17.5 % or 6.1 hours is spent on Administrative Programming. This includes attending various team meetings like worship and music and finance, deacons, presbyterian women, task forces like Christian Fellowship, Mission, and Christian Education, running book/bible studies, and moderating session meetings.

13.5 % or 4.7 hours is spent on Pastoral Care. This includes counseling, calls, visitations, funerals, cards, grief books, care packages, and helping out with transportation to some dr. visits.

44% or 15.4 hours is spent on things related to Worship. This includes sermons, bulletins, prayers, announcements, lectionary planning, and Sunday morning worship.

I came up with this chart to help session. I am sharing it with all of you at the request of your session. You'll see that the first and second columns are what I explained above. The third and fourth columns are if you should hire a pastor for three-quarter's time or for half-time. At the last session meeting, I asked session to look at what I do and then consider what they would be willing to give up in a pastor in order to reduce the hours if Park Church were to decide they couldn't hire a full-time pastor. This is part of my job as interim—to get you discussing even the hard issues as you move forward. This is merely food for thought. My hope is only that the information I share gives you some idea of what I as a pastor do each week.

The Presbyterian Society of Newark

It was the spring of the historic year of 1825 that the residents of the Mud Mills area, who had been holding religious services in their community for at least 11 years, were joined by residents of the newer community of Newark and the area immediately south, in founding a Presbyterian Church.

On Monday the 27th day of July 1824 a meeting was held at the Mud Mills Schoolhouse, the meeting was called "for the purpose of organizing a Religious Society and electing Trustees for the same". The Society was to be called "The Presbyterian Society of Newark". This remained its legal name for over 130 years. The Rev. Ambrose Eggleston, who preceded the Rev Francis Pomeroy as pastor at East Palmyra, acted as chairman and Colonel Theodore Patridge was secretary.

Six trustees were elected: Samuel Soverhill, John G. Kanouse, Joseph Miller, Isaac Hathaway, Pliny Foster and Col. Theodore Patridge.

The meeting adjourned with a resolution that "the first annual meeting of the Society be held at the Newark Hotel in the Village of Newark on the first Tuesday in January 1826."

Minutes of the meeting of July 27, 1824, were recorded at Lyons as a certificate of incorporation by Pliny Foster on January 9, 1826.

Other history:

Col. Theodore Patridge has been elected Arcadia's first Town Clerk, the preceeding month.

The President of the United States in 1824 was James Monroe.

The Governor of New York State was Joseph C. Yates, of Schenectady, NY.

The Town of Arcadia was formed on February 15, 1825.

The Erie Canal was completed in 1825.

The Village of Newark had been settled in 1819 but did not incorporate in its present form until July of 1853.

Park Church has a long and well-documented history. In 2025 we look forward to celebrating the 200th anniversary of our founding and the start of our 3rd century of service.

Pentecost Offering: April 10-May 28th

The Pentecost Offering unites us in a church-wide effort to support young people and inspire them to share their faith, ideas, and unique gifts with the church and the world.

- Psalm 71 testifies that a foundation of faith established during childhood helps ensure lifelong faith and service. The patterns and lessons established during these formative years continue to bear fruit throughout a person's life. By receiving the Pentecost Offering, you are nurturing the faith of those who are the church to come children, youth, and young adults.
- A gift to the Pentecost Offering helps the church encourage, develop, and support its young people, and also address the needs of at-risk children. 40% of the Pentecost offering can be retained by individual congregations wanting to make an impact in the lives of young people within their own community. The remaining 60% is used to support children-at-risk, youth, and young adults through ministries of the Presbyterian Mission Agency.

There are little Pentecost houses in the lounge for change. The Pentecost Special Offering will be collected on May 28th. Notice that 40% stays in our community earmarked for helping our young people. Last year, the money collected went to the Back Pack Program.



Spiritual Gifts

1 Peter 4:10-11, "Like good stewards of the manifold grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received. Whoever speaks must do so as one speaking the very words of God; whoever serves must do so with the strength that God supplies, so that God may be glorified in all things through Jesus Christ. To him belong the glory and the power forever and ever. Amen."

In her book *Spiritual Leadership for Church Officers*, Joan S. Gray makes the following statements concerning spiritual gifts. (Pages 40-42)

- In today's church...the expectation often seems to be that all the spiritual gifts the congregation needs will be concentrated in the pastor.
- Effective leadership involves helping people find their spiritual gifts...AND encouraging them to put these gifts to work for God's sake.
 - We often draft people to do things for which they have no gifts or inclination.
 - God places people and gifts in the church to carry forward the kinds of mission GOD WANTS to happen.

The church's mission is shaped around the gifts God has given its members.

- 20% of the people do 80% of the work.
- **EVERY** member should be involved in ministry; Joan suggests encouraging members to look seriously at their gifts and make a pledge of time to a particular ministry in or through the church.

I had a "eureka" moment! It made sense. God gives Park Church the gifts needed for the ministry God wants to happen at this moment in time here and now. That means, we need to identify our Spiritual Gift and put it to work—and that means EVERY member. If you are interested...go to

to find out what your top three gifts are. This is just one site. Once you find out, consider what ministry of the church that gift could be used in. WE need you. When Joan says that 20% of the people do 80% of the work, that means that not everyone is using their gift toward the mission God wills. Imagine what could happen if EVERYONE was using their spiritual gifts in ministry and mission here at Park Church. What change might happen!

SOME IMPORTANT POINTS TO KNOW ABOUT SPIRITUAL GIFTS:

+ Spiritual gifts are special abilities God gives YOU to do God's work in the world. When you become a Christian, God gives you at least one spiritual gift—and usually more than one.

+ Spiritual gifts are NOT natural talents or acquired skills. You can't learn or earn spiritual gifts by any effort of your own; they're GIFTS from God.

Spiritual gifts are NOT for your own private benefit but for the common good. All of us are to use our unique spiritual gifts to serve God and others in specific ways both in the church and out in the world.
