It's Your Piaeon

It is seldom indeed that a newspaper pours out its troubles to the reader; after all, newspapers today are big business and their financial and other difficulties rarely inyoke the sympathy and assistance of the readership.

With the COMMUNITY BULLETIN, however, the situation is an entirely different one, since it is, basically, a nonprofit organization (as a matter of fact, it is usually operated at a loss) and its staff serves without any material compensation. But above all, it is a community publication-by, for and of the community and, unless we are laboring under a misapprehension, the Bulletin's troubles are the concern of the community.

At the moment, the Bulletin is experiencing one of its many crises, this time not completely attributable to money matters. Actually, the difficulty is threefold and, on the assumption that an interested community will appreciate them and act promptly, it is now presented, appropriately enough, at the year's end.

To begin with, the money situation is in a deplorable state; with more than \$400 in outstanding debts, there is nothing in the bank to pay them off. An attempt to get those on the mailing list to renew their subscription was a dismal failure. Out of a total of 1,200 subscribers, only 45 reach their two dollars for renewal. Each Issue Costs \$200

The cost for each issue being \$200, if everyone sent in just the two dollars, there would be enough to publish and distribute the paper for one full year-twelve issues. Ads, which normally contribute 75 to 80 percent of a regular newspaper's revenue, do not amount to more than a few dollars per issue and the reasons for this may he partly found in the discussion of the second phase of our problem, namely personnel.

The present staff has carried the heavy burden far enough and in all fairness cannot be expected to carry it further. The need for people to help out is great. For one thing, there has been very few literary contributions from the community at large despite repeated solicitations, and not only does this put the complete burden on the staff, it doesn't speak well for the interests or abilities of the community. So far as the staff itself is concerned, experienced journalists are not required—far from it; all that is hoped for is participation by those who are anxious and willing to learn. No one need feel asnamed, this is not the New York Times and the work need not indicate wide journalistic experience. Furthermore, those who are interested in journalism as a hobby or future career may find the experience gained valuable.

What Is IIs Purpose?

This brings us to the third aspect of our crisis and that is content. Of course, the lack of staff workers contribute to the difficulty but there exists a greater concern, having more to do with policy than personnel. It comes down to the basic purpose of our paper; what is it supposed to include? This has been a vital concern of the staff and its views or may not be reflective of community feeling.

On the one hand, some feel the last issue, for example, on the one hand, some reet the last issue, for example, was "too serious," or "too high class" or "too intellectual." There were too many "big words." There wasn't enough "humor and light stuff." Those holding this view do not believe movie, theater or book reviews are appropriate and declare "the people who read the paper are only interested gossip."

THE BIRTH OF ISRAEL, by Jose G. Grenados.

The Birth of Israel" is a fairly detailed and Nations Special Committee on Palestine from May 1947 till May of the following year when an in dependent Jewish state was formed. For those hoping for a general all-round survey of the Palestine situation it is likely to prove rather disappointing. After having read it one cannot claim to feel more enlightened on the over-ali problem of the Middle East. Then it interviews different sections of the Palestine population, Arab and Jewish leaders, workers and farmers. Meetings are also arranged with members of the Jewish underground in-cluding one meeting with Menachem Beigun.
