From the Principal's Desk

When Peter Stuyvesant allowed the Jews to land and settle in New Amsterdam, it was only on condition that they take care of their own needy and sick people. This was an unnecessary concern because giving help and charity has always been an important mitzvah for us. However, Stuyvesant's admonition did serve to reinforce the historic unity of the Jews in America.

Given the constitutional guarantees of freedom of religion and assembly American Jews worked to develop the values of Judaism. In the two hundred years of nation growth the Jewish contribution to American culture in politics, science, literature, the arts, business, etc. was enormous. Organizations like B'nai Brith, the A.D.L., ORT, U.J.A. promoted the welfare of Jews not only in America but all over the world. Gone are the college guotas, the discrimination in hotels and resorts, the restrictions in business that the Jews of the 19th century suffered. This year of the Bicentennial is a time of reflection as to our American and Jewish heritage and what still remains to be done.

The Jewish unity which began in New Amsterdam must not only be retained here in America, but needs extension to include all Jews, Kol Yisroel. As parents we must encourage our youth to participate in Jewish organizations which help our people in Syria, North Africa, the U.S.S.R., and Europe. Our young people will develop a greater sense of pride in identification with Jews all over the world as they attend rallies and meetings conducted to help Jewry everywhere. Children and adolescents should be urged to join the youth organizations which our community synagogues sponsor. The cultural and Judaic enrichment which a Yeshivah education gives the child is doubled by his participation in Jewish communal activities. As Jews we have achieved a position of influence (sometimes called the Jewish vote) because of the diligence of our leaders. The mantle of Jewish leadership will be passed to our present youth who must be prepared to carry on with vigilance and vitality.

Ellis Safdeye, Yeshivah Treasurer Opens Registration Drive

Magen David Yeshivah opened registration for the coming school year on January 15th, two months earlier than usual. In an address to a packed Shaare Zion, Mr. Ellis Safdeye, Yeshivah treasurer and a Community Leader, gave his audience an historic overview of the place of Yeshivah education in past

generations and its place today.

He pointed out that not so very long ago parents sent their children to a Yeshivah because they wanted them to be extra learned in Torah and more than average in piety. A Yeshivah was always an essential institution because every community always needed a select core of Torah scholars, and people of piety from whom would come our Rabbis, our teachers and our religious lead-

"But those days are gone," Safdeye said quite forcefully. "In our times and in our era, a Yeshivah has become a community's most essential institution. It is no longer just a question of Torah scholarship and Rabbis. Today it is a matter of life and death. Under prevailing conditions it is almost impossible to bring up children as decent human beings without a Yeshivah education."

"Would any of us have believed just a few years ago that all the crudest abominations of Ancient Egypt and the lowest, most repulsive features of the Ancient Idol worshippers would be acceptable life styles in 20th century America?" he asked.

It is the Yeshivah student educated in religious values, that represents the SOLID BEDROCK FOUNDA-TION of a NORMAL HEALTH SOCIETY. The Yeshivah boys and girls are our only hope for the future. So, a Yeshivah is no longer a luxury or a matter of choice. Safdeye declared.

Becoming more specific the Yeshivah officer said that, "in this community, OUR Yeshivah, and OUR hope for the future, is, OUR

Magen David Yeshivah.'

'Magen David is a community school in every single respect," he added. He illustrated this with a personal reference. "I have had the pleasure to serve on the Yeshivah committee for a long time and I can personally guarantee that the prime concern of every action of our committee, is based on one question only IS IT IN THE BEST INTEREST OF OUR CHILDREN?"

He explained further that other schools are more or less an accident of geography - that is, the only thing binding the students and parents to the school, and to each other, is the fact that they live in the same neighborhood. There is no sense of personal identification between the Board members and the students or their parents. Most Board members know only a handful of parents or students, and then only in a cold professional way, not as concerned and loval friends.

"Not so in our school," the community leader said proudly. "In Magen David Yeshivah, our Board members relate to the school population in an entirely personal manner. Not only are our own children and grandchildren students of the school, but our nephews and nieces, our cousins, and the children of our best friends are our constituents. We realize that the kind of home our children will one day build; the type of grandchildren they will raise, depends to a great extent on what type of Yeshivah we conduct." "This does make a difference," Safdeye pointed out.

"This personal identification is reflected in every single aspect of Magen David, and it filters down to the attitude of our staff in their relationships with students and parents.'

He also lauded the school's professional leadership. "In most schools, he said, "there is a tangle of red tape before anyone can talk to the Dean." Usually, you have to make an appointment, wait a few days then be screened by an assistant, and so on. Not so in our school. Our Dean, Rabbi Moshe Greenes, always has his door wide open. He has an invitation for students, parents and teachers to drop in any time if there is anything they wish to discuss. And just for your information, our community does take advantage of this "open door policy." The same is true for our administrator, wonderful Sholom Himmel, who spares no effort to give us the best functioning school in New York. Consequently, our building and equipment are the most modern available and learning takes place in a pleasant environment totally conducive to proper education."

Dean's Column

ON PURITY

Our sages of the Talmud teach that Purity is amongst the highest qualities a human being can aspire to. As a matter of fact they tell us that "Purity leads to Holiness".

This can be seen from the Torah itself, which says:

"And your encampments shall be Holy, and let there not be heard vulgar talk amongst you, that G'd turn not away from you."

On the whole, I am satisfied with our students language usage in school, in the lunchroom and in the playground,

But that's only "On the whole". I am sorry to say that there are still children whose choice of phraseology is more appropriate for a Singapore saloon than for a child of refined, religious parents.

WHY DO PEOPLE USE PROFANITY? Well, we can easily divide this question

into two parts.

A: Why do children use profanity? B: Why do adults use profanity?

The first question is easy to answer. Children emulate their elders. Usually, but not exclusively, their parents. They could also pick it up from an older person they admire or look up to, including someone just a few years older.

So.... protect your child from these influences. Be selective as to whom they associate with and keep a sharp ear open for the first signs of such pollution in your child. When hearing foul words, be sure to let your child know how inappropriate you and your family consider such language and that your hopes and ambitions for him/her are to see him/her grow into a refined, cultured gentleman/lady who is incompatible with foul guter language. If you state these hopes and ambitions with simple dignity and sincerity your child will react positively. If you state it with self-righteous melodramatics and a great deal of phony sermonology, then it will probably bounce off the child without penetrating.

Needless to say, don't ever, ever, allow your child to hear you using foul language. I know of no antidote for that plague. In other words, if a parent uses vulgarity in front of a child, it is almost certain the child will be contaminated, and it is almost equally certain that he's stuck with it for life.

Just one more question: Why do adults use profanity? Mark Twain answered that clearly and right on target:

"Profanity is a weak mind attempting to express itself forcerfully."

School Visitors

THE POLICE:

Our school was recently visited by Officer Barr and Officer Hennessey of the 62nd Police Precinct to thank the children for the five Bullet Proof Vests they contributed to our local Police station last Spring. Inasmuch as there is a shortage of vests (Mayor Koch says he can't afford them!!), those that are contributed are "raffled off" among the men. Patrolman Barr and Hennessey were among the five officers who received one of our vests, and thanked the children on behalf of all. THE PROFESSORS:

Our school recently had two very distinguished Educators for a full five day visit. They are,

DR. SAM ABOFF: Superintendent of all Public Schools of Elizabeth, New Jersey, and Professor of Education at Kean College. Prof. Aboff is also Consultant for School Evaluation for the N.J. State Dep't. of Education.

DR. LOUIS NULMAN: Dr. Nulman is Director of the School Evaluation Department of Torah Umesorah; Chairman of its Teacher Evaluation and Placement Committee, and Director of Educational Research.

They were invited by Eli D. Cohen, Yeshivah President, and our Board of Directors to survey and evaluate the school. A more detailed account of their Report will be published in a forthcoming Community Bulletin.

THE TRAINEES:

Each year for the past 5 years, Beth Jacob Teachers Seminary, the largest training institution teacher America, sends their newly graduated teachers for in-service training to Magen David Yeshivah on an internship basis. That is, the Teacher-in-Training is assigned to the classroom of one of our master teachers for a week of observation. Then we turn over the class to the trainee for one or two lessons under the supervision of the Seminary's Dean of Student Teaching and one of our Principals.

Student Shabbaton

The 1980 student leaders of Magen David Yeshivah have been the most active group we've seen in several years.

One of the highlights of the school year was a two day Shabbaton arranged by the G.O. Officers and the National Conference of Synagogue Youth (NCSY), the youth division of the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregation of America. Magen David had over forty upper classmen participate.

The Shabbaton was conducted jointly by Magen David's G.O., and four other Yeshivot. It started on Friday afternoon and continued through Sunday afternoon.

All Shabbat meals were eaten together, followed by religious singing and dancing, and Torah discussions under the supervision of the trained NCSY leaders, mainly college age young men and young ladies.

After Shabbat morning synagogue the kids again had a festive Shabbat meal together, sing Zmirot and Pizmonim together and enjoying the real joys of a religious Shabbat.

It is interspersed with competitive games around religious subjects known as the "Torah Bowl."

A note on the trip I received from G.O. President Louis Sutton reads, "Our Magen David kids enjoyed immensely the singing and dancing and learning the true meaning of Shabbat". He also added, "The G.O. Committee thanks the administration for making this religiously enriching and fun-filled trip possible. We hope to have more such events in the near future."

Dept. of Agriculture:

The school was visited by a team of Dep't of Agriculture specialists in children's nutrition. They were here to evaluate our school lunch program.

Their inspection covered every aspect of the program, checking on how much protein and vitamins the lunches contain, menu variation, cleanliness of facilities and personnel, and just about every other facet of the Lunch Program.

They told us when they left that we are receiving the highest rating they can issue; namely, the "TOP SCHOOL" rating.

The trip was approved by Yeshivah President Eli D. Cohen, who later commented that it speaks well of our pupils and of the education we are giving them that they can blend the religious experience of a Shabbaton with fun and good times, and enjoy both so immensely.

Saturday night, after Havdallah, the kids all went on a bowling party, accompanied by their NCSY counsellors, and afterwards sat up to almost midnight in what one of the pupils called a really inspiring and eye-opening "rap session."

Magen David pupils participated in the Hazzanut and reading the Torah to the praise of all participants and Counselors.

We are all especially proud that our children excelled in every competitive undertaking, spiritual and athletic. For instance; Magen David took first place in the "Torah Bowl" and all other religious events. In addition we ran away with the Bowling Trophy, outscoring all other yeshivot, and had one of our boys, David Shweky, as high scorer for the evening.

In a letter addressed to Rabbi Skaist on the Monday after the Shabbaton Avi Sherman, Regional Director of NCSY, writes, "Your Magen David children are a delight. They were so popular and made new friends so easily. We simply could not get over the way your children participated in all aspects of the program and the excitement that was generated to the rest of the kids through Magen David. Our Secular studies department has earned the reputation of superiority, and Magen David is almost universally acknowledged as being among the top quality schools in the city. In the Torah studies department, our educational goals are to make Magen David a truly Sephardic Yeshivah, not just another Ashkenazi Yeshivah for Sephardic children.

Today, over 50 per cent of our staff is Sephardic and we are constantly attempting to add more.

Mr. Safdeye, with obvious pride, told the packed Synagogue that every morning at 7:30 80 boys come to the Minyan in the Midrash of Magen David and pray together. They read the Torah and they are their own Hazzanim. It is truly a Kiddush Hashem to see the boys praying with such devotion and seriousness. No one talks, and all their hearts are in the Teffilla.

He carried this theme further, "We have succeeded in instilling in our students not only a knowledge and love of the Torah, but also commitment to carry out its Mitzvot. Almost every one of our 8th grade graduates are Shomrei Shabat."

He then came to the preparation for the coming school term and explained why registration had to open two months early. "Last year, he said. "we had a magnificent success in registration in the nursery and kindergarten. Both groups were oversubscribed and we had to turn away children due to lack space and staff. This happened because too many parents delayed registration until it was too late for us to provide adequate classrooms and to secure competent teachers. We do not wish to disappoint any one again, but we will not place children in inadequate classrooms with less than superior teachers."

"This year, our registration opened on January 15th. It is in your best interest to register your children *right now*. If we have over-registration again, and we expect we will, we will have sufficient time to secure top-caliber teachers to accommodate your children."

Mr. Safdeye closed his remarks by inviting every interested community

member to visit the school any morning and see it in actual operation. To arrange a visit just call Rabbi Himmel or Rabbi Greenes, 236-5905, and let them know when you would like to come, he concluded.

HALABI AUTHOR WINS TOP ISRAELI LITERARY AWARD

Visits Magen David; is "Awed, Inspired"



Amnon Shamosh, born in Aleppo in 1929, is among the top contemporary Hebrew writers dealing with Sephardic characters and culture.

His recent book, "AHOTI KAL-LAH" (My Sister The Bride) is a beautiful, almost poetic, overview of the old Aleppo, now gone and only a sweet memory among its pre-1948 residents.

Shamosh won Israel's most coveted literary award, The Prime Minister's Prize, 100,000 Israel pounds, for creative writing. The book enjoys wide distribution in other languages, including Spanish, English, and soon in French.

Mr. Shamosh recently spent a full morning visiting the Torah Studies classes of our Yeshivah. He later reported to Rabbi Greenes that it was the single most inspiring experience of his many travels outside Israel, where he now resides. He added that upon his return to Israel he will make known to the education professionals he meets that "American youth is not to be written off as long as there are schools like Magen David flourishing."
