.
- Affirm the dignity, worth and rights of migrants, immigrants, and refugees, including displaced and stateless people: "We oppose all laws and policies that attempt to criminalize, dehumanize, or punish displaced individuals and families based on their status as migrants, immigrants, or refugees," the revised Social Principle says.

May the General Conference be a testament to the resilience of our diverse and vibrant tapestry of faith! Lord, help us!

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
We believe love in action can change the world

What Membership Means to Me

Membership counts for the future policy making of the United Methodist Church, (UMC) at all levels of church politics – Annual Conference (54 in the US), Jurisdictional Conference (5 in the US), and General Conference.

To be sure, ALL are welcome here at Brentwood Community United Methodist Church, (BCUMC). This includes all those as "Members" and those who desire to continue as non-members. To me, being a member is more than having an asterisk after my name in the Church Directory. More than being able to vote at our Annual Meeting.

To be a member of this church, or any church, is to make a public promise to live according to the Word and to fully support the work of the congregation. The Bible calls this agreement, a public promise, or covenant, and this is the basis for all society: marriage, employment, citizenship, church membership, friendship, etc., are all relationships of accountability.

Another benefit of church membership is having a say-so in shaping ministry. BCUMC members choose officers and guide the direction of our congregation. While congregational meetings are open to all, only members may vote to pass resolutions, and to make changes to BCUMC By-Laws.

I believe membership in BCUMC is a privilege. It is not required for participation in church activities, though it is a way for you to be involved as a contributor and not merely as an attendee. Membership does not mean you have to pledge, but as a member of the Finance Committee I encourage you to pledge. Membership does not mean your name has to appear on our Ministry Team & Structure as an employee, an officer, committee chair, or committee member.

But please do pray on joining our covenant family and becoming a member. New Member orientation classes occur often. I will attend; if you are not a church member, will you?

BCUMC ADULT BIBLE STUDY FOR THE 2024 SPRING TRIMESTER

Our Adult Bible Study series continues this Spring 2024 with the theme

"Encounters in Prayer and Love".

We announce Jesus' Resurrection with Easter lilies, the sound of trumpets, and bright streaming light. After all, it is Christianity most significant event. Without Resurrection there is no Christian faith.

But Resurrection happened in a cave, it happened in complete silence, in absolute darkness New life starts in the dark. Whether it is a seed in the ground, a baby in the womb, or Jesus in the tomb, it starts in the dark. But, rather than a hopeless and void meaning, the darkness of Lent and Holy Week creates fertile ground for us, for it invites us more deeply into prayer and that, in turn, leads us into God's presence.

Our lessons continue with the theme of prayer begun last quarter and allow us to listen in as Jesus, fully aware of what awaited him, prayed. He prayed for his disciples, for their safety and unity. He prayed for us, "for those who believe in [him] because of their word" (John 17:20). He prayed for himself. He prayed that God's will would be done. As Jesus prayed, so can we. And when we do, we find new life in him. With that new life comes the indwelling Spirit of God, who empowers us to engage in our world in ways that announce the good news and work for justice, peace, reconciliation, and healing. The work of this empowering Spirit forms the foundation for the remaining lessons of our Adult Bible study series this quarter.

What's in it for me?

I'd be willing to bet that when you place your pledge or donation in the offering plate, or consider how much to give to our beloved church, you're not asking yourself, "What's in it for me?" However, it turns out that the answer to that question is, PLENTY! God created each of us in his image and, in his infinite wisdom, gifted us with an innate capacity to love, cooperate with, and care for one other. It turns out that when we give of our time, talents and treasure, we also care for ourselves. Here are two ways that giving to others is good for us:

- 1. It makes us happy! Research shows that giving money to others boosts happiness more than spending the same amount on ourselves. These results have also been validated by brain research that shows that when people give to charities, regions of the brain that are associated with pleasure, social connection, and trust are activated, giving the person a "helper's high."
- 2. It's good for our health. A wide variety of studies have shown that giving to others has health benefits, even in people whose health is not that great to begin with. Those health benefits include a longer life expectancy and lower blood pressure. Researchers speculate that the social connection we gain by helping others leads to reduced stress, which then decreases our chances of developing serious illness.

Isn't God amazing? He made us so that by helping others, we also help ourselves! How does the Holy Spirit call YOU to care for this congregation and, in so doing, care for yourself?
