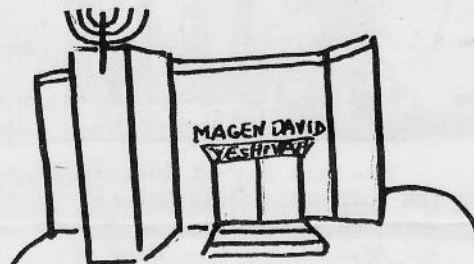

SIMCHAT TORAH

The last day of Succoth is the jolliest. Originally it was the second day of Shemini Atzeret, but in time it became a new festival, a Torah festival, which is what "Simchat Torah" means. It is one of the two Torah feasts, of which the other is Shevouth, in which we commemorate the great event of receiving the Ten Commandments on Mount Sinai.

Simchat Torah is the day when the reading of the Torah in the synagogue is concluded every year, and immediately resumed again.

The Torah is read in the synagogue every Shabbat, Holidays, Mondays and Thursdays. Every Shabbat a Parasha is covered. In this way all of the Humush is read through every year. On Simchat Torah the last chapter is completed and the first chapter of the first book is begun, in order to show that the Torah has no end, and also not to give an opportunity to the "Satan" to accuse Israel that they finished the Torah and didn't want to resume it.

We celebrate this happy occasion by the processional with the Torah which we call "Hakafot", children carry little flags, all the Torah scrolls are taken out, and each member of the congregation is given a scroll to carry, while everyone is dancing and chanting songs. Refreshments, too, are served as our Rabbis learned from the Bible, that when King Solomon dedicated the Bet Hamekdush, "He made feast to all his servants". From this verse we learn that we should make a feast whenever we finish the Torah.

OPEN LETTER

FROM OUR PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents:

A Yeshivah education requires and demands an idealistic attitude and a whole-hearted commitment on the part of parents and the entire community. Sad, and even strange to relate, in my conversation with parent members of the community, I often find this lacking. It is not enough to send your own child to the Yeshivah and encourage other parents to do likewise; paying tuition fees is simply not enough. Every parent who sends his child, every member of the community, must look upon the Yeshivah as an ideal, a worthy cause, and must give of his time and energy. It seems to me there must be a broader base of participation to maintain and improve the Yeshivah. More parents must participate in the P.T.A. activities. More members of the community must join and take an active part in the financial operation of the institution. Various social, fraternal, and religious organizations within the community must support the Yeshivah. Many make donations to worthwhile causes too numerous to mention. Is the Yeshiva high on their list of donations? Should not the education of the child take precedence? Should not charity begin at home?

I believe the year ahead of us will be a fateful one in which the future of the Yeshivah will be decided. Funds must be found to operate without recurring crises; adequate teachers' salaries must be paid and on time, sufficient and appropriate books, supplies and materials must be provided. long range plans for the continued growth and development of the Yeshivah will be decided. We cannot live from day to day, from hand to mouth.

This is not a job for one man, or three, or five. It is the responsibility of the parent-body and the leaders of the community to enlist the active support of the entire community and involve it in the support and maintenance of the Yeshivah; the only institution of its kind serving the children of the community. Only in this manner can the success of the Yeshiva be assured.

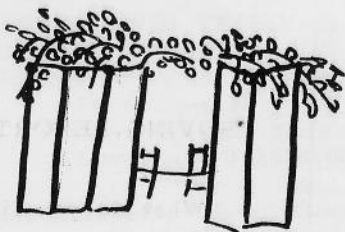

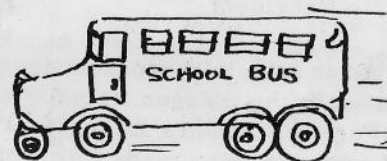
Please put name tags in your younger children's outer clothing and boots. This will avoid mix-ups and losses or delays in getting your children properly dressed for the outdoors.

SEEING IS BELIEVING

I wish to congratulate the P. T. A. for their resumption of the Magen David Yeshiva Community Bulletin. I found the first edition interesting and informative. I wish you success and continued publication.

In your editorial, you invited the Rabbis of the community to use "our columns for matters they would like to bring to the attention of the community". I should like to take this opportunity to write the following which I believe deserves the attention of the members of our community; especially parents of Yeshiva children.

There is a popular aphorism which says, "Seeing is Believing". This wordly wise adage may find roots in the Biblical phrase in Exodus, "And the people saw, ... and they believed..." The Rabbis in the Talmud also taught us, "Hearing is not the same as seeing". The latter is by far more superior in establishing the accuracy and veracity of matters discussed or taught.

This fact is especially true when we enter the realm of religious education and training of children. Unless the child sees practiced in action what he is being taught in theory, the lesson will lack effectiveness and will not truly impress itself into the conscious and sub conscious strata of the child's mind. Especially, if the lesson matter touches upon subjects which depend upon emotional reactions too, i. e. love, sacrifice, commitment, kindness, generosity, etc., then it becomes vitally urgent that the "practice what you preach" aspect is observed by the teacher himself, first and foremost. Otherwise the child may recognize the "double standard of Judaism," of saying one thing and doing another. The Law requires you to observe, but I don't. In effect, this is exactly what happens in the child's reaction to the subject matter under discussion. We are therefore fortunate in having a dedicated Yeshiva staff of Hebrew teachers loyal to the Torah and its observance.

How tragic and ludicrous the program of religious education and training of the Yeshiva becomes, when at home and out of school, parents abuse and violate the sacred teachings and tenets of our Torah. Do we not create a spirit of "divided loyalties" in our children, when they do not know whom and what to take seriously and to follow?

Should they heed the words of their teacher, they find faults with their parent's conduct. Should they emulate their parent's way of life, they are at variance, if not in complete conflict with, their course of study and teacher's instruction.

Seeing is believing! If children observe their parents living up to the Torah way of practicing the laws, prayer, charity, generosity, modesty, humility, etc., then they will believe that everything the Yeshiva teacher says is factual, proper, and true. However, seeing the opposite in real life at home and out of school may have an alternate effect, that of alienating the child from his teacher and the teachings of the Torah. The adverse conduct of parents may defeat the very purpose for which he or she is being sent to the Yeshiva.

My appeal to the parents of Yeshiva children specifically, is to practice what the teacher preaches, in the name of the Torah. To encourage by example, rather than discourage by abuse, the fulfillment of the Laws.

We can perpetrate the eternal values of Torah and Judaism. Our primary need is for a sincere application to the policy of encouraging through practice, the tenets of the Torah.

May G-d be with us in our efforts to raise a generation of intelligent mature and observant children, dedicated to the purpose of our creation; to observe and to practice the words of the Torah.

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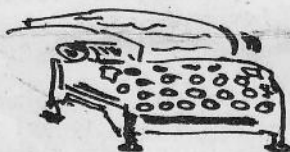
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
