### Center Resumes Role After Summer Respite

After a summer lull, the Center will begin its third season on Sunday, September 13th, with the opening of the Snack Bar, the bowling alleys and the health club. It will begin functioning with the first meeting of the Young Adult Council on Monday, September 14th.

The program for the coming year will include social and card parties for the adults, informal socials and Sunday night dances for the young adults and hobby and special interest groups for the teen-agers. Also included will be a revival of the discussion group,

> the music appreciation group, the dramatic group, the art group, classes in public speaking and as a new innovation, classes in social dancing.

Irving Grubber, the incoming program director who specializes in teen-age groups will direct the hobby and special interest groups for the teen-agers. They will meet from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. on weekday afternoons. This, too, is a new project and is designed to further serve the community.

### **Center Capital Budget In Red; Operations Are Self-Supporting**

Despite rumors to the contrary, the Center's operating budget is balanced. While the Center does have a debt of \$26,000, this debt is due to capital expenditures for such things as paving of basketball courts, a new fence in front, according to Mr. Isaac Matalon, president of the Center.

The Center's operating costs approximate \$52,000, forty percent of which is now being paid by the membership dues. The rest is made up by receipts from the bazaar, raffles, affairs, rental of the hall, etc., which combine to

pay the remainder of the Center's operating costs.

The Center opened two years

ago with a debt of approximately \$25,000. Since then it has installed about \$30,000 in capital improvements, which means that out of a total of \$55,000 contracted for, the Center has paid about \$29,000.

#### Yeshiva Has Deficit

Mr. Matalon stated that the Yeshiva also is in debt. It has an operating cost of \$85,000 per year and after two years has accumulated a debt of about \$25,-

The president estimated that the Yeshiva obtains its revenue p.m. from the tuition fees (40%) and the Magen David Federation which gives fifty percent of its revenue to the Institution. It had an operating deficit of approximately \$15,000 in the 1952-53 season.

### CARE Packages For Infants May Now Be Sent To Israel

(Special to the COMMUNITY BULLETIN)

At the request of the Israeli government, CARE has prepared a special layette package for relief distribution to families with newborn infants in Israel's camps for immigrants.

The \$15 parcel contains clothing, bedding, soap and other items to safeguard the health of babies who otherwise will lack the barest

necessities, according to Paul® Comly French, Executive Director of CARE. An estimated 25,-000 of the parcels will be urgent-

Delivery of the layetes will be made to destitute immigrant families designated by the Israeli Ministry of Health, Mr. French explained. Orders may be sent to CARE, 20 Broad St., New York 5, N.Y., or any local office of CARE or HIAS (Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society), a CARE member agency with New York headquarters at 425 Lafayette Street

#### Israel Relayed Need

Need for the supplies, Mr. French related, was first relaved by the Israeli government to the United Nations' World Health Organization (WHO), which in turn routed the request to the WHO - sponsored CARE World Health Program.

"For thousands of the babies born in these transit camps, there are literally none of the most elemental supplies. There is no soap for them, no diapers, no blankets, no clothing-only tattered rags pieced together in haphazard fashion, a coat spread on the bare earth for a crib. Their health is endangered constantly."

"Through this special CARE ericans can help to safeguard their lives. We have compiled the items specifically requested by the Israeli government. Now, we must appeal to donors to make it possible for CARE to deliver these supplies to infants who need them desperately."

Contents of the parcel include: a dozen flannel diapers; a dozen gauze diapers; two cotton knit vests; two cotton flannel sacques; one large turkish towel; two crib sheets; two cotton flannel blankets; one rubber sheet; three wash cloths; four cakes of toilet soap (three-oz. each); three pounds of laundry soap.
