Part I: "Giving and Stewardship"

Deuteronomy 16:17 "Everyone shall give as they are able, according to the blessing of the Lord your God which God has given you.

I have a lot of books on my shelves given to me at various times. There is enough reading to keep me busy for years. Still, once in a while, God uses the spirit to make a book stand out. The other day, it was a book called, *Giving and Stewardship in an Effective Church—a Guide for Every Member* by Kennon Callahan. I love the way Callahan offers simple definitions and understandings. His writing is down to earth. He starts his book by saying:

"Living is giving. We live life best as we give our strengths, gifts, and competencies in the service of God's mission. We are called to serve, not survive. Our giving makes a difference in our families, our work, our community, our world, and our church." (*Callahan*, 3)

Callahan is right. Our giving DOES make a difference. Here are some examples from this past year of how your "giving" made a difference for our "neighbors" here in Newark, NY and in surrounding communities.

When you contributed to the Little Red Wagon, you made a difference in the lives of people by providing much needed supplemental food. With food prices going up, those on fixed incomes or those seeking to feed larger families find themselves strapped. I had a man come into the church one day asking for food. I was able to let him take what he needed from bags in the Little Red Wagon. The other day, a man stopped in, and I was able to direct him to the Newark Food Pantry where most of our collected food goes. Unfortunately, I lost track of the number of bags of food we have sent to the Food Closet over the past year. You gave the Food Closet ten bags alone for Christmas last year.

When you contributed to Common Threads, you made a difference in the lives of people. Sarah Humphrey has mentioned how thankful families are to get free clothing for their children; they especially appreciate the underwear and socks. Those of you who purchased these in August know that the cost was higher than expected. For young families and those struggling to get by,



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the ability to afford children's clothing puts a strain on their budget. The Mission Task Force has decided that we will have another "Sock-It-To Me" collection for Common Threads in February. If you see socks or underwear on clearance—pick them up! Karen Doebler mentioned that one of the Haitian families brought in by Called to Care (Canandaigua) was so happy to come and get clothes for the children for school.

Other collections this year have made a difference in the lives of people. The Presbyterian Women have started collecting items for families brought in by Called to Care—bedding and household items. I have delivered items to Survivor Advocacy from donations left in the lounge. This makes a difference in the lives of women and children seeking a better way after experiencing domestic abuse. Those of you who contributed gifts or food to the Christmas Dinner at the Methodist Church put on by Together in Christ made a difference in the lives of those who attended who had no one to spend Christmas with. One woman spoke up during the dinner and was so glad to have someplace to go to be with others. Even the donation of coloring books and crayons made a difference in the lives of those who received them. Volunteers wrote of grandparents who picked them up for their grandchildren. The mittens, hats, and scarves on the Warming Tree went to both the Lake Ontario ABCD pre-school (Williamson) and to Survivor Advocacy. There were many smiling faces when they were delivered to the pre-school.

You are generous! Many of you donated your time and talent for different mission and activities here at Park Presbyterian Church. We had a K-2 Sunday School Program that ran from March through May which involved the time, talents, and dedication of 5 adults. Some of you donated your time to help with our newest mission project-the Children's Book Garden held five times this summer at the Village Market. Many of you donate your time and talents as you do visitations, help with the set-up of the yearly rummage sale, sing in the choir, play bells, or volunteer your time to help cook soup or quiche or to help with other fundraisers. Even more of you volunteer your time serving on church teams that support mission, education, fellowship, and worship.

Many of you not only give to the church, donate items for mission, give of your time and your talents, but you also give to the four special offerings-the Joy Offering, the One Great Hour of Sharing Offering, the Pentecost Offering, and the Peace and Global Witness Offering. 25% of the Peace and Global Witness Offering stays with our local congregation. This past year, \$605 dollars was collected for the Peace and Global Witness Offering. \$151.25 stayed locally. In 2022, Session voted to donate this amount to the Survivor Advocacy Center of the Finger Lakes, Inc. There have also been other spontaneous collections for Disaster Assistance and in each case, you have been more than generous!

News from Park Presbyterian Women:

Park Church Women successfully completed their Quiche dinner raising over \$570.00!!! The proceeds will benefit the Newark Food closet and other local charities.

Additionally, Park Women continue to partner with Call to Care, a Canandaigua non-profit sponsoring refugees from Haiti, Ukraine, Guatemala, and Sudan. The not for profit has already successfully homed several families, and they're expecting several more in the immediate future. Over the summer, when the program had a family from Haiti arrived unexpectedly, Park Women quickly collected a second round of items such as queen and twin sheet sets, including mattress covers, towels, and blankets. The list of items needed for any new family's household is much more expansive including almost any item needed to set up a new home. The list includes furniture (beds, kitchen table and chairs, lamps) and kitchen supplies, (such as dishes, pots and pans, baking dishes, utensils, and measuring cups). From the Mission Team: Update on the Farmer's Market Book Garden

We had a small but dedicated team of volunteers helping set up the booth and distribute coloring books, crayons, children's books and Bibles. Each week we were there, we ran out of the coloring books and many of the children's books from the Book Sale in the Dining Hall and several Bibles were also given away. One of our volunteers helped a mother pick out a Bible for her 14-year-old son!

There many positive aspects to the event. Many volunteers appreciated the opportunity to be among the town's people and interacting with them. All the kids were excited to get FREE books and crayons, and many grandparents asked if they could get some for their grandchildren. Several parents were pleased that there were easy to read bibles for the kids, and both children and adults seemed genuinely pleased to get something to pass the summer days away.

Interestingly, our volunteers also spoke of being energized and enjoying the experience. Personally, when I volunteered, I was blessed with the company of one young girl and her little brother who came and sat with me. Overall, we believe the mission was very successful and we hope to repeat it next summer.







Season of Peace: September 3-October 1, 2023

Sponsored by the PCUSA, this month-long pilgrimage is designed to deepen the pursuit of peace for congregations, small groups, households, and individuals. This season is a time of growth, encouragement, challenge, inspiration, and education. Participants are invited to define and deepen their calling as peacemakers.

On **Sunday, October 1, 2023**, we welcome Claire Green who will speak during the worship service. Claire is writing a book about her life experiences growing up as a black woman and will address firsthand the issue of racism and how it has affected her family. Claire has been part of Narcotics Anonymous and was instrumental in helping to form a new group on Monday nights called Back to Basics. She has since left the group to focus on her personal growth and the writing of her book. In our commitment to peacemaking, we are addressing the issue of racism.

Peace and Global Witness Offering: World-wide Communion on October 1, 2023

The Peace and Global Witness Offering draws us together by providing education and exposure to those who show us how to do peacemaking well. It allows us to create resources for dealing with conflict and provide nurturing reconciliation, and stand in support of our global siblings, because the peace of Christ belongs to people everywhere.

On World Communion Sunday, we celebrate that Christ's peace extends throughout all creation. Whenever the church gathers for worship, we are assured of Christ's peace. We celebrate that we are connected, we are loved and we are not alone. We worship together and are fed from Scripture and at Christ's table of peace. Extending the peace of Christ is part of an active, engaged faith—a witness to what it means for us to be the Church, together.

Through participation in the Peace and Global Witness Offering, our church is extending Christ's peace throughout our community and our world. We begin at the communion table, with our siblings in every time and place, and we celebrate the peace we find there and commit to building a more just and peaceful world. God is with us...and God in Christ is with us through the Sacrament of Communion, celebrated on World Communion Sunday. We are not alone. Peace begins with each of us.

25% of the Offering stays with local congregations, and 25% with mid councils to unite congregations to support peacemaking in their regions. 50% of this Offering supports the work for peace and reconciliation being done by Presbyterians across the globe.

<u>Christian Education</u>: Interest has been shown in the following **5 ways of praying**; I'll be contacting those who signed up and once days and times are set, these will be posted in case others want to join.

Praying in Color: Praying in Color uses doodling and coloring to get still and listen to God.

Visio Divina: an ancient form of Christian prayer in which we allow our hearts and imaginations to enter into a sacred image, in silence, to see what God might have to say to us.

Praying in Psalms: Learn to simply, *honestly express faith, questions, praise & fears* in a personal psalm. **Praying with Protestant Beads**: Praying with beads adds a tactile component to your prayers. The act of holding the beads and moving from one bead to the next brings focus to your prayers.

5 Finger Prayer/ACTS/PRAY:

A format that allows *children* and adults to recall and pray in their own words for five different groups of people.

ACTS is an acronym that stands for adoration, confession, thanksgiving, and supplication (or supply needs).

Four aspects of prayer based on the Lord's Prayer can provide a structure and flow for your prayer life.

<u>Laurel House</u>: Laurel House is a not-for-profit volunteer community organization in Newark, NY, formed with its first meeting on November 7, 2014, and incorporated in May 2015. The idea of Laurel House, a volunteer-driven home providing free end-of-life care for Wayne County residents and their families, originated decades ago with Jean Cass, a nurse who watched one of her dear friends succumb to a difficult death from breast cancer. Jean's passion for a better way to care for the dying brought about the comfort care home, the House of John in Clifton Springs and was the impetus for doing the same in Newark.
