# Goal Attainable. Chairman Says

As part of its goal of raising \$100,000 in 1956, the United Magen David Organization launched its drive for membership in the new community organization.

The proceeds from the membership drive are expected to net more than half of this amount, with the other half to be raised from major fund-raising activities such as the kuppot, the bazaar, theatre parties and the like

"The amount is not beyond the potentialities of our people," Mr. Abe Sultan, chairman of the membership committee, declared, adding that "if everyone does his share the goal can be attained without unduly burdening any one person or group."

#### A \$100,000 Deficit

According to Mr. Sultan, "our five community organizations. Center, Yeshivah, Talmud Torah, Maoz and New East have a total budget of \$250,000, with some \$150,000 representing income from those who use their facilities. The \$100,000 deficit must be raised by the United organization."

Although letters and brochures will be used, "the committee will emphasize personal contact the objectives of the new organization," Mr. Sultan stated.

Almost all of our holidays are celebrated on account of a miracle of God, directed to his people through a man chosen from among people, who becomes the hero of the miracle. Always, too, there is a woman in the story behind the scenes who gives inspiration. In the story of Purim, however, the role of the woman was on the open stage. She was almost the sole performer of the miracle of Purim; saving the lives of thousands of her Jewish brethern.

Esther performed her great task, not only by the help of her famous beauty alone. She showed courage, devotion; a great Jewish spirit. Vayhi avmen et hadassah, says the Megillah. Mordecai, her famous uncle, trained Esther. The word avmen means training in spirit, molding of the intellect, educating. This preparation brought it about that Esther, despite her high position did not forget her religion and her people.

Despite the glamorous surroundings, Esther remained a dutiful, modest daughter of Israel. So that when the time came to save the Jews an unchanged Esther was ready to risk even her own life. The education of Mordecai was responsible for all this.

Thus, the Hebrew education of every Jewish girl is responsible for the future of her Jewish home. The way she will be prepared for her great task that is the way she will perform it. The Esther of today is protecting the Jewish life of today. She must be trained, educated for her role. In our Yeshiva, she finds the education that Mordecai gave Esther. Here she will receive the great spirit that characterizes the Jewish woman.
