FROM THE PASTOR

"Be Still and Know I am God" -Psalm 46:10

The Psalm verse from above continues to run through my head most days. It serves as a reminder to me that God has a plan which has yet to be revealed to me and it's my time to sit still and wait. It reminds me to take a moment, to take some deep breathes and to know that I don't have to be in control of each and every moment of my life.

For many, the COVID pandemic has caused life to slow down. Abiding by the "stay in place" rules have long run their course for many of us and most of us are becoming anxious to get back to life as normal.

For me, my workload hasn't really lightened up but the stay in place mandate has cause me to shift my thinking process on how to do things. When planning worship, I need to think more about each aspect of the service. Am I on camera or off camera? Do I want that prayer on the screen? Oops, I need the lyrics printed out so people can read it while the music is playing. All of these small parts and pieces make me think about the details of the service much more.

Many of you have asked about what it's like to preach to an empty church. It's quite different preaching with just a camera man there. I've had to adjust how I reflect and project. My facial expressions and movements are lost to the camera for those of you watching at home. It's been a cycle of experimenting and trying new things and ideas. Each week we continue to make minor adjustments. I hope you are all enjoying the services.

I'm amazed at the number of people who view the service each week. We continue to have 200-300 views each week from all over the country (and

Family Promise is hoping to be back up and running from the new day center on Holly Street in Lyons by the middle of May . However, for May and June we will be hosting one or two families in an apartment in Savannah which we will rent with money from an emergency housing grant. The apartment is owned by Pastor Karen from the Methodist Church in Savannah and her husband. The families will be sheltering in place if need be.

Since the Park Church rotation is coming up on May 24-May 31 we will need to provide food for the families for the week as we would if they were housed at Park. Our goal is to have donated food dropped off at Anne Rogers' house and she and Carol will drive it to Savannah. Right now , the evening meals assigned to Park are for Wednesday , Friday and Saturday . Other Churches will be providing meals for the other days of the week and will be driven over also by us two or three times that week and left on their porch .

As the dates get closer we will make a menu and a list of food items needed for the family and ask if you might volunteer to provide some of the items.

The Family Promise board and staff are anxious to help folks with housing needs as much as we can.

If you would like to host at our next rotations the last week in September , or the last week in October please sign up for training on Zoom with the director being offered every Thursday at 2:00. The trainings last about one and a half hours . You may sign up by contacting Carol Thurston or Anne Rogers at 315 879 5478 . We will connect you with Graig , the director. We hope you will join us as we minister to those who need our help so much.

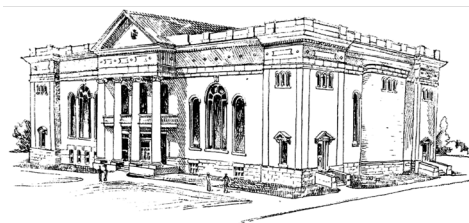
