#### **Family Promise:**

During the third quarter of this year, Family Promise provided services in the Apartment Program for 6 families, 21 people, and 15 children. One family graduated into stable housing. There has been an increase in applications over the last quarter; there is a current wait list of 28 families. FPWC is working with both community partners and families on the list as they wait to be serviced through the program. As you can see, there is a great need. Volunteers provided weekly Monday evening meals; the Newark Community provided the meal for the week of October 23<sup>rd</sup>.
