take over the task of improving our educational institutions.

The 13-man Board of Directors GIVE! elected Mr. Joe Tawil, Chairman; Mr. Leo Esses, Vice-Chair-**Our Center Great** man; Mr. Ralph Tawil, Secretary; Mr. Joe Beyda, Financial Secretary; Mr. Abe Shamah, Treasurer; Mr. Sam Cotton, Official Spokesman.

> Members comprising the balance of the Board are: Mr. Abe Esses; Mr. Jacob Gindi; Mr. Albert Hamway; Mr. Moe Kassab; Mr. Joe Kassin; Mr. Abraham Seruya and Mr. Moe Tawil.

An Advisory Board of five men was selected to assist the new committee in a advisory capacity only. The members of this Board are: Mr. Issac Shalom; Mr. Sam Sutton; Rabbi Jacob Kassin; Rabbi Saul Kassin; and Rabbi David Salem.

The Advisory Board was formed at the insistence of the Board of Directors. Although Mr. Shalom was reluctant to accept his advisory post, he was prevailed upon by the unanimous decision of the Board "that our accepting the job was conditional to Mr. Shalom accepting his position."

A deep feeling of unity and cooperation was achieved at subsequent meetings and the Board has begun working in full-swing. Their (new) program for the present calls for: 1) Employing the best teachers; 2) Supplying all equipment necessary for the proper functioning of the Yeshivah; 3) Building a kitchen and cafeteria; 4) Improving the physical condition of the Talmud Torah building; 5) A concerted registration drive.

The Board is meeting twice weekly in order to implement as much of their program as possible and as quickly as possible. The enthusiasm, the spirit, and the energy with which this Board has tackled its job is nothing short of amazing.

They are receiving the wholehearted support from the former administration for which they are thankful. However, the cooperation and active support of the entire community is imperative if this new committee is to (See Editorial) succeed.

Friday Night Lectures

For the third consecutive year the Bnei Magen David Cong. is instituting a Friday night lecture series during the months of November, December, and January.

In the initial year of the series only six lectures were given by invited Rabbis of the local Jewish communities. Since it was the first attempt at a prolonged lecture series, and having been started in the midst of stormy December month, it wasn't so successful. The initiation of this series as a regular annual event, however, was the forerunner of a much better planned, and more widely attended series, last year. All in all there were nine Friday and six Wednesday night lectures. There was an average of 175 people at each lecture of many Rabbig presented. This year all the lectures will be presented on Friday night exclusively, and every attempt has been made to present an enjoyable series. Neither time, money nor effort has been spared in arranging for outstanding Jewish personalities to address these Friday night lectures.

This series is intended for the general education and culture of both young and old, boys and girls, alike. Each speaker has a message of inspiration to impart to his audience. Many of the guest speakers will deliver first hand eye witness reports on conditions in Europe, Palestine and Cyprus, and will relate interesting incidents of Jewish interests from other parts of the world. visited by them.
