JOURNAL DRIVE CLOSES 'OVER THE TOP'

The 1968 Journal Drive drew to a close on the First of May with an all time high in ads sold. The record smashing \$54,243 exceeded even the 1967 record of \$40,000 and was made up of 874 individual ads.

"This means people were working. You don't bring in close to 900 ads by playing tennis," Journal chairman Joe Esses said. He praised the energetic committee, and especially his two Co-chairman, Sonny Gindi and Harry A. Tawil, for "not relaxing a second, from the word go right down to the finish line."

"The Success of the Journal drive means that the third floor will be open and ready for occupancy this coming September, and will enable the Yeshivah to enroll an additional 70 children," Mr. Esses concluded.

"In September 1967," Rabbi Greenes added "it broke all our hearts when we had to turn away 70 lovely, eager community children, who were forced to enroll in Public Schools or outside Yeshivot."

JOE ESSES LAUDED

In assesing the significance of the drive's success, Henry Shalom, Chairman of the Construction Committee, and Sonny Gindi, Treasurer, and Chairman of the Finance Committee, said that "its ramifications are far more important than the immediate availability of \$50,000 towards completion of the third floor. It proves a point; that if we deliver quality and a genuine, sound program of growth, the community will back it with meaningful support, not merely tokenism."

"One thing is certain," they added, "without the leadership of Joe Esses, who inspired every committeeman and worker, and never allowed the campaign to pale, we could not have converted all these positive factors into success." Upon which Rabbi Greenes commented "Rarely does one find in a layman, the ability, instinct and subtle "feel" for campagning which it takes the professional many years

to develop. Joe Esses is such a gifted layman."

In closing the campaign, the Journal workers were unanimous in their praise for the meticulous and precise work done (Continued on page 6)

Registration Report

Mr. Isaac Gindi, Registration chairman announced that a careful study of the new registrants at the Yeshivah shows a tremendous upswing in the amount of girls enrolling in the past three years. "Since the parallel curricula were devised to meet the specific educational needs of the boys and girls in special subject matter," he said.

Rabbi Sholom Himmel pointed out that the afternoon Nursery classes (1-4 PM) are closed, and no applications will be accepted, except on waiting list. "There are only few openings for the morning Nursery class (9 AM to 12 Noon), and even these are filling up fast. Those interested are urged to call for an application at once at 236-5905," Rabbi Himmel added.

At other admission levels Mr. Gindi reports that our two Kindergarten groups are already fully subscribed to, a third Kindergarten may be opened, should there be enough applicants.

The three 1st grade groups are swiftly closing, and here, too, delay is unwise inasmuch as "all Preschool classes must be located on the main floor Pre-school center, we will be unable to open any additional classes no matter how many requests come in at a later date. Its first come first served." He said.

"It looks like we will grow to 525 students, an increase of more than 100 students," Gindi concluded.

If past years are any indication, the boys all love the class and attend enthusiastically. Editor .

HISTORIC QUOTES

For years the secularist Jewish Organizations have opposed Jewish Parochial Schools, or Day schools, as they now prefer to call them. This opposition was both covert and overt, going back to the infamous Albany battles of the 1930's when they attempted to force Yeshivot to become afternoon Talmud Torahs by instigating the authorities against them as the schools of a small sect of ultra-orthodox "parochial" Jews.

It's a pleasure to see the comments now coming from erstwhile opponents, in the nature of בעל כרחו יענה אמן.

American Association for Jewish Education: The average 9 year old Day School pupil does better on AAIE administered tests in Hebrew, Jewish Law, and Jewish History than the average 13 year old Hebrew school pupil.

B'nai Brith Magazine: There is only one effective antidote against 'Jewish self-hatred" and "Jewish by anti-Semitism" - a thorough Jewish education preferably of the intensive type dispensed in the Jewish Day School.

American Jewish Congress Weekly Magazine: Day School graduates are as fully integrated into American life as the Jewish graduates of the public school system. There are no juvenile delinquents in the Jewish Day School; their scholastic record is on the average better than the scholastic record of public school children in the secular studies and their graduates now occupy prominent places in the economic, political and educational life of America.

Our Yeshiva is climbing the ladder of success in Education as well as in physical facilities.

Our Torah studies, broadened at the beginning of the term, includes

The course of the general studies was designed in accordance with the requirements of the Board of Education of New York City, both in contents and methods, under the competent and devoted English Principal, Mrs. Frieda Shprentz.

The Nursery meets all the requirements of a good school. The room is spacious, well lighted and well ventilated. The equipment and material were selected to meet the children's needs; for creative and imaginative play, as well as vigorous living. It is really amazing to see how much the children learned during the past nine months; something which definitely will help them in their kindergarten and first grade.

The special girl's class is doing remarkably well both in arts and crafts and the special Seminar type lessons; in the conduct of a real and

happy Jewish home.

We are proud of our new building and facilities, but we are prouder still of the hard work and vision of the committee under the guidance of our beloved president, Mr. Leo Esses, who had faith in our future and whose efforts and sacrifices made our new floor possible for the benefit of our children.

Joyful, creative experiences, are helping the boys and girls of Magen David Yeshivah develop interests and skills in music, science, and art. The school provides these experiences during school hours for the younger children and in after school clubs for the older ones.

You have read in this bulletin a little about the Science Fair, the Violin Club and the playing of recorders by the children in the third grade. Now the children of the second grade are also making music on recorders. (Recorders, you will remember, are

flute-like instruments.)

In addition, we now have an Art Club. Here the children are taught how to look at and really see the beauty that is around them and to express themselves creatively through art. The children have done some lovely color drawings and collages.

When the children in the Art Club learned recently of the 25th Annual Art Exhibit sponsored by the Jewish Education Committee, they worked cooperatively on a group project and produced a beautiful collage. Elsewhere in this issue you will read of the Survey of our school being conducted by Professor William Brickman, one of the leading, and possibly *the* leading name in Education in America and Europe.

As a personal aside, Professor Brickman was the teacher of Rabbi Himmel and myself during our High School days, (we were classmates). He was the darling of the school. The kids loved him and never, never missed his class. He was also quite an athlete, and sported a fierce, coal black Balkan Bandit mustache which, together with terrifying grimaces, frightened opposing pitchers into a nervous state known clinically as "the shakes." It was therefore rumored that his athletic ability lie in his mustache, "shave it and you have an ordinary mortal at bat," they said. Personally, I always considered such talk as natural jealousy among athletes, the truth being that his prowess lie in the ferocious faces.

☐ With another school year drawing to a close — this is the final Bulletin until September — I must say, with all humility, that never in the history of Yeshivot in this country — as far as I remember — was there an institution that underwent such a vast, meaningfull program of planned academic and physical change as did Magen David in the last two years.

Professor Brickman Surveys Yeshivah

The Executive Committee of Magen David Yeshivah voted earlier this year to invite a leading American educator, one who would be universally regarded as an unquestioned authority, to survey "every aspect" of our Secular Studies Department.

"It is a basic policy of this committee," explained Leo Esses, Yeshivah President, "to conduct the Yeshivah's affairs on the basis of the best professional advice we can secure, rather than what this person claims to have been told by a learned cousin, or that child's mother read in a magazine article. If the community is entrusting us to spend their funds," Esses continued, "we must view ourselves as trustees who are duty bound to spend the funds prudently and in a manner that will produce the maximum return per dollar."

The School's Board of Education, of which Mr. Leon Sutton is chairman and Mr. Edward Menaged co-chairman for the Secular Studies Department, therefore decided, in conjunction with Mrs. Frieda Shprentz, to invite an evaluation of the school's curriculum, en-

rollment and promotion policies, testing materials, textbooks, staff, record keeping, teacher recruitment procedures, and every other aspect of the school.

Chosen for this survey, by a Committee headed by Ralph Tawil, was Dr. William Brickman, Professor of Educational History and Comparative Education, Graduate School of Education, University of Pennsylvania.

Professor Brickman is also the editor of the highly regarded educational periodical, School and Society, and has been visiting Professor at Columbia University, University of California, University of Illinois, University of Pittsburgh, Yeshivah University, University of Hamburg, Germany, University of Toledo, Spain, and many other American and Foreign Universities.

As President of the Comparitive Education Society, he directed school visit programs for American and foreign Professors of Education in Europe South America, U.S.S.R., the Far East, and Africa.

Dr. Brickman has also been invited to contribute articles to Encyclopedia Britannica, Encyclopedia American, Encyclopedia of Educational research, and many journals and periodicals, both professional and popular, too numerous to mention here. Suffice it say that his works were translated into Spanish, Italian, Japanese, Arabic, Hebrew, Danish, and other languages.

School surveys are one of Dr. Brickmans specialties, having conducted surveys in Public and Parochial Schools, including Jewish day schols, in Massachusetts, Conn., N.Y., N.J., Maryland, Penn., Ohio, Illinois, Minn., Mo., Colo., Calif., and Fla.; also in Mexico, Argentina, Peru, Canada, England, Denmark, Russia, Israel, and South Africa. Dr. Brickman is also an official consultant to State

Department of Education of Maryland, Oregon, Penn., and the Bureau of Research of the U.S. Office of Education.

Dr. Brickman spent four full days in the school during May, sitting in on classes, examining the children's work, the tests and textbooks used, the gradings and marking systems, and interviewing the schools officials. In addition he spent two entire evenings consulting with the Education Committee and with the Full Board, "when Dr. Brickman sends us his findings and recommendations," Leo Esses concluded, "we know we will be steering the school on a straight and true course, it being decided that the school will follow his advice as the most competent available to us."

RABBI GREENES LECTURES AT TEACHERS INSTITUTE

Dr. Joseph Kaminetzky, National Director of Torah Umesorah, announced earlier this month that Magen David Director, Rabbi Moshe Greenes, has been invited as Guest Lecturer by Teachers Institute for the Summer, 1968, program.

The Institute conducts in-service teacher-training seminars for Yeshivah teachers who wish to take advanced courses and credits.

Rabbi Greenes will deliver four twohour lectures, all during July, dealing with teaching, at the Elementary and Secondary level, of the following subjects:

History: The Joshua Era — conquest and settlement.

The Historic Movements of the 19th Century.

Teaching Humash — Communicating ethical values to the middle grades.

Dr. Zvi Shurin, Consultant to the program, said he anticipates over-enrollment for those courses Rabbi Greenes is slated to teach.

CITIZENS RALLY

A very well-attended Mass Rally was held at Shaare Zion re. demands for more adequate police protection for our neighborhoods. The overflow crowd of 1000 men and women heard speakers from the Mayor's office; Boro Pres. Abe Stark's office; Congressman Bert Podell; State Senator Albert Lewis; Assemblyman Leonard Simon and Deputy Chief Inspector Alfred Anger of the Police Dept.; discuss various aspects of the problem.

It was a heated and provocative meeting and as a direct result a group of civic-minded people have met together to form a new committee under the name "Civic Action Committee of Sephardic Community of Brooklyn."

The Rabbis of each congregation are Honorary Chairmen. The following men are on the committee:

Treasurer: Ed. Dweck.

It was stressed that the C.A.C. would devote itself to such area problem as police protection, crime prevention, street lighting, etc., Also, the need to keep Coney Island Hospital, the 61st Precinct station on Avenue U and the 70th Pct. on Avenue J from being closed, as proposed by the Lindsey Administration.

Three sub-committees were established: Crime prevention — to work with the Police Dept. as well as private agencies; Liaison — to work with other synagogues, churches, public schools, etc. in the community; Public Relations — to keep the public informed of the activities and possible courses of action to be followed by the public, should the committees not be satisfied with the action of the city officials.

Since our community encompasses an area from approx. Ave. I to Ave. X between Coney Island Ave. and McDonald Ave., as well as the Bay Parkway area, it comprises a sizeable number of people — at least 25,000. With this large number and all working together for the community, the C.A.C. can be politically influential in achieving its goals, if we are united and determined. Chief Rabbi Nissim Visits Community

Our community is, thank G-d, blessed with many distinguished visitors from abroad. Our reputation as a community committed to Torah and Tradition is such that the leading Rabbis and Seminary heads of the Sephardic communities in Israel, Europe, and the near East almost always honor us with a visit.

Our recent visitor, Israel's Chief Rabbi Yishak Nissim, however, stands out even among so illustrious a group. The impression he left on us, and the warm, spontaneous reception our people extended him will last with us and, hopefully, with the Chief Rabbi, for a long, long time.

The Rabbi's plane arrived at Kennedy Airport at 6 P.M. and was met by a caravan of busses, chartered especially for the occasion, carrying hundreds of Magen David youngsters who gave him a rousing welcome as he walked through customs and into the Terminal. If the airport personnel did not know until then that the Sephardic Chief Rabbi had just arrived, they found out soon enough as our Yeshivah youngsters, reinforced by the Shaare Zion Talmud Torah pupils and the Ahi-Ezer pupils, let go with an old fashion Baruch Habbah.

A few days later the adult community conducted one of the greatest receptions in our history, at Shaare Zion Congregation. The doors to the main synagogue were closed a half hour before the program started, even the S.R.O. being occupied. People kept flocking in on foot and by car all evening long.

One of the policemen on the beat asked your reporter as he approached the synagogue "what's up? is it Yom Kippur? — no it can't be, you just had the Matza Holiday. What are you giving away to draw such a crowd on a week day evening?" It was with pride that I told him "we're giving away a chance to see and hear our Chief Rabbi from Jerusalem." I was happy to note that the patrolman looked on me with respect as I hurried up the block. When I emerged from the synagogue, almost three hours later, I recognized him standing on a milk crate trying to catch a glimpse of the Rabbi as he was being led into a waiting car, surrounded by hundreds of our congregants.

The reception program started with a beautiful Arbit, led by Hazan Elnadav and was followed by stirring messages by Rabbi Jacob Kassin, Rabbi Abraham Hecht, President Isaac Tawil, and an unusually well received message by Rabbi Matloub Abadi, which was characterized by subtle wit and serious insights.

The Highlight of he evening was the

Yes, the Chief Rabbi's visit is one this community will never forget.

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

Personality of the Month

There is a name prominently displayed all over this community on billboards, posters and on sound trucks and that is David Elivahu Cohen. Mr. Cohen is running in the Democratic primary elections to be held June 18th, for State Committeeman. A Committeeman is an important part of "grassroots" politics, or politics on the local level, in that he votes for the delegates (or goes himself) to the national party convention which nominates a Presidential ticket. 
