Color Photography

Summer vacations are looming ahead and once more millions of cameras are going to start clicking. An increasing percentage of these will contain color film. Despite discouraging esthetic results from this type of film, the lure of color is so great that photographers plunge into this field regardless of cost and uncertainty. We must understand that color is still a problem, not so much for the photographer as for the manufacturer. A few tips, however, may save the prospective color photographer both money and disappointment.

Don't be too ambitious and shoot too much color. Scenes which have dark material in the foreground against a well-lit background should be would be a well-lit background should be well-lit background sh

Go for fairly flat scenes. After you've had some experience you'll be able to make some reasonable exceptions to this rule but lighting, in general, must be much flatter than for black and white films.

Gadgetland is America's happy hunting ground. My experience over here is that if you only have enough accessories and devices the machin will take care of the picture. Of course, this isn't true. It's still the man behind the camera that counts. However, a certain minimum is required.

Incidentally these devices will help your black and white pictures,

A tripod is essential. Color film is much slower than black and white. Rarely is the speed above 1/25th second and often when you stop down it will be 1/10th or 1/5th or even slower. Without a tripod your pictures will be blurred.

Exposure Meter. This will give you a fairly accurate speed at which to take your shot. Remember color film has not got the latitude that black and white film has where you can make the most appalling blunders in over or underexposure and still get more or less printable negatives.

concerned with only one of these types, the PRINTON. At best the colors of printon are harsh and the printon itself is glaringly glossy. Get a projector and a screen and project your transparencies. Or if this is too expensive invest a couple of dollars on a diffused glass screen which you can plug in and view your transparencies on that.

A final few words. Don't succumb to the tempting advertisements displayed in photographic magazines guaranteed to make your color pictures perfect. There is no short cut to success in this field, believe you me. After some experince you, yourself, will be able to determine what devices will help you, what extra filters and lenses to get and so on. You will make these selections according to your own personal taste and requirements and as time goes on you will find your results more and more pleasing.
