**BROILED FILETS OF
FLOUNDER**

Wash Fillets of Flounder in cold water, wipe dry with a towel.

Sprinkle with salt, pepper, onion salt and paprika.

Dot with melted butter. Heat the broiler compartment to 350 and broil 5-8 min. till lightly browned. Baste with melted Butter during the process of broiling. Serve with a garnish of fried onion rings, green pepper and tomatoes, or with garnish of lemon wedges and parsley.

DELICIOUS BANANA DESSERT

- 3 ripe bananas
- 3 tabl. confectioners sugar
- dash of salt
- 1 teasp. vanilla or
- 1 tabl. lemon juice
- 1 cup heavy cream
- 8 pairs Lady Fingers

Mash bananas, stir in sugar, salt and flavoring. Whip cream stiff and fold in lightly. Arrange Lady Fingers in sherbet glasses and mound up the fluff lightly. Top with chopped nuts.
