## 1973 JOURNAL DRIVE LAUNCHED

### Eddie Sitt Chairman

The 1973 Journal Drive is crucial to the development and advancement of the Yeshivah, according to Eddie Sitt, Chairman of the 1973 Journal Committee.

"Our building additions between 1967 and 1972 cost over \$2,300,000. The Yeshivah received one million dollars in building pledges towards this total, and the Journal Drive contributed over \$500,000. That is certainly a good sum of money, but it still leaves another \$800,000 that must be raised," Sitt explained, "and that is the obligation of our Journal Drive."

"In other words," he added, "the Yeshivah depends on this drive to be able to continue its uncurtailed and unabridged services to the youngsters of our Community." The goal set for 1973 is \$172,000.

Serving with Eddie Sitt as officers of the committee are: Al Anteby, Sonny Gindi and Ellis A. Safdeye, Co-Chairmen. The Division Chairmen are: Moe D. Gindi, Manufacturers & Wholesale; Abe S. Sutton, Overseas; and David Shamah, Retail.

### Incentives Announced

At a combined breakfast meeting of the full Journal Committee and the Yeshivah's Executive Committee, it was decided to recognize the men and women of the Community who work so hard soliciting ads. As a token of appreciation, each person who solicits outside ads (non-community ads) totalling \$500 or more will be named an Honorary Chairman of the Pace-Setters Committee and will receive a beautiful walnut Chairman's gavel with his name engraved on a brass name plate across the head and designating him an Honorary Chairman of the Pace-Setters Committee.

Extracurricular Activities

Led by a very active group of ninth and tenth year students, the students have developed a broad program of extracurricular activities.

Our basketball team has been overwhelming all opposition in the Yeshivah League of the J.C.H. A number of clubs are under way. Cheerleaders meet Mondays and Wednesdays under the guidance of Mrs. Valerie Mishaan. Chess Club meets Wednesdays under Mr. Lloyd Kahn. Handicrafts and Sewing Club meets Thursdays under Mrs. Rochelle Dweck. The Photography Club will start this month under Miss Grace Shrem. The Drama Club meets Tuesdays under Mrs. Doris Goldberg.

Publications

The Yearbook, under the supervision of Miss Rose Reissman, is almost ready for the printer. Students have been responsible for all aspects of the book, from design of the cover to the writing of articles.

Students are planning class newspapers.

Community Work

Our tenth year students initiated community work projects which have begun to involve other grades.

At Hannukah time, representatives of our students brought many gifts to the children at Maimonides Hospital. Through the generosity of an anonymous donor, our students will bring many gifts at Purim time to the children of Kingsbrook Jewish Medical Center (Chronic Diseases). The students are thinking of extending their services to other groups in the Community, such as the elderly.

Trips

An increasing number of our classes are broadening their experiences by going on trips to the theater, museums, aquarium, etc. For example, a fifth grade class visited R.C.A. Studios and participated in a "Concentration" program.

Library — Reading and Writing

Tu B'Shebat has come to life, it is a very popular festival in Israel today. In this country, however, many people have lost contact with nature and Judaism's way of expressing it. It is the busy schedule of our daily business that causes us to neglect beautiful Minhageem like the fruit parties on Tu-B'Shebat. Keriah Program

The Keriah Program, under the direction of Rabbi Hayward, is now in full swing throughout the school. In the primary grades the stress is on educating the children to read with the Syrian-Sephardic pronunciation and intonation. In the upper grades more stress is placed on Taamei Hamikra, the tunes of Torah, Nebieem and Ketubeem.

This program is being implemented by direct teaching under the instruction of Mr. Mickey Kairey, as well as by the use of tapes by the teachers, prepared by him.

Good News

It is certainly heartening to find that a group of our High School students requested additional courses in Talmud, possibly also in Rambam and Jewish Philosophy. We may be able to arrange such courses, as well as the voluntary courses in Pizmoneem, on Sunday mornings.

The girls of Grades 8 and 9 were thrilled by the visit to their classes by Mrs. Jungreis. She gave a heart-to-heart talk, first to Grade 8, then to 9. The girls found it an exciting experience to be able to discuss general and more individual problems with a person so eminent in the field of guidance.

Seminars

Rabbi Warhaftig of the Yeshiva University addressed the students of Grades 9 and 10 in connection with the inter-school Seminar to be held in Monsey Park Hotel from Feb. 15 to Feb. 20, 1973.

The widening of student interest and the growth of student initiative have been most heartening. It augurs well for the Community leadership of the future.



## DIRECTOR'S COLUMN

□ One of the pedagogic problems educators have long been facing is how to convey subtle ethical concepts to school age children. Magen David has become a participant in Torah Umesorah's Moral Sensitivity Program (M.S.P.) which has developed a new experimental approach to this age-old educational dilemma.

Professional Staff members of M.S.P. have recently spent a full day in our Junior High School and High School, conducting a series of classroom sessions on Ethical Awareness.

This technique utilizes the work-shop method to sensitize children to the Ethical Dimension in everyday living.

Rabbi Nussbaum tells me that he is highly gratified with the results of this full day trial and has selected two teachers, Rabbi Shimon Cohen and Mrs. Wyskowski, for in-service training in this comparatively new approach to teaching Middos.

The dynamics of good education have always required a close working relationship between an alert, progressive leadership and a competent not-afraid-of-the-new professional leadership. It is to the credit of our Board and professional staff that this harmonious relationship exists.

□ Our Board and student body are particularly proud of the rich extracurricular program of activities instituted by Mr. Max Bromer, Principal of our General Studies Department. These programs add color to school life and broaden the students' interest.

## ZACHA SCIENCE LAB IN FULL OPERATION



The Zacha Science Lab, which has been described as "the most adequately equipped H.S. laboratory to be found in any school in the city," has been completed and placed into full operation late in 1972. The equipment includes one microscope and fully installed work-station for each two students. The "work-station" is a marble top counter with a running cold and hot water line, waste water outlet, electric outlets, and combustible gas jets. There are 17 such stations, meaning 34 students can work in the lab at one time, plus a teacher demonstration counter and a hood. The laboratory is used daily in 45-minute shifts, by our grades 7, 8, 9 and 10—a total of 206 students.

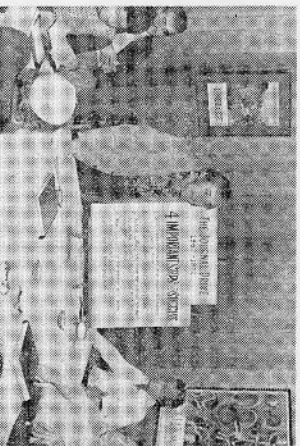

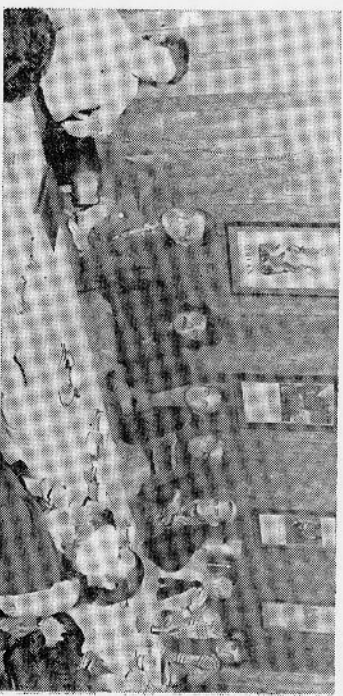
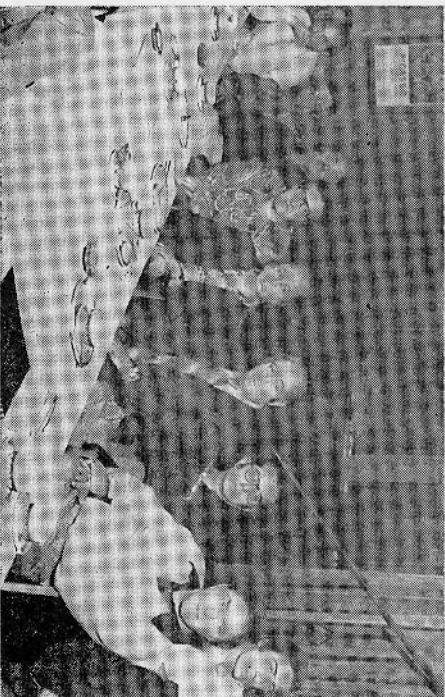
