

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Park Presbyterian Church Annual Congregational Meeting January 27, 2019

Started at 11:21 AM after worship in the sanctuary

Quorum: determined that there was at least 10% of active membership rolls in attendance (~45 members)

Opening Prayer and Welcome: Reverend Christopher Mergener

Thanked members for staying and attending meeting and taking interest in our church.

Note: Elders can highlight items on reports are not reading in full.

MOTION: Deb Compher/Cheryl Lotz (2nd) to approve the Annual Meeting Minutes from 2018. (passed)

Clerk's Report: Cari Taylor just thanked all the members of session for all the great work done in last year.

Pastor's Report: Reverend Christopher Mergener

Asked if there were any questions about his report. Mentioned that it has been a pleasure to see how people have stepped up in leadership roles, helping out with activities, and coming together in times of need. Very inspiring to see. When Christopher goes out to do pastoral care with members Park Church is always mentioned favorably. Our outreach into community does not go unnoticed.

Pastor Contract: Dale Groover/Paul Salisbury

Dale mentioned that we changed payroll in November and with that change to new company we have seen better results. The budget is done on an annual basis. The employees of Park Church received a 3% increase in pay and because Christopher came in July 2018, he was not able to get the increase. The 3% for Christopher was divided in half (1.5%) increase happened on January 1st. Now he is on the same schedule for increase as everyone else. Coming midyear threw things off but will now be on a contractual year. Was much easier for Finance to do this way.

Team Reports:

Christian Education: Paul Salisbury

Paul mentioned the decreasing children in Sunday school and changes needed to make to program. Hired Ellen Donnan to take over Sunday School Program and ROCK emerged. This happens once a month and coincides with contemporary service afterwards in the sanctuary open to all. Thanks to members of CE team for all the hard work and dedication to program.

Church Family Life: Cheryl Lotz

Thanks to everyone for stepping up and helping out with all the activities our church is involved with. Looking forward to adding some new things this year (2019.)

Deacons: Sandi Marcano

Christopher thanked the deacons for all their hard work. They do a lot of behind the scenes work and sometimes don't get recognition they need.

Finance: Dale Groover

Nothing to add

Question was asked about the budget report and what the actual profit for the Harvest Dinner was? Only showing \$98 and team knows that there was more than that. Natalie confirmed that they had a profit of ~ \$2,000. So may have been inputted into the wrong spot. Dale said that he would look into. Gave the information to Bethany and things don't always line up the way they do in reports.

Worship/Music Report: Bob Hanson

Sarah Humphrey asked where the amount for choir director was in budget report, confirmed that the amount was lumped under bell choir (just combined into that line) She stated she has been spending money on music but not showing on report.

Someone asked how to read income/expense reports. Dale mentioned that when Bethany put the information in for the Annual Report it is not as smooth as reports that normally get sent. Things don't always line up the way they should. IF you have questions you can always ask the finance team.

Stewardship Report: Paul Salisbury

Thanks to Scott Blondell and Dale Groover for all their help. We are down in pledges this year. You can send in pledges anytime, even if your not pledging this year. They can adjust budgets as needed.

Membership Report:

Need more people. How do we get more people in the doors? Invite people to come, those that used to be here, continue to ask and eventually people will usually come back. Most people will go back to a church if they feel wanted or missed.

Mission Report: Deb Compher

Thanks to all that support missions at our church. If anyone is interested in joining team just come to a meeting.

Pastor Nominating Committee:

Christopher just mentioned that he is very pleased to be here and thanked the team for the opportunity to serve Park Church.

Personnel Report: Dale Groover

Dale mentioned that if you feel led to help with Personnel please ask. Need people to join committees.

Presbyterian Women: Deb Compher/Mary Cree (co moderators)

Always open for women to join luncheons. They really enjoy fellowship and fundraisers. Those fundraisers are mostly helping out local food related missions.

Mentioned that the money raised for the Kitchen renovation would be matched. The current amount for kitchen renovation is around \$20,000. Still have some money that could match when the time comes. Thanks to all participate in PW.

Property Report: Scott Blondell

Mentioned that there are some holes in the roster. They are doing their best to fill the roles as they go. Thanks to Deb for helping out with the sound board. Thanks to Larry Brown for all his years of service on this team. This is a large building and there is a lot to do, right now not a lot of people on the committee. Always looking for help if your interested. Scott has began gathering information and history about the building and getting it written down (a property manual) for those that come after. Lots of great information that needs to be preserved.

Question came up about the elevator fund and where that stands. Scott and Rick Bald will get together a presentation to present to the congregation at a later date as to what our options are regarding the elevator or some sort of lift system. This will happen sometime this spring 2019.

Worship Report: Bob Hanson

Thanked team members for their hard work. This was not a typical year. We had the loss of organist and hiring a new organist. Had loss of pastor leaving and gained a new pastor. Finding pulpit supply was difficult. Also had an interim play piano for services till new organist came. How many people does it take to put worship services together? Its about 20 people each week to help with service.

Book of Order about Nominating Committee:

G-2.04 GENERAL PROVISIONS FOR RULING ELDERS AND DEACONS

G-2.0401 Election of Ruling Elders and Deacons

Ruling elders and deacons are men and women elected by the congregation from among its members. The nomination and election of ruling elders and deacons shall ex- press the rich diversity of the congregation's membership and shall guarantee participation and inclusiveness (F-1.0403). Ruling elders and deacons shall be nominated by a committee elected by the congregation, drawn from and representative of its membership. Congregations may provide by their own rule for a congregational nominating

committee, provided that the committee shall consist of at least three active members of the congregation, and shall include at least one ruling elder who is currently serving on the session. The pastor shall serve ex officio and without vote. When elections are held, full opportunity shall always be given to the congregation for nomination from the floor of meeting.

Current Nominating committee did not present a slate. New committee is not being named at this time, it is going to back to session for discussion and then will be presented to congregation at a later date. Reverend Christopher mentioned that this needs to be done prayerfully and with discernment.

PASTOR'S REPORT

REV. CHRISTOPHER MERGENER, PASTOR

"This is the day that the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it."

-Psalm 118:24

As I sat down to write my annual report and began to review my monthly reports, I've realized how busy this year has truly been. As I reflected over the year, I can say that it's been rewarding, challenging, delightful, and for the most part joyful. The teams have continued to be very active and I have enjoyed working with them on the various projects and offerings.

I continue to be encouraged as I look at how active many of our members are in the various programs and events that are offered throughout the year which include Bible Studies, Church Family Life Events, Special Worship opportunities, and Sunday morning services.

This past year has brought on a few challenges. First, we had the failure of the truss in our third floor attic space. As most of you know, the result of that failure limited our building use and then we continued to discern how we were going to pay for the repair should the insurance company not pay.

I want to thank you all for being patient regarding the building use and for uplifting prayers for a positive outcome in repairing the truss. The bible quote from Philippians 4:6 seems fitting here, "Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God." We made our request known to God and he answered. The insurance company denied our initial claim, session decided to pursue the claim further with an attorney, and with the expert advise and help from member Rick Bald, we were able to get the claim reopened. At this point it looks like the insurance company will cover the building repair. Praise the Lord! The session and I

realize it took a lot of time to get to this point, but the time was needed, for each person to do their task and to work through the process. Again, I thank you for your patience. Hopefully the actual repair work will start in early 2020.

Another challenge we faced as a session was the decision to not move forward with a Youth Christian Education Program. Ellen Donnon received an interim pastor call, which left our Christian Education Director position open. Attendance for youth activities had been minimal at best. While considerable efforts were made to reach out to families with youth, it seemed to be a one-way street. After thoughtful conversations and discernment, the decision to hire a Christian Education Director was put on hold. We would all love a program for children and are open to having discussions about reopening the program if there is interest and desire from parents and congregants in the future.

While the youth program presented issues for us, the Adult Bible Studies continued to remain strong. I offered four Bible Studies this year. Some were attended more than others with attendance ranging from 4-12 participants. The conversations and discussions that took place were meaningful and fruitful, quite often stretching people to consider how God was working in their lives and how they related to others sharing their experiences with God. I really enjoy the bible studies series and the time I can spend with people, talking about how God is active in their lives.

The Worship experience at Park Church has changed slightly over this past year. In addition to the weekly bulletin, there is a PowerPoint presentation for every service. At times, we have YouTube clips and music to enhance the worship experience. The music has been well received as an addition to the choir or as a replacement when the choir is off during the summer months. The goal is to have a blend of music in the worship service of hymns

and more contemporary music. Each week, prior to the service beginning, we play new music on the screen to offer a different form of music and to teach new songs. So far it has been well received and many have commented on liking the addition. I've also tried some new and creative ideas in worship that included the offering of anchor stones and the introduction of star words (on Epiphany Sunday) to carry the worship experience into the lives of the congregants outside of the Sunday morning worship experience.

In addition to our Sunday morning services, we had our annual Wholeness and Healing service in December. The service was an intimate gathering in the chapel with a small group of people. We hope to do this service more often as it has proven to be meaningful for those who attend. During Lent we had combined services for Maundy Thursday and Good Friday with Western Presbyterian church as well.

The Matthew 25 Initiative, phase-one, was introduced in the fall. We had a five-week preaching series, as well as a bible study to follow the program. As part of the initiative we did a neighborhood assessment. The study was done to help us identify needs that are currently not being met in the neighborhood. We met as a congregation to discuss the needs we identified and are beginning to form phase-two of the program that will include mission projects to address some of the needs. It should be exciting to work into the Matthew 25 initiative throughout this upcoming year, "to live into our calls, boldly, as Christ disciples."

My continuing education this year was spent doing research in the "stacks" at the University of Chicago library (studying and doing research for sermons and church growth), and attending the Well-ness Retreat in Montreat. Both proved to be well worth the time, energy and money spent to rejuvenate and to get fresh ideas for moving the church forward. I also participated, and will continue to participate in the "Healthy Pastors,

Healthy Congregations" program that is offered through the PC(USA).

My work this past year in the Presbytery has kept me busy as well. In January I was asked to join the Committee on Ministry (COM). At the first meeting I attended, I was asked to be the representative for the COM at the General Council. I served in both roles for all of 2019. In addition to serving on the COM committee, I served on a sub-committee called the Committee on Preparation for Ministry (CPM). CPM works with candidates that are going through the ordination process. I am now chairing that committee and am working with two people who are going through the ordination process. My work with the CPM committee also included being a reader of ordination exams for the denomination. I read 18 exams in early October concerning the polity of the PC(USA). If I didn't know about polity before then, I sure am educated now. While the work was tedious, I also found it interesting and rewarding to serve in this capacity.

Funerals this year were fewer than last year. I presided four funerals, which included both Park members and non-members.

I continue to meet with local pastors each month to discuss challenges that we are facing, new church growth ideas, and for fellowship. I find this time enjoyable and look forward to it each month.

Thank you for a great year in 2019! My star word on Epiphany Sunday was "Builder." I look forward to continuing to build Park Church and to serve, in the upcoming year, with an optimistic attitude.

DEACONS

The small, but mighty, Board of Deacons meets several times during the year and maintains a quiet but active ministry in the Church. The Deacons oversee the Fellowship Time after the morning service, which has become quite well-attended and is looked forward to by many church folk. You never know what kind of treats will appear with the coffee and other beverages, and good conversation and fellowship can be had for up to an hour following worship.

The Deacons are also responsible for floral delivery of the "real flowers" that are placed on the altar on Sunday mornings. Those that are not taken by the donor are either delivered in a whole floral piece to someone who may have recently had surgery or another need, or possibly split into several smaller bouquets to brighten 2-3 people's days. Or, they might go to one of the local nursing homes for the folks there, where they are well received.

We are also in charge of receptions following funerals if requested; this past year, those receptions were taken care of by the families of those members we lost. We also home-bound members, and others in need of a friendly face. The Deacons prepared and delivered more than 20 gift bags at Christmas time, greatly in part to the donations of some generous Elves whose names will remain a secret (You know you are, and we thank you most heartily for your support!) Besides those gift bags, we also donated about 2 dozen ziploc "care packages" to the Victim Resource Center, made up of the overflow items, and even had items to put into the Red Wagon (Remember, the Red Wagon also accepts personal care items, as well as food).

One of our Deacons devotes a fair amount of her time making sure that Birthday and Anniversary cards go out on special days. If you know someone you would like added to the list, please contact the office.

Lastly, the Deacons are self-supporting. We are always welcoming of donations of coffee (both regular and decaf), napkins, sugar, sweetener, creamer, treats on a Sunday morning (There is a sign-up sheet!!!), etc.

We especially enjoy working together and being able to financially support worthwhile causes. We couldn't do the work we do without the love and support of our church members, the other teams, the Session and our pastor. Thank you all for your assistance when PW comes calling.

FINANCE

The church accounting system which we changed in 2017 continues to improve and we are able to answer request more timely and with greater accuracy. There will always be changes and modifications to the systems but that is what makes it work for our benefit.

Due to the volatility of the stock market we began requiring 6 months review with our Endowment Fund Manager. The market has had its ups and downs this last year but ended the year in an up position. As of 12-31-19 we have gained an increase in the endowment value by \$195,510.37, unfortunately \$120,000 was withdrawn from the fund to pay the church's expenses that left us with a gain of \$75,510.33. If it had not been for the fund valve increase of \$181,024.54 we would have decreased the endowment fund principle by a considerable amount. We must increase income and should not depend on the endowment to run the church.

Due to the timing of 2020 Stewardship deposits the 2019 income may appear artificially inflated. Standard practice has been to deposit checks in the year in which they are received. Unfortunately, by reviewing the 2020 budget the expected income is short by \$140,000 for meeting our expenses. To reduce the Endowment withdrawal amount for 2020 we need to find additional amounts and increase our income.

With help from our hard working people guided by our Heavenly Father we will continue the ability to have a healthy financial church.

PERSONNEL

This past year changes have taken place in both the office staff and the Christian Education department.

PROPERTY

The Property Team is tasked with performing or overseeing all aspects of facilities operations and maintenance related to Park Church's building and grounds, as well as Camp Hauser. This includes heating, cooling, electric, water, plumbing, and safety.

2019 has been another year full of activities. An open, welcoming facility of our size, while offering myriad opportunities, exerts demands on manpower and budget. While responsible for the facilities side of things, we're also called upon to assist groups and committees, both internal and community-based, with their functions throughout the year. These include weddings and funerals, the spring rummage and bake sales, spring grounds clean-up, the "kick-off to summer" chicken barbeque, various musical performances, Scout Pack 138, Finger Lakes Area chapter of Narcotics Anonymous, Alcoholics Anonymous, Daughters of the American Revolution, and many others.

Accomplishments this year include: coordinating service visits for various vendors – HVACR, pipe organ and piano, masons, painters, carpet cleaners, code enforcement; safety inspections of gas-fired boilers and chair-lifts and fire systems. We've continued conversion of interior CFL lighting to brighter, longer lasting, more efficient LED lights; assisted with space renovations for Family Promise; partnered with Scouts during spring cleanup/mulching; supported the Scouts in their Camp Hauser cabin upgrade and projects; trained new snow removal person; purchased carpet shampoo machine/vacuum cleaners and more.

Foremost on our schedule this past year has been investigating and coordinating the repair of the damaged roof truss in the east end of the southern roof. This has involved working with environmental testing, structural engineers, local code enforcement, heavy-beam and general construction contractors, insurance representatives and legal resources. As we approach the new year we're close to resolving this action and moving forward with repairs. This will allow us to re-open the 2nd and 3rd floors to church and community activities after being unavailable for the past calendar year.

Projects nearing completion or in the planning stages include: upgrade of dining room kitchen – including replacement of 10-burner stove and 2-door fridge and electrical outlet upgrades - Summer 2019 completion; installation of an exhaust fan/stove hood; repair of west exterior steps and landings – Fall 2019 completion; continued interior painting; improvements to the sanctuary sound system and training of additional sound techs; replacement of 80's vintage chair lifts to wheelchair lifts or a "limited use—limited access" elevator; portable information kiosk for lounge; sorting and organization of the basement, attic and other storage areas; identification and labeling of all electrical circuits, outlets, switches; installation of security cameras; creating work spaces in basement/boiler room for repair work; repair/replace bell tower chime controller; digital inventory of church contents and more.

Another on-going project is the documentation of all processes, operations and equipment in our church. This includes inspection schedules, owner manuals and operating instructions. Keeping everything organized, efficient and transparent is the best way to ensure our building is properly maintained and easy to understand. This paves the way for bringing new team members on-board quickly.

Our thanks to God and prior generations of Park Church members for this wonderful place of worship and community fellowship. Also, thanks to all who have volunteered their time and talents to make light work of tasks, however big or small. We sincerely appreciate your efforts.

KITCHEN RENOVATION

As you know the kitchen renovation has been a slow process. We, as a committee, have been cautious in the amounts we are spending to make the improvements. We have discussed the many options and tried to prioritize where work is most needed to have a more functioning kitchen. Our first improvement was to have the electricity updated to include more outlets, with each having a ground fault. We were then very fortunate in purchasing a used commercial stove and 115 padded chairs from the Lyons American Legion at an extremely great price. Our commercial refrigerator finally "gave up the ghost" after babying it for over a year. We then purchased a new 2 door from Ruffalo's, who removed the old one and installed the new one. We are now getting the stove hood and new vent fan measured and ordered. Wayne Smith has the dimensions and pieces cut out. Ruffalo is ordering the commercial exhaust fan to be inserted into the duct work. They are in the process of coordinating this and getting it all installed. At this time we have the monies to pay for their bills. We will then reevaluate what monies are left, and the next improvement we should make. We want to again thank the congregation so much for your trust and monies to help with this endeavor. We will continue to work carefully to stretch your special dollars.

We had a budget of \$2,000. The Mission Team donated \$250 to Camp Whitman, \$50 for a Shelter Box, \$100 to TIC for Bed City, \$62.07 minus \$19.96 for items refund for a total of \$42.11 for Wayne County Nursing Home residents birthday presents and \$14.85 for Food Closet bags.

FAMILY PROMISE

Family Promise in 2019 has actively brought about great blessings of sustainable housing for 14 families including 30 children. Park Church made four weeks of housing possible during the weeks of January 20th-27th, 2019; March 24th-31st, 2019; September 22nd-29th, 2019; and October 27th- November 3rd, 2019. Only the first week was completed at our church site due to a structural issue. The rest of the weeks were completed at the Day Center, the Newark Methodist Church and the East Palmyra Christian Reformed Church.

During each of those host weeks, our volunteers provided meals, transportation, setting up and taking down, washing of bedding and towels as well as hosting the families from Spm-7am each day. Park Church volunteers began the year with strong numbers. The first rotation included 14 families of volunteers from Park Church. The second and third rotations were accomplished with 8 families or persons from Park. Ten volunteers completed the fourth rotation along with 25 volunteers who served at the 4 rotations from the community in general.

Thank God for all these willing hearts and hands. We can only know that those who prayed for those involved in Family Promise brought great blessings to all who participated. In the New Year of 2020, Park Church has committed to the Family Promise mission for the weeks of March 22nd-29th, 2020; May 24th-31st, 2020; September 27nd- October 4th, 2020; and October 25th- November 1st, 2020. The place of these rotations will depend on Park's repair project.

Our Session has committed to the policy of needing 1 Park Church member to host overnights for each night of the rotations. Our records reflect that in the past year 5 church members have served as overnight hosts during the four rotations. Currently, we only have 4 of these people eligible as Park's representatives. In the coming year we will need more people from our congregation to overnight if we are to continue to host a rotation and satisfy our church's policy.

Jf you have not been through the training and feel called to participate in Family Promise in any way, please know that training sessions will be held at St. Michael's Church in Newark on Tuesday, January 28th, 2020 from 7-9pm and on Wednesday, January 29th, 2020 from 1-3pm. CE Coordinators (CEC): These responsibilities were assumed by the CE Team and pastor in the Fall of 2017 and continued until hiring of Angela Tirado Mosquera (February 2018 – June 2018) followed by Rev Ellen Donnan (September 2018 – May 2019) In August 2019 the CE Team voted to not move forward with hiring a new CE Coordinator. This decision was based on the a \$10,000+ investment being made for educating very few children of church families.

Nursery 2019: Emily Lang continued as a paid Nursery Supervisor. CEC, Rev Ellen furnished CE materials for use during the nursery time. Adult Nursery helpers were: Eileen Taylor, Stephanie Lang, Christine Stephens, Bonnie Hammond, Karen Cameron, and Paul Salisbury. Due to low infant numbers, nursery was to be made available on a need basis starting in September 2019.

Sunday School 2019 - A once A month program for children in grades 1 - 6 continued to be offered on the 2nd Sunday of every month from 3:00-4:30 p.m. called "ROCK" (Reaching Out for Christ to Kids). The highlight of the year was a Walk with Jesus Lenten activity held April 7, 2019 which included 5 stations: #1 Palm Sunday, #2 Last Supper, #3 Garden of Gethsemane, #4 Good Friday, #5 Easter/ Resurrection. This activity was held in the church dining room. CEC, Rev Ellen coordinated obtaining adult supervision and decorating for the event.

Sunday School_Kick-off - No Sunday School kickoff held in September due to lack of participants.

Adult Christian Education - A "Brown Bag Bible Study" on the book "He set his Face to Jerusalem" was led by Pastor Christopher in Feb-March.

PW Bible Studies continue to be led by Christine Stephens Topics: "God's Promise: I am With You", "A Fresh Look at the 10 Commandments", and "Love Carved in Stone".
