The self-assurance of Sam Sitt, and the fresh, resounding quality of his voice seem to belie the fact that he was a shy bookworm as a kid. But he was.

Today Sam talks smoothly and with gusto; there's no hesitation in his voice, no cringing in his attitudes.

But when he walks - without® the aid of his dog-Sam walks; slowly and cautiously. His movement isn't as swift as decisive as his speech, or as powerful as his

You see, Sam is blind. His dog is his guide. He's been blind for 11 years now, and has had impaired sight ever since birth.

Responsibility

When the idea of a center was first conceived, the underlying desire was to provide for the youth of our community. The older folks were to take on the responsibility of getting the building constructed, but once built, it was to be turned over to the young folks as its own responsibility.

Today, after construction of the building, our leaders continue to manifest this desire to turn over the responsibility to the youth. Much to their credit, the latter have accepted this responsibility and undertook the great burdens attached to it.

While there is the manifest desire to turn over the responsibility and the welcome enthusiasm to accept it, recent events indicate a variance between intent and practice.

Great Responsibility

At present, the Young Adult Council is shouldering a great responsibility, but authority commensurate with it has not been forthcoming.

With responsibility must come authority. If the present practice of checking or overriding Council decisions as to details continue, then the Council will not be the responsible body it was intended to be. It will be but a group of volunteers.

Lines of authority must be set if the youth are to take the responsibility. Then, with commensurate authority, the young people, in time, will demonstrate their ability to undertake a job and carry it out successfully.

What NEJAS Stands For

(The following is a letter which the C.B. feels should be read by its readers. Its message is clear enough. The author is a leader of the Shaare Zion Congregation and active in community affairs.)

The United Nations voted the division of Palestine Saturday night November 29. On December 1st the Arabs of Aleppo marched on the Jewish quarters and burned about 200 stores and homes. With this one march over one hundred people who used to be self-supporting and contributors to other charities became themselves beggars.

A telegram to that effect reached the Near East Jewish Aid Society who immediately wired them substantial amounts from funds at hand and made two special collections in December and January for the total amount of about \$30,000. Aleppo has been since then receiving a steady support of between \$3000-\$5000 from the NEJAS, monthly.

Not One Could Go Out

A month or so after that, all the Jews of Damascus were confined to their neighborhood (ghetto) for protective custody. For about a year not one of them could go out to look after his business or for a job. The NEJAS kept sending them a steady supply of funds and is still sending \$3000 monthly until today. Last March the Damascus committee wrote that they needed additional funds to tide them over the holidays. An additional sum of \$1500 was then sent to them.

Right now we have on hand a request for medications; namely sulfa, penicillin, aureomycin for about \$1800 which will be shipped to them as soon as a license is obtained.

The NEJAS is one of the oldest of our Magen David organizations and probably has the finest records that we all can be proud of. Even the Joint Distribution Committee recognizes the fine record and contributes yearly to its maintenance.

NEJAS is one of the original beneficiaries of the Federation and when we give to Federation remember where your dollars go—to Israel, Jerusalem, Tel Aviv, Haifa, Damascus and Lebanon —to the sick and needy.
