YESHIVAH ELECTIONS HELD, LEO ESSES PRESIDENT

The Annual Membership Meeting of Magen David Yeshivah was held in October, and encouraging progress and financial reports were rendered by all Committees.

The Annual Meeting also elected officers, an Executive Committee, and Standing Committee Chairmen for the coming year.

Isaac Gindi would not accept the Presidency for another term and was elected Honorary President, "in recognition of the many years of service, many of them under difficult circumstances, which he devoted to the Yeshivah."

DR. STERNLICHT APPOINTED STAFF PSYCHOLOGIST

Dr. Manny Sternlicht, who ranks among N.Y. State's most respected clinical Psychologists, has been appointed to the Staff of Magen David Yeshivah.

Dr. Sternlicht currently fills one of the most important positions in the state, Chief Psychologist of Willowbrook State School, the largest school for exceptional children in the world. He is also an Associate Professor of Psychology at Yeshivah University. Prior to that he served the Illinois Institute for Juvenile Research and as a Clinical Psychologist at the Kansas City Hospital.

In announcing the appointment, Mr. Leo Esses, Yeshivah President, said, "We are very fortunate to acquire the services of a man of such professional eminence, and all the

more so since he has a sense of personal identification with the yeshivah child and the yeshivah parent." Dr. Sternlicht has three sons, all attending Yeshivot.

He has also published extensively. His papers on Children's Values, New Treatment Techniques, and Novel Educational Methodologies were enthusiastically received in professional circles.

Dr. Sternlicht will visit the Yeshivah several mornings a month to confer with teachers on any special problems they may have with children, and with the parents and children themselves, whenever the Principals, Rabbi Bitton and Mrs. Shprentz, may so recommend.
Dr. Sternlicht comes to us with

much practical yeshivah experience,

having been the school psychologist of the Jewish Foundation School, in Staten Island and of the Yeshivah of Flatbush, in Brooklyn.

Gym Program Expanded

Late in the 1966/67 School Year, the Yeshivah instituted an experimental program, with the cooperation of the J.C.H. under which we could offer two classes a full Gym Program

The results were so satisfactory, from the school's as well as the student's and parents' viewpoints, that the program was enlarged to include the complete top half of the school; that is, Grades 5 through 8.

The children will alternate their periods, spending one in Swimming and one in the Gymnasium. They will be instructed and under the supervision of the Professional Coaching Staff of the "J", who have earned an enviable reputation among Jewish Centers in the East.

There is a \$1.25 monthly fee (or, to be exact, \$12.50 for the year), payable directly to the J.C.H., to cover such minor costs as towels, soap and other expendable items.

Mrs. Shprentz said that all children will receive gym credit on their records, and "we expect every student to participate". Those students who cannot attend, for health or other reason, should "contact the school office at once", she added.

SUMMER CLASSES PROVE SUCCESSFUL

After the great success of the 1966 classes in Bradley, they were renewed again this summer. Rabbi Baruch Ben-Haim conducted classes for boys in Bible, Talmud and Hebrew from 8:30 to 11:30 every morning.

A varied and delicious breakfast was served to those who first attended the "Shaharit" services and continued on to their classes. Approximately 60 boys participated and it was a measure of their great interest and desire for learning that they attended faithfully, sometimes leaving home while the rest of the family was still asleep.

There may be those who did not know these classes were held. If you are among them, keep it in mind for next summer if you plan to be in Bradley, and enroll your child early to be sure a place is kept for him. To enroll call Harry Tawil, BR 9-0527.

ANNUAL DRIVE RECORD SUCCESS, \$70,000 PLEDGED

The single most important source of revenue to finance the Yeshivah's operational budget is the Annual Membership drive, culminating with the appeal at Shaare Zion during the sacred Kippur Eve. Service.

With the Yeshivah's constantly increasing services to the children of the Community, its budget has been increasing accordingly. This term the school has thus far added a full time English Principal, a Home Economics teacher for the girls, a full Gym program, a Professional school Psychologist, expanded Pizmonim and Mussar instruction, a Pre-Kindergarten Program, special remedial teachers for reading, speech and increased specialized science instruction and there are many, many more exciting improvements in the offing.

When these added programs were budgeted during August there was some apprehension that they may cost too much for the Yeshivah to carry.

CONFIDENCE IN COMMUNITY

The Committee examined the question and voted its confidence in the Community. "Our people appreciate quality", was the Committee's slogan. Sonny Gindi, Yeshivah Treasurer, summed it up succinctly: "The Community will contribute \$200,000 to a quality yeshivah a lot faster than they will give \$100,000 to a mediocre one."

This confidence was vindicated when the Annual Membership assessments were announced at the Kippur Service. \$70,000 was announced, as compared to \$48,000 at the 1966 Drive.

HENRY SHALOM MEETING

A pre-appeal meeting was held at the home of Henry Shalom in mid-September, and was attended by close to forty community leaders. The meeting heard reports of the expanded services and facilities of the Yeshivah from Isaac Gindi, Sonny Gindi, Henry Shalom and Moe Tawil and assessed themselves over \$30,000, to be announced at the Kippur Appeal.

A newly formed women's division held its first meeting at the home of Rae Ashear and is reported on this page.

SONYA SCHIFFMAN — A PROFILE

To the many classes of students both past and present at our Yeshivah, the lunchroom has been the domain of "Cookie". Day in and day out, for almost twenty years, she has been preparing and serving lunches to our children, now numbering almost 500.

To the parents of the new children in our school, may we introduce Mrs. Sonya Schiffman, dietician of renown, whose professional competence was acquired in the schools and universities of Europe and the United States.

Mrs. Schiffman was born in Poland and started her training in Business and Economic School. During and after the war she worked in hospitals where children suffering from malnutrition were treated. Working without the foods and vitamins we take for granted today, these children were literally brought back to life by proper diets developed by teams of dieticians of which Mrs. Schiffman was a part. It was from this first-hand experience that she realized the importance of proper diet for children and decided to make it her life's work. She immigrated to this country in 1947 and began working at our Yeshivah a year later.

She is vice president of the Food Association of the Jewish Education Committee. She has taken many extension courses, and in 1960 went to Syracuse University to study Advanced Nutrition and Leadership in connection with Parochial School Lunch Programs. During the summer she is a dietition at children's camps.

At the end of her workday at the school, she goes home to her husband, who is the Dean of the Elmwood Conservatory of Music in New Jersey and her son, who is a physicist at Richmond University in Staten Island

A great pride to Mrs. Schiffman are the alumni she occasionally sees who tell her that they recall the lunches at Magen David among their memories of the school.

FROM THE DESK OF THE PRINCIPALS

Rabbi David Bitton The RIGHT First Step

Many parents question the necesity of sending their children to the Yeshivah Kindergarten or Nursery, probably because they think that children are only playing there.

True, the atmosphere is more relaxed than in the primary grades, but it is wrong to conclude that they are not learning. The fact is that they

learn a lot.

Kindergarten is the transition from home to full time first grade routine. It gives the youngster a breathing space to catch up with the other children in areas which are important for reading and school work in general, such as Hebrew and English languages, attentiveness, memory and interpretation.

Language: during the school year your child learns hundreds of Hebrew words which help him to begin with in the first grade. In English he is taught to use proper sentence structure and enrich his vocabulary.

Listening: in the kindergarten your child plays musical games and uses other methods for distinguishing sounds, which gives him a boost when the actual reading begins.

Memory: your child's teacher tries to strengthen his ability in this field by using books which classify objects in simple categories, such as toys, furniture and tools. The children look at these objects and then turn their books over and try to tell just what they saw.

Prayers: the youngster learns, by repeating after his teacher, simple sentences and phrases that contain the essence of the early morning pravers.

Grace after meal: It is a real pleasure to listen to these little ones when they recite the first chapter of "BIR-KAT HAMMAZON" by heart after they finish their meal.

Ceremonies: every Jewish and National holiday is celebrated in your child's class. Stories about great leaders and personalities are being told to him which make him understand the meaning of such celebration or holiday.

When I visited the nursery, I was amazed to find many children know already quite a number of Hebrew words, stories about Rosh Hashanna, Yom Kippur and Sukkot. One should see how thrilled they were, when I visited them in their Sukkah which they had decorated themselves. They had a great feeling of accomplishment.
