

What Can I Do To Reach Kids With The Gospel Of Christ?

<p>If you are a Parent</p>	<p>Make spiritual life a priority in your home: attend church, read the Bible, pray with your kids, pray for your kids. Be prepared to lead your child to Christ at home. Pray for your child's church workers. After church, discuss with your children what the lesson was about. Lead the discussion towards the gospel. If you have the gift of teaching, offer to present the gospel at church or for special events. Talk with your child's church worker about the spiritual progress of your young person. Offer to visit non-churched families whose children make decisions for Christ. Encourage your children to bring their friends to church; offer to transport them. Volunteer to provide food or other needed supplies for special events (talk to the workers and ask what is needed). Pray for each church activity; for the speaker, and for unchurched family members to attend.</p>
<p>If you are a Pastor</p>	<p>Provide evangelism materials and tools through your church library or book store. Provide resources to help speakers develop messages for your children; books, videos, posters, etc. Conduct evangelism training, and require all workers to attend. Include evangelism training in the church budget. Have children's workers report decisions to the church office, then follow-up with a letter, phone call and visit to the family. Announce outreach activities in the bulletin and from the pulpit. Pray for outreach efforts with the entire church. Offer to attend and present the gospel at activities. Include your children's workers in the prayers of the church. Teach your workers how to exhibit the fruit of the Spirit. Meet with your workers for encouragement and edification. Help them understand the importance of their ministry.</p>
<p>If you are a Children's Ministry</p>	<p>Make spiritual life a priority in your home: attend church, read the Bible, pray with your kids, pray for your kids. Outline a teaching plan for the year, presenting Bible truths that</p>

<p>Director</p>	<p>meet the needs of your kids. Make sure the gospel is presented regularly and clearly. Include evangelism in your annual worker training. Provide evangelism materials to your workers. Give each worker copies of favorite tracts. Emphasize evangelism at prayer & planning meetings. Provide guidelines for special speakers. Have resources on-hand for speakers to use when developing children's messages. Report all decisions for Christ to the pastor and church office. Have copies of follow-up resources available for your workers to give to kids who trust Christ Schedule a regular night for workers to visit kids and their families. Schedule at least one "Bring a Visitor" event each year. Conduct a yearly contest to bring visitors. Review online resources for activity ideas. Schedule at least one "Parents Night" during each year. Conduct other special activities to attract kids and their parents. Pray for your church leaders. Provide job descriptions for all workers, including requirements to exhibit desired character (church attendance, service, etc. Plan service opportunities outside of church for your workers. Meet with your workers for encouragement and edification. Help them understand the importance of their ministry.</p>
<p>If you are a Children's Worker</p>	<p>Make spiritual life a priority in your home: attend church, read the Bible, pray with your kids, pray for your kids. Attend evangelism training. Carry gospel tracts with you during church and know how to use them. Take advantage of every opportunity to share the gospel with a child. Pray for the kids at church. When a child trusts Christ, talk with the parent who picks him up. Give the child follow-up materials and discuss them next week. Keep children's contact information current (address, phone number). Volunteer to assist with planning and organizing special activities. Pray for each activity; for the speaker, and for unchurched family members to attend. Be faithful in attending church and Bible studies.</p>
