News from the Interim

Proverbs 3:5-6 *“Trust in the LORD with all your heart, and do not rely on your own insight. In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths.”*

I was reading an Upper Room devotion. In it, the woman mentioned a plaque inscribed with the quote: “The will of God will never lead you where the grace of God cannot keep you.” This spoke to me. I decided to see where it came from. Apparently, there is more to the quote. The whole quote, by Neil T. Anderson is: “Being filled and led by the Spirit may take you places you never planned. But the will of God will never lead you where the grace of God cannot keep you.”

I think of the Apostle Paul. Saul of Tarsus met Jesus Christ, the risen Lord, on the road to Damascus. Saul was headed there to persecute Christians. He never dreamed that he would meet the risen Lord that day; this experience “changed” Saul. In fact, we know him as Paul; his name was changed. Saul was “led” by the Spirit to places he never planned on going. Saul was a Pharisee who prided himself on his heritage and on following all the Jewish laws—both written and oral. He considered himself “righteous.” His encounter with the risen Christ changed his thinking; Paul felt called to the Gentiles—to those non-Jews. His journeys took him all over the Roman Empire at the time. And through it all, Paul felt the presence of the risen Lord with him—the grace of God providing, guiding, and inspiring him.

Think back on your own life. Have there been times when you were “led” by the Spirit to places you never planned on going? This doesn’t mean that these times or experiences were a piece of cake; it also doesn’t mean that they weren’t enjoyable. For myself, I never planned on being divorced and re-married. I never planned on being a single parent—even for a few years. I never planned on three sons. I was supposed to have one boy and one girl. God deemed I would have three sons and no daughters! I never actually planned on going back to my home church after I was married—but I went back and supported them for thirty-two plus years. I never planned on my home church closing. I never planned on moving back to Rochester. I never planned on getting a seminary degree. I never planned on becoming an interim pastor. Are you getting the

idea???? Those of you who know me know that I often say—it is easier to look back and see how God was at work in journey than it is when you are seeking a way forward—and wondering what that next best step will be.


Park Presbyterian Church has experienced a lot of change in the past twenty years. Not all the last twenty years have been bad. There are a lot of good things that came out of this time. But there have been some struggles—some conflicts—some estranged relationships—etc. Park Church never planned on having five pastors in a twenty-year period. Park Church never planned on the loss of membership—of dis-illusioned and disgruntled congregants who left. Park Church never planned on losing some of its strongest leaders. Park Church never planned on growing older. As human beings, we tend to look on this as “negative” but is it possible that Park has been “led” by the Spirit to places it never wanted to go—to be more reliant on the grace of God?

Park Presbyterian Church has turned a corner. You are stepping forward in faith. Not leaning on your own insight, you are “trusting in the Lord.” You are allowing God to lead you forward—AND, you are counting on the grace of God as you entrust your future to God. Already, the signs are evident. The mere fact that I have a new membership class is one sign of “life.” You have people who WANT to join Park Presbyterian Church. Praise God! On April 21, 2024, you will welcome SIX members—two by letter of transfer, one by re-instatement, and three new members along with one baptism. The Pastor Nominating Committee has formally started its work in looking for your next “just right” pastor who will lead you on the next leg of your journey. I wasn’t sure anyone would want to be on a PNC—but you have FOUR dedicated persons. Again, praise God! When other churches are asking for waivers of term limits for their ruling elders, Park Church has a good size session with NINE dedicated session members; we almost always have 100% attendance at session meetings. Again, praise God! Park Church has a strong music ministry; few churches have bell choirs these days. You have a strong leader in Natalie—and a wonderful bell choir. Organists/pianists are not easy to come by and you have a wonderful and dedicated organist/pianist in Kay Oosterling. You have a talented and dedicated choir director in Sarah Humphrey. Again, you have something to praise God about!

I bring you back to the quote: “Being filled and led by the Spirit may take you places you never planned. But the will of God will never lead you where the grace of God cannot keep you.” God has not let Park Presbyterian Church down; God has never left. Eclipse Information

Newark, NY April 8—3:21:01PM

The centerline of the eclipse enters New York over Lake Erie at approximately 2:03pm EDT, with totality beginning in that location at about 3:16pm EDT.

The path of totality traces a grand arc across western and northern New York, crossing both large cities and high peaks. Although New York shares the eclipse with Canada for the length of its journey across the state, most of the width of the path belongs to New York and the centerline travels through the Empire State exclusively.

When it enters the state, the centerline is still over Lake Erie, but it soon touches land again when it crosses directly over Buffalo. So often the punchline of jokes, Buffalo gets the last laugh on April 8 with a very lengthy duration of totality lasting for about 3 minutes and 45 seconds downtown. Just north of Buffalo, you can be sure that scores of people will want to witness the show in the sky with one of Earth's great natural wonders as a backdrop. It will be a surreal experience in Niagara Falls USA where totality will last for about 3 minutes and 31 seconds in the downtown area. As it does in Pennsylvania and Ohio, Interstate 90 parallels the centerline along the shore of Lake Erie in western New York all the way to Buffalo.


The centerline doesn't stay over dry land for long. It soon heads out into open water again, this time Lake Ontario. As is the case with Lake Erie to the west, weather experts think the cold lake waters could aid eclipse viewers by preventing clouds from forming above and around the lakes. On the southern shore of Lake Ontario, Rochester is very close to the centerline at this point and totality will last for about 3 minutes and 39 seconds in the downtown. After crossing through the Finger Lakes region of New York, the eclipse crosses over Syracuse. Situated near the eastern limit of the path, Syracuse will get about 1 minute and 24 seconds of totality downtown, but longer durations can be reached by driving north on Interstate 81, which meets up with the centerline.

As it reaches the eastern shore of Lake Ontario, the centerline once again touches down on New York soil and the path of totality heads across northern New York to the Adirondack Mountains. The Adirondacks promise to be one of the most scenic places to view the 2024 eclipse, but high elevations can produce clouds and the weather in early April could be unpredictable in this part of the country. Many of the beautiful mountain lakes, which otherwise would be the perfect setting for an eclipse viewing, might still be frozen during this time of the year. Make sure to check short-term weather forecasts for the region in the days leading up to the eclipse.

Lake Champlain stretches across the entire width of the eclipse path in New York and will offer plenty of scenic viewing opportunities. Interstate 87 bisects the eclipse path as it parallels Lake Champlain and the border with Vermont and will

make getting into totality easy for travelers coming up from downstate New York.

The centerline of the eclipse exits the state as it crosses Lake Champlain at approximately 4:37pm EDT, with totality coming to an end in that location at about 3:29pm EDT. From the Pennsylvania-New York border to the New York-Vermont border, the Moon's shadow travels approximately 359 miles along the centerline in 8 minutes and 57 seconds at an average speed of 2,405 miles per hour.



PENTECOST OFFERING: (collected on May 19, 2024)

Pentecost arrives 50 days after Easter and 10 days after the Ascension. Jesus and the Scripture are making an important theological point at Pentecost. Jesus ascends and the church is born. If his mission and ministry is to continue, it is upon us, his disciples, to keep it going, and we have the Holy Spirit to lead us, who blesses us all with different gifts to be used at different times and in different ways. Our gifts to the Pentecost Offering connect with God's hope and future, supporting ministries with children, youth, and young adults by building a life of faith.

Congregations keep 40% of raised funds to initiate or support programs for young people in their communities.

Facts:

The Day of Pentecost is referred to as the birthday of the Church.

Pentecost is usually represented by the color red, which symbolizes the fire of the Holy Spirit.

CHURCH SEASONS: SEASON OF EASTER

From the *Book of Common Worship (2018)*:

“Easter” comes from an old English word related to dawn and shining. At Easter we stand in the light of the resurrection to see a new creation, transformed by the grace and glory of God. We celebrate the presence and power of the risen Christ in his church, proclaiming his good news through Word and Sacrament. We rejoice in the gift of the Holy Spirit, who is the “Lord and giver of life.” In the fullest sense, Easter is a new way of life, in which we are “dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus” (Rom. 6:11); for this reason, it is an especially appropriate time to celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism.

The Resurrection of the Lord is the center of the Christian year, and the good news we proclaim on this day is the very heart of the gospel. Easter Sunday is something like the keystone of an arch—the top and center stone upon which all the others lean and depend—in terms of both its theological significance and its relation to other festivals and season. Theologically, the faith we claim and the life we live depend on the affirmation, celebration, and proclamation of Christ’s resurrection.

As with Christmas, Easter refers not only to a single day, but to a whole season of celebration in the Christian year. The season of Easter spans the fifty days between the Resurrection of the Lord and the Day of Pentecost, and encompasses the Ascension of the Lord. The seven weeks of the Easter season make up a “week of weeks”: a symbol in time of the fullness and abundance of God’s grace. In ancient practice, fasting and kneeling were forbidden during the weeks of Easter. In this most joyful season, we celebrate the great mystery of our faith—that Jesus Christ is risen from the dead.

into the immense world of your love.

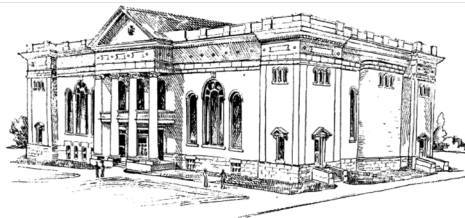
