HIGH SCHOOL EDUCATION- ARE WE REACHING OUR AIM?

During the years of Elementary Education, the cultural and ethical personality of the child is developed and the intensive program of Torah Studies primarily serves to introduce the child into a new world outlook.

Although there is a healthy emphasis that the child should be geared towards improvement of character and the shaping of personality, with academic instruction, the development of the Torah personality depends to a large extent on the knowledge of Torah. This demands thorough acquaintance with the source, the Torah material. Obviously, one cannot be satisfied with reaching a terminal point at the end of the 8 year Elementary and Junior High School program. As the child matures, he keeps in step with this program. He gains this knowledge in his Religious Studies. It would be ludicrous to suggest that a child terminate his quest of religious, spiritual education at the 8th grade level as it would be to advocate the Public School as the terminal point in the general education.

Our emphasis therefore, has been on "CONTINUITY". Our children must continue their education on a higher level, and we are indeed proud that in the last few years a large percentage of our Yeshivah graduates have been attending Yeshivah High Schools of their choice. As a matter of fact, more than 30 students are attending Flatbush Yeshiva, Mirrer, Gur Aryeh and Ner Israel in Baltimore. This is a fine record, and we should strive for 100% enrollment at Yeshivah High Schools for our Graduates. It is, of course, up to the home and the child to help us achieve this goal, so "Let's Pull Together".

Mrs. Evelyn Cohen, President of our Magen David Yeshivah P.T.A. is very happy to announce that our Annual Cake Sale was a huge success.

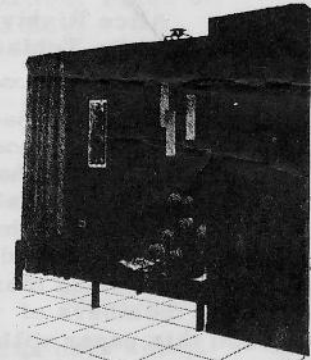
Many thanks are due to each and every one of our mothers who did such a wonderful job for the preparation and during the cake sale.

The fifteenth day of the month of Shebat is called in the Talmud, Rosh Hashana Leilanot, the New Year of the Trees. This day marks in Israel the beginning of the season of the budding of trees and the beginning of Spring.

Among Jews, residing outside of Israel, this day is celebrated as Palestine Day. In our school we will celebrate it Friday, February 8th, with special traditional Sephardic customs, by partaking of a variety of sweet fruits, especially the seven kinds of Israeli fruit such as grapes, raisins, dates, figs and many others. The children recite special prayers and blessings and sing songs before eating each one of them.

The preparation for this Holiday for our children includes the study of Israeli life as well as participation in a "Tree Planting Campaign" through the Jewish National Fund. We hope that this experience will further the close ties between ourselves, the land of Israel and its people.

LETTER FROM OUR PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents:

At times, parents will express some concern or reservation over the adequacy or results of our general studies department. Will our children be properly prepared for high school? Will they be able to hold their own with children from other Yeshivah or the public school? Are our children working up to their maximum potential? Would they get more from a public school education?

Let me assure you that all evidence, based on the experience of our graduates, points to the fact that our graduates are very well prepared for the high school and more than hold their own. This is true wherever our graduates attend. Our children get a very good foundation in the basic subjects: reading, writing, mathematics, - social studies and science. Compared to results obtained by third, sixth and eighth grade youngsters in the public schools of Bensonhurst area, on citywide tests in reading and arithmetic, our children do very well. We use the most modern textbooks on the market. We do not stint on workbooks, maps and globes. Our teachers are highly capable individuals who have excellent class management and display a high degree of competence in the art of teaching. We do not have any serious disciplinary or behavior problems.

Limitation of space and time prevent us from having an adequate art, music and physical health program. We do what we can in these areas. We plan trips to concerts, theatres (8th grade class is planning a trip to the Phoenix Theatre), to the Supreme Court to see our legal processes in action. Trips are planned for the Museum of Art, Planetarium, Museum of Natural History, etc. However, in large measure, we must depend on the family to fill in in these areas. The P.T.A. has helped by providing the school with phonographs and records and a radio. We hope to do more in these areas as we go along.

In conclusion, we can honestly state that there need be no concern about the education offered in our Yeshivah. It will always remain the concern of every thoughtful parent, in any teaching situation, that the child get the most out of it by a maximum application. But this is a personal matter depending on the make-up of each individual child.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

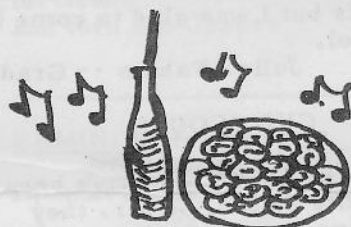
Dear Editor:

1. At 10:30 AM each child receives 1/2 pint of milk instead of lunch time.
2. Lunch - Delicatessen Plate:
 1. Juice
 2. Assorted cold cuts (chicken salami and bologna) on Rye or White Bread (pareve)
 3. Cole slaw, pickles, carrot Sticks, mustard, potato chips.
 4. Hot tea - orangeade - cookies (pareve).

How to Raise a Delinquent: Ten Easy Rules Prepared by the Police Department of Houston, Texas

1. Begin at infancy to give the child everything he wants. In this way he will grow up to believe the world owes him a living.
2. When he picks up bad words, laugh at him. This will make him think he's cute.
3. Never give him any spiritual training. Wait until he is 21 and then let him "decide for himself."

8. Take his part against neighbors, teachers, policemen. They are all prejudiced against your child.
9. When he gets into real trouble, apologize for yourself by saying, "I never could do anything with him."
10. Prepare for a life of grief. You are bound to have it.
