# Journal Drive Closes "Over the Top" Advertising Sales Breaks all Records

Ellis A. Safdeye, Chairman of the 1970 Journal Drive, announced this week that the closing figure for ads placed in this year's publication came to \$120,000. He termed this, "a grand success, breaking all previous records, and exceeding even the \$100,000 goal set by the Yeshivah's Executive Committee last November," when the 1970 drive was being

planned.

Safdeye recalled that when Leo Esses and Sonny Gindi met with him on behalf of the Executve Committee to appoint him Chairman of the 1970 Drive, they advised him, ("they didn't ask me — they told me") that the goal for this year's book is \$100,000 in advertising. He revealed that he thought they were overestimating the potential. "It really frightened me; it sure seemed like a lot of advertising and, frankly, I wondered whether they were not day-dreaming."

We asked him how he felt about it now, in retrospect. "All I can say," he smiled, "is that our Executive Committee has the foresight and the vision it takes to conduct the affairs of this great yeshivah."

The Blessings of Harmony

The interview then moved towards the contributing factors which led to this unprecedented success. Safdeye revealed himself as a communityminded leader who does not think in personal terms, but, as he put it, 'Community first, last, and always.'

He pointed out the obvious fact that it takes the co-operation and diligent work of many, many people to secure \$120,000 worth of advertising. "We are indebted to every community member who worked so hard to solicit ads . . . the community came through beautifully when it came to placing their own ads, as they always do . . . and of course we had the benefit of two highly regarded and competent Co-Chairmen, Moe D. Gindi and Albert D. Sutton, and a really good, efficient committee." He especially lauded veteran Journal Chairman Joe Esses for the wealth of 'experience and leadership he gave to the drive, and to myself personally."

He then added with conviction,

"this drive shows how much we can accomplish when we work together in harmony and with mutual respect for each other. It demonstrates the community's resourcefulness and talents, its unbounded potential, when we are united." An obvious rebuttal, we thought, to those who idealize divisiveness, name calling, and fault finding, and teach that these qualities are the sign of an intellectual and "Progressive,"

Safdeye Cited

"Listening to Ellis talk about the Drive," Rabbi Moshe Greenes ob-served, "one would think he was a

mere figurehead.

Well, let me tell you," Rabbi Greenes said, "that man is a communal leader of grand proportions. He plotted the course of the Drive in every detail. He conducted weekly study and analysis meetings of the ads coming in, examined weakpoints and corrected them; spotted unexpected areas of strength and developed them."

Like a genuine leader, he was always in the background, never speaking of his own accomplishments, though these were many, but always 'our committee,' 'our people.' Although he avoided the spotlight himself, he was always quick to recognize the achievements of others.

"It was a refreshing experience working so closely with Ellis. I shall always remember and cherish these

last ten weeks," Rabbi Greenes concluded.

#### Development Program Advanced

As in past drives, the proceeds of the Journal Drive are earmarked for the Yeshivah's Development Program.

Leo Esses, Yeshivah President, translated this into practical terms by announcing that the school will open in September with five more classes than we now have, and that, "this would not have been possible if the Development funds the Journal Drive made available were not there."

"This becomes much more meaningful," Esses pointed out, "when we understand that about 140 children will be in our Yeshivah next year who would otherwise have been on a waiting list."

Mr. Safdeye closed the interview on a personal note, the first one he used in our 90-minute conversation.

"I thank G'd for having given me the priviege of serving our Community as Chairman of this Drive. I can not tell you how much it means to me to know that through the Yeshivah I have a share in the eternity of our people and our Torah. The elevated feelings; the spiritual richness it has given me shall remain with me forever."

### YESHIVAH SEDER ON TV

### P. T. A. NEWS


