Park Presbyterian Church’s present Mission/Vision Statements: **We will make Christ visible by believing, living, and sharing the word of God. PPC’s vision of ministry within the community is to be God’s light – a beacon of love, interaction, and guidance in faith and comfort.**

Matthew 7:24-27

²⁴ “Everyone then who hears these words of mine and acts on them will be like a wise man who built his house on rock. ²⁵ The rain fell, the floods came, and the winds blew and beat on that house, but it did not fall, because it had been founded on rock. ²⁶ And everyone who hears these words of mine and does not act on them will be like a foolish man who built his house on sand. ²⁷ The rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat against that house, and it fell—and great was its fall!”

As your interim, there are five Focus Points that we will pay attention to as we navigate this transition period together. They are heritage, leadership, mission, connections, and future.

Today, I will discuss Focus Point number one: Heritage.

What is Heritage?

One definition I found was: “Our *heritage* is what we have inherited from the **past**, to value and enjoy in the **present**, and to preserve and pass on to **future** generations.” Heritage has three important components: past, present, and future. Of course, we lean more on the past and the present, but we also must consider the future.

Robert Hoeltzel speaks to heritage in his final paragraph of his book, *A History of the Presbyterian Church, Newark, New York 1825-1980*. Hoeltzel says:

“In reading these pages as the Church approaches its third century, let us remember that ‘others have labored, and you have entered into their labor.’ The Church continues to need the prayers and devoted service of all its people-clergy and laity alike. The founders of 1825 may be saying to us today, ‘I laid a **foundation**, and another one is building upon it. Let each one take care how he builds upon it.’”

In my workshop, I have learned that the congregation's heritage, both corporate and individual, is the **foundation** upon which the present rests. Paying attention to heritage means encouraging and hearing all the stories about congregation's past and embracing the rich variety that makes up a particular congregation. What I noticed was that both Hoeltzel and my Interim Ministry Network workshops stress that Heritage has to do with **foundations**. Those foundations were laid in the past, have been maintained and enjoyed in the present, and it is our responsibility to both maintain and to pass this heritage on to the future. When we speak of foundations, we are not talking about an actual building. It has more to do with the core values, programs, community service, worship style, and decision making that have gone before and are present now. It has to do with our faith and our beliefs. How will we share those faith and beliefs with future generations?

As we consider Park Presbyterian's Heritage, I would like you to try the following activity.

First: Consider your church history by your pastors.

Second: For each pastor period that you can remember, I would like you to consider and to try answering the following questions:

- What was the community like? What was happening in the neighborhood? What was going on in the world?
- What was the congregation like? Size? Worship style? How were decisions made?
- What were significant events? Who were significant people?

Third: Some other questions to consider.

- How did the church understand your distinctive "calling" as a congregation? Clues:
 - Clergy strengths
 - Primary programs
- What was the church's paradigm for community service?

Soon, we will have a sharing session after church, and I would like you to bring your responses and we will share them in a group setting. These will help us to answer the question, "What does this tell us about our church?"

This past Sunday, January 23, 2022, I spoke of core values. I asked you to start sharing stories with one-another—happy, sad, funny, conflicted...I know

there was a concern from one member that these stories should be positive, but what I want to stress is that these stories name a core value. No matter the story, can you get to the core value of what is being relayed? Share some of the stories with me; send me a list of core values that you have identified with your stories. These too are a part of your Heritage. They will also help you to identify your Mission, which is another Focus Point that we will talk about in March or April.

During our session meeting the other night, Natalie left us with a thoughtful reflection from a book called *Joy in the Journey* by Guy Rice Doud. Doud writes from his own experience saying,

“God’s Holy Spirit will convict us of areas in our lives that are built on crumbling foundations...we need to surrender our feeling of being self-sufficient or we never come to experience true abundance.”

This reminded me of the passage from the Gospel of Matthew. The writer affirms, “Everyone then who **hears** these words of mine and **acts** on them will be like a wise man who built his house on rock. The rain fell, the floods came, and the winds blew and beat on that house, but it did not fall, because it had been founded on rock.” Our foundation as Christians is built on the Word of God. But it stresses that we cannot be hearers only. We must be doers to. Still, Doud reminds us that we must always do what we do in response to God’s initiative. The Holy Spirit moves us through the reading, hearing, and mediation on God’s word. God acts first; ours is a response to God’s grace. As you contemplate the questions concerning your heritage during different pastoral times in your history, and you contemplate the core values that come from your stories, remain open to the ways that the Spirit may inspire you as you seek to carry on the Heritage that is Park Presbyterian Church, Newark, NY. This is a first step in our journey through transition. I am so thankful to be here with you as you take this first step. It is part of the answer to the question, “Who are we?”

Financial Notes for January 2022

In prior financial reports, we have concentrated on the expenses of the church. This time the Finance Committee will report on the income. We have 34 members pledging to the church. These members are pledging \$52,044. That is an average per pledge of \$1,530 per year or a weekly pledge of \$29.43. Still, the church's total expenses for the year 2022 are estimated at \$199,248.

Session has approved the budget for 2022. It is \$144,552 over pledges. With no additional income, the expenses of the church will be drawn from the Endowment. Part of the Endowment is restricted in its use. There are three parts to the Endowment: restricted, semi-restricted and unrestricted. The only amount that the church can draw on without restrictions is the part classified as unrestricted. As of the end of December 2021 that part is valued at \$821,666. If the church takes \$144,552 out of the Endowment to run the church each year, the Endowment could be gone in about six years. The church would benefit from both an increased number of pledgers and an increase per pledge. If this were to happen, the church would be in a better position for the future. As a church member, would you prayerfully consider this challenge? In all things, we give thanks to God our provider, sustainer, and redeemer.

Thanks, also, to Natalie Lemmon and Deb McCrossen for their dedicated service as deacons, and to Sue Rowe for continuing her work with the deacons. Natalie will continue serving as an elder on Session.

The complete slate of candidates will be announced and voted on at the annual congregational meeting on Feb. 20th. We hope to see you there!

- Boiler replacement/startup in progress by Finger Lakes Comfort. Both new units are on-line with the existing boiler. Wrapping up the details.
- Changed thermostats in sanctuary to ramp up at 330AM to 70F and to continue heating during worship. Will turn the fans to 'LOW" at 955AM to maintain warmth and not disrupt the spoken word.
- Replaced remainder of smoke sensor batteries this month.
- The installation of hood, ductwork and exhaust fan will be completed by Lagana Plumbing. To be scheduled.
- Continuing to sort through collections of misc. stuff in basement.
- Sorting through miscellaneous supplies, etc. in the upper floors in preparation for creating an organized storage room for church files and possibly for Family Promise use - Rick has made great progress.
- Replaced battery in one east stairwell emergency light. Tested all other lights in bldg. – OK.

- Cleared sidewalks, parking areas and stairs after recent snowstorm. Snowblower working well. Andrew Joslyn has been shoveling/salting as needed.

Scheduled Maintenance

- Installed 2 new light switches for kitchen fluorescents.
- Boiler inspection every 2 years – due 12/22 by Hartford Steam Boiler 800-333-4677.

Miscellaneous

- No updates re: ongoing Camp Hauser investigation.
- Planning for replacement of stained vinyl flooring for 1st floor men's restroom landing and repair of adjacent wall plaster.
- Have several touchless paper towel dispensers and soap dispensers to be installed.


