Dear Friends in Ministry

In June, California-Nevada Annual Conference will celebrate its 170th Session in Modesto, California, from Wednesday, June 20, 2018 to Saturday, June 23, 2018. Around 450 clergy members and 500 lay delegates to Annual Conference will represent nearly 80,000 people of faith from 370 United Methodist Churches and Fellowships across the Conference. We are all from diverse cultures and diverse geography, and are united in a belief in the One we call Jesus Christ.

Annual Conference takes care of the following usual agendas:

- (1) Giving account to God of the work they have done and their stewardship of the resources God has given them since they last met.
- (2) Having a holy time to discern God's will for their future
- (3) Persons called to ordained ministry are commissioned and ordained
- (4) Both clergy and lay personnel and financial resources are deployed for ministry.
- (5) Retiring clergy members are honored and those who have departed during the year are remembered
- (6) The annual appointment of each clergy to a particular church is finalized and announced.
- (7) Above all, annual conference sessions have been connectional gatherings where the gathered have experienced the presence of the Holy Spirit and have been revived for God's holy work.

In this year, we will have a special election to elect delegates to represent us at the special General Conference February 23-26, 2019, in St. Louis, Missouri. We will be electing 3 clergy delegates and 3 lay delegates. They will work to decide for the future of our denomination in relation to the issue of inclusion of ALL people.

In the meantime, the Council of Bishops of UMC had offered their recommendation for the special agenda of 2019 General Conference. Please read the following new release by the Council of Bishops on May 4, 2018:

United Methodist bishops, meeting in Chicago, engaged in a prayerful process to discern a way forward. At the conclusion of the discernment process, the Council of Bishops strongly approved the following motion and rationale:

Having received and considered the extensive work of the Commission on a Way Forward, the Council of Bishops will submit a report to the Special Session of the General Conference in 2019 that includes:

- All three plans (The Traditionalist Plan, The One Church Plan and the Connectional Conference Plan) for a way forward considered by the Commission and the Council.
- The Council's recommendation of the One Church Plan.
- An historical narrative of the Council's discernment process regarding all three plans.

Rationale: In order to invite the church to go deeper into the journey the Council and Commission have been on, the Council will make all the information considered by the Commission and the Council of Bishops available to the delegates of the General Conference and acknowledges there is support for each of the three plans within the Council. The values of our global church are reflected in all three plans. The majority of the Council recommends the One Church Plan as the best way forward for The United Methodist Church.

Guided by the <u>mission, vision and scope document</u>, the bishops agreed to recommend the One Church Plan. This plan provides conferences, churches, and pastors the flexibility to uniquely reach their missional context while retaining the connectional nature of The United Methodist Church.

The One Church Plan allows for contextualization of language about human sexuality in support of the mission; and allows for central conferences, especially those in Africa, to retain their disciplinary authority to adapt the Book of Discipline and continue to include traditional language and values while fulfilling the vision of a global and multicultural church.

This plan also encourages a generous unity by giving United Methodists the ability to address different missional contexts in ways that reflect their theological convictions. The One Church Plan removes the restrictive language of the Book of Discipline and adds assurances to pastors and Conferences who due to their theological convictions cannot perform same-sex weddings or ordain self-avowed practicing homosexuals.

The Council's discernment process was guided by the over-arching desire to strategically help the General Conference do its work and to honor the General Conference's request for the Council to help the church find a way forward.

"With convicted humility, bishops want to be pastors and shepherds of the whole church in order to maximize the presence of a United Methodist witness in as many places in the world as possible and with as much contextual differentiation as possible," said newly installed Council of Bishops President Ken Carter.

The bishops expressed deep appreciation for the diligent work that the 32-member Commission on a Way Forward did in formulating the three plans: the Traditionalist Plan, the One Church Plan and the Connectional Conference Plan.

While the bishops recommended the One Church Plan, they affirmed that the Connectional Conference Plan and the Traditionalist Plan held values that are important to the life and work of the church and will be included in the final report to the Special Session of General Conference that the bishops have called for Feb. 23-26 in St. Louis, Missouri, USA.

Bishop Carter, who served as one of the moderators of the Commission, said the bishops are adopting a spirit of collaboration with the Commission, and an attitude of respect for the delegations who will take up this work on behalf of the whole church.

"The Council's prayerful deliberation reflected the diversity of the global denomination on the matter of homosexuality and many other matters. The Council affirms the strength of this diversity and our commitment to maintain the unity of the church," Bishop Carter said.

Full details of the plans and accompanying legislative proposals will be released as soon as final editing of the entire report is completed and translated into the official languages of the General Conference. It is estimated this will be no later than July 8.

Let us pray for our Church as we work hard to make the right decision for the future!



What's Up with the new signs, Reconciling Committee?

Quite a lot, actually! A few months ago, one of our BCUMC members was at the optometry department at the Kaiser Delta Fair Medical building in Antioch. On his way back to his car after the appointment, he noticed a sign next to the doors. It was a "Safe Zone" sign with a rainbow triangle in the center and text in English and Spanish, affirming that the "organization respects all aspects of people including their race, ancestry, . . .". While it was apparent to him that the sign was to affirm Kaiser's non-discrimination policy, it made him feel good to know that he would be treated just like everybody else at Kaiser. He left with the hope that the sign also indicates that someone who was being harassed outside could come into a Kaiser facility for safety.

The statement is similar to our Reconciling statement with the UMC flame sign on our front steps, and the Reconciling Committee has been working over the past few months to determine a way to create a similar feeling in those who pass through our doors...a feeling of safety and welcome acceptance in God's love. Working with Trustees, we took our first opportunity in celebrating Pride Month this June.

In case you are learning as we are, June is the traditional Pride Month for the majority of the LGBTIQ population in this country. This was born out of the Stonewall riots that started on June 28, 1969 in New York City with a notable background of smaller riots at Cooper Do-nuts in 1959 (Los Angeles) and Compton's Cafeteria in 1966 (San Francisco). These riots gave rise to the gay rights activism we see today. Since 1969, major LGBTIQ groups in different cities have declared June as Pride Month or the month LGBTIQ folks celebrate their many sociopolitical advances.

So, as you pass the new signs at the Midway door or as you exit toward Second, we hope you feel a part of something big, you are! We are all part of welcoming all of God's children to experience his love, no matter how He made all of us.

The Committee continues to work toward inclusion and celebration...we are looking forward to sharing our ideas as we approach our Reconciling Congregation anniversary celebration in August.
