## Building Nearing Completion

### DRIVE ENTERS FINAL PHASE

For the third consecutive year the Yeshivah was faced with one hundred more applicants than the present building could accommodate. In September 1968, and again in 1969, there was no alternative but to accept registrants on first-come, first-served basis, and turn all others away.

"It really hurt," said Sonny Gindi, Yeshivah President, "but what choice did we have? We just had no place to put all the kids who wanted to attend."

This year, with the completion of the new building and the opening of at least one floor of classrooms expected to come just a few short months after school opening, the Yeshivah Committee rented several classrooms nearby, on a temporary basis, to accommodate the overflow registrants for the first semester.

### \$822,000 Pledged: Still Need \$400,000

Mr. Henry Shalom, the Drive's Chairman, commented that "we have come this far in so short a time thanks to the Community's inspired response to the Drive."

"Over \$800,000 was pledged in less than a year, which makes this the most successful Drive in Community history. But were this the extent of the Drive we would certainly be in difficulty," he added. "As a matter of fact, we would probably have to stop construction right now, because we already have more than \$800,000 worth of building — including land costs, architects' fees and finance charges — and there is still about \$400,000 worth of work to be done, including plumbing and electrical fixtures, auditorium seating, and other appurtenances, before the building is ready for occupancy."

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DIRECTOR'S COLUMN

The report appearing on page 5 of this issue, about the million dollar loan extended our Yeshivah by a consortium of three banks, (alphabetically) Chemical, Israel Discount, and Republic National, serves as another example of the vital role financial institutions play in the development of communal institutions.

I do not mean to imply that the three banks involved did not take prudent precautions to assure that we held ample pledges to meet the payments. That is their responsibility to their share-holders, and they were not remiss in their duties.

What I do mean to point out, is that without proper financing our new Yeshivah would have been years in going up, instead of months. And that the financing could only come from one source — banks.

Though often maligned, and easy targets for the malcontent and rabble-rouser, we must remember that banks have as much a share in this country's development and progress as do the Pony Express, the Indian Traders, and even such glamorous industries as railroads and steel-making.

Similarly, in our own situation, it would be less than fair not to acknowledge that these three banks have as important a share in the education of our children as do our classroom teachers.

So, thank you (counter-clockwise), Republic National; Israel Discount; and Chemical Bank.

FROM THE DESK OF THE PRINCIPAL

TO ALL OUR YESHIVAH FAMILIES, parents and children, to those entering our halls for the first time, and to those familiar with the Yeshivah, we express a hearty welcome, and look forward to days and years filled with meaning and made happy in the carrying out of our educational program. The success of our efforts depends to a large extent upon the close relationship established between the home and the school and we anticipate your fullest cooperation towards our growth, our qualitative progress and our improvement.

**CONFERENCES WITH TEACHERS:** Several opportunities will be provided during the school year for the parents to visit the school and confer with the teachers about pupil progress and personality development. However, from time to time parents may wish to confer with a teacher about a specific problem. Such special conferences are favored by the school and may be arranged in advance to be held at a time when the teacher is free from classroom duties. Please call the school office, 236-5905, and an appointment will be arranged. Parents are requested to refrain from visiting classrooms without written permission from the principals. Teachers are instructed not to admit any visitor without this official permission.

**PARTICULAR ATTENTION** to the personal appearance of the children is the responsibility of the parents. In each class the pupils will be inspected daily for cleanliness and tidiness. The proper attire for boys consists of a kippah or hat, trousers, shirt and, for the upper grades, (7th and 8th) a tie. Girls may wear dresses or skirts and blouses in a proper manner. These rules will be strictly enforced.

**INDIVIDUAL WORK DONE AT HOME** can be very valuable as an integral part of the school curriculum. Parents doing their share to facilitate and supervise children's homework realize the importance of providing an atmosphere conducive to study and void of distraction. In the best interest of the children, however, they should refrain from tutoring or helping them without the teacher's recommendation. Should your child encounter difficulties preparing his homework, please feel free to discuss this matter with his teacher.

**A DAY MISSED IS A DAY LOST.** At the outset of the school year we wish to emphasize the importance of punctual

daily attendance. It is needless to point out the damaging effect that tardiness or absence has on the progress of the pupil. No child should be kept away from school except in the case of illness, and the office should be notified at once. Pupils returning to school after a communicable illness must present a doctor's note stating that the child is in good health and able to return to school.

IT IS AN ESTABLISHED educational maxim that children learn by our examples rather than by our voiced opinion. They realize the importance of study and school from the value you place upon it. Similarly, the positive attitude of pupils toward school will suffer greatly if parents take their children out of school during school hours for any reason other than extreme emergencies, or without the expressed approval of the principals.

Mr. Lloyd Marshall Kahn of Nanuet, New York, has been appointed Assistant Principal of the General Studies Department.

For the past four years, Mr. Kahn has been Chairman of the Mathematics Department of the Henley Preparatory School, Holliswood, a leading private school.

At Yale, he was a member of the Alpha Phi Omega, honor fraternity, and of the Mory's Association. In 1969, Mr. Kahn received a Masters Degree from Hunter College and is presently enrolled in a Ph.D. program at New York University.

Mr. Kahn is married to the former Gail Schuster of Orangeburg, N. Y. Mrs. Kahn was a 1968 honors graduate from Boston University and is chairman of the French Department of Park Ridge High School, Park Ridge, N. J. and will receive her Masters Degree from Hunter College this year.

# ANNUAL KIPPUR DRIVE SETS RECORD; \$105,000 PLEDGED

The expanded services the Yeshivah is offering its students, and the record-breaking rise in enrollment, (which now stands at 735, up 410 since 1966, when the student body numbered only 325) did not go unnoticed by the Community.

Donors to the Annual Membership Drive, which culminates with the announcement of pledges at Shaare Zion and Beth Torah during the solemn Kippur Eve prayers, increased their pledges accordingly, and assessed themselves \$105,000, up \$13,000, or 15%, from the \$92,000 pledged at the 1969 Drive.

## SHALOM MEETING

A Pre-Drive meeting of the larger Donors was held at the home of Henry Shalom, Yeshivah Vice President.

The meeting heard a particularly stirring message from Sonny Gindi, newly elected Yeshivah President. He traced the Yeshivah's growth and development for the assembled Community leaders and pointed out that, "there is much, much more the Yeshivah is planning to do for our children, if the Community shows its desire for such improvement and expansion by increasing their pledges for the Annual Membership Drive," which he termed, "the single most important source of revenue for the Yeshivah's day-to-day operational budget."

The group responded by pre-pledging \$55,000.

The Drive made history by passing the \$100,000 mark for the first time.

## WOMEN'S DIVISION

The Women's Division, which conducts its own Drive, set a new record as well. They passed the \$5,000 mark for the first time.

The Women's Pre-Drive Meeting, held at the home of Mrs. Haim (Julie) Dweck, was attended by close to fifty ladies.

In addition to each announcing her own annual contribution, the ladies pledged to intensify their efforts on behalf of Sisterhood projects, and thus increase its allocations to the School.

## THE HOSTAGES RETURNED

It was with tremendous relief that their families and the community welcomed home the last of the hostages held by the Arab guerrillas just minutes before the Rosh Hashonah Holiday services began. With split-second timing and with the sound of wailing police siren escorts, the brothers, Rabbis Abraham and Joseph Rafful-Harari were ushered in through the doors of the Shaare Zion and heard the congregation's heart-felt cries of "Baruch Habaim," "Shalom," and "Baruch Hashem." The terrible episode was over.

The ordeal of the Rabbis and their families has been reported in all the news media throughout the world. It was an unhappy one, to say the least, because the two brothers were separated from their wives and infant children, and for three weeks, no news was heard of them. They knew they were O.K. physically but no one else did. It can now be said that they, along with four other men thought to be Very Important Persons, were taken to a special hiding place and kept prisoners for three weeks. They were kept in a small, dark, and practically airless cellar and let out only for brief periods in a small courtyard, only half-open to the sky.

They subsisted on bread, water, boiled eggs and, occasionally, pieces of fruit. Books were taken from them; their time was spent in contemplation and conversation. Their religious traditions, and learning, helped sustain them. For example, Erev Shabbat, Friday evening, they were able to obtain two candles. They lit them,

said the prayers for the Shabbath and although they were without family, wine and food, felt the presence and blessedness of the Sabbath day.

Their most worrisome moments came during the last 48 hours of their captivity when they heard on the transistors of their guards that they were already in the hands of the Egyptian Embassy in Amman and they knew they were still captive in the shelter, with gunfire and shells bursting all around them.

In case of late arrival, contingency plans were made to take them to the International Hotel at Kennedy Airport where their families would await them. Many Rabbis of the area offered to house them over the Holidays. The outpourings of aid and sympathy were widespread.

Arrangements were made to remove the men directly from the plane, rush them through Customs formalities and with police escort, bring them home. At their houses, TV cameramen and crews were waiting to catch their arrival at the doorstep. However, with time so short, only brief films were taken of the men shaving and preparing for the Holiday. Police escorts again waited for them and rushed them to synagogue on time to begin the New Year 5731.

On Rosh Hashonah, during the Morning services, Rabbi Abraham Rafful arose to speak before the congregation. With deep feeling and emotion, he thanked everyone for their prayers that helped bring them through their ordeal safely.

We asked Leo Esses, Yeshivah Treasurer, the expected source of the final \$400,000. He told us that the Prospective Donors list, drawn up at the start of the Drive by a Committee consisting of a cross-section of the Community, "is not yet fully covered."

He reiterated that "the days when a small handful of 'philanthropists' could finance community institutions is long gone. Today, every community member must carry his fair share. Naturally, the prosperous must contribute more than the middle-class, but no one can consider himself totally 'unaccountable' in communal matters."

"In this respect," Esses continued, "our Community has done itself proud. No one has turned us down. There may have been an occasional disparity of views regarding what Mr. X or Mr. Y's fair share is, but NO ONE, not a single person, told us that he's not interested, or that it is not his concern."

During the next few weeks every single Community Member who has not yet been seen will be visited by a committee, and the heads of the Drive are confident that each one will respond, as have those approached up to now.

"And there is where the remaining \$400,000 will be coming from," we were told.

**THREE BANK CONSORTIUM ADVANCES  
YESHIVAH MILLION DOLLAR LOAN**

**Chemical; Discount; Republic; Each Lend 1/3**

Mr. Mourad Kattan, a member of the Building Committee who worked on the sub-committee responsible for financing, reported that one of the serious problems facing the building progress has finally been resolved.

Because of the tight money market, the Building Committee was genuinely afraid that it would be forced to suspend building operations for months at a time, until enough pledges were converted to cash to allow additional construction, and then repeat the process again every time cash on hand ran low.

This type of stop and go construction is not only costly, it is also endless and unpredictable, and does not allow for rational school planning.

The Million Dollar Loan, extended against our confirmed pledges, was

worked out between the banks and our committee over the summer months and we are already drawing on the proceeds.

According to Mr. Kattan, the Republic Bank and the Israel Discount Bank were joined by the Chemical Bank, each one committing \$335,000.

This means we must secure the additional \$400,000 in pledges, if we are to be able to draw the full million dollars without interruptions, because the banks will issue the funds against Bona Fide pledges only, according to Kattan.

Mr. Henry Shalom, Drive Chairman, speaking on behalf of the entire committee, said, "we are all deeply indebted to the Israel Discount Bank, to the Republic Bank, and to the Chemical Bank, for the confidence they have shown in the Community."

**Ozar Hatorah Faces New Challenges**

Our community needs no introduction to Ozar Hatorah. As a matter of fact, the initiative to create a world-wide organization for Torah-true education for Sephardic Jewry came from this community.

It is difficult for us, sitting here in New York, to really grasp the vast scope and amazing accomplishments of Ozar Hatorah's work in the twenty-five years of its existence. Although the statistics are impressive, they do not tell the thousands of stories which deserve to be told. Today, there are over 13,000 boys and girls in 68 schools from Morocco to Iran and from kindergarten to Teacher's College. The number exceeded 22,000 before the massive North-African emigration.

Isaac Shalom, of blessed memory, deserves great credit for this success as Founder, President and generous contributor of Ozar Hatorah. His co-founder, Mr. Joseph Shamah, initiated the work in the field, travelling tirelessly and even residing for years wherever his presence was needed.

**Displaced North African Children**

The task is, however, far from completed. The displacement of more than

half a million Jews from North Africa to France, Canada and other countries has created new challenges. It is estimated that France alone has some 100,000 Sephardic children totally deprived of Jewish education and thus widely exposed to the worst aspects of assimilation. Ozar Hatorah is concerned with filling this gap by providing the proper Torah education. It should be recognized that Ozar Hatorah has actually started a movement of spiritual and cultural renaissance for Oriental Jewry disorientated by its sudden exposure to Western life and culture.

In recent months steps were taken to formulate and implement a program of action in the face of the gigantic task ahead. The Board of Directors of Ozar Hatorah, headed by Joseph I. Shalom, and with the participation of Henry and Stephen Shalom, as well as other prominent members of our community, attracted a number of new members amongst the most influential personalities in Jewish life. Moses J. Lasry was elected Executive Vice-President and devotes his full time to the organization. A major fund-raising campaign is being planned to enlarge the work of Ozar Hatorah in France, Canada and other Mediterranean countries.
