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Sunday, April 20, 2025, is Park Presbyterian Church's **200th Birthday!** Planning is just beginning. It wasn't too long ago that I realized that April 20th falls on Easter. I had already asked Natalie about changing the Rummage Sale; the Rummage Sale will be April 10, 11, and 12th in 2025. Bill Doebler suggested a two-day celebration. I am going to suggest to the planning committee that they consider the two-day celebration with speakers, tours, and snacks on Saturday, April 26, 2025, and a special worship service and festivities on Sunday, April 27, 2025, to stay away from Easter weekend as many spend this time with their families.

We have begun sign-ups for the **200th CELEBRATION TEAM**. It's not too late to volunteer to help! As I said last month, it will take a village! We need people who might be interested in the following:

- **Invitations**. This subcommittee would be responsible for coming up with a list—a "Homecoming" list—creating an invitation, finding addresses, and sending out the invitations.
- **Refreshments**. This subcommittee would be responsible for soliciting and preparing the food—along with planning out where—in the lounge or downstairs—how many tables, chairs, party favors, table decorations, plates/cups/silverware, etc.
- Artifacts. This subcommittee would be responsible for gathering historical information from around the church—there is a lot stored in different places—and collecting pictures, writings, articles, anything that represents the past 200 years—and planning a display—and possible tour of the church where some artifacts—glass windows—etc. can be found in



the church. It was suggested that I talk with our Streaming Technician to see if he might put together a special video presentation...which would also fall under this category.

- **Worship Service/Speaker (s)**—would this be one, or would you have a special worship service with a speaker (s) at different times leading up to April 26 and 27th? This subcommittee would make these decisions—and work with the pastor in putting together the worship service for the day-Sunday, April 27, 2025.
- **The Cornerstone**. This subcommittee would work on fleshing out some ideas that the Bridgebuilder's Committee had a couple of years ago—creating a little area on the corner of PPC Property across from the Mailbox—with a stone—that Josh McCrossen has found and is ready to donate, engraved or with an engraved plague siting the cornerstone passage—and possible brickwork with garden and engraved bricks with names on them.

I am going to be writing about different aspects of your history—most of it will be taken from parts of Robert L. Hoeltzel's book published in 1982. Still, there is history beyond this.

Installment #2: The Presbyterian Society of Newark-The Early Days

The Building:

For the first two and a half years, the church met between the old schoolhouse at Mud Mills and the schoolhouse at Newark. At a meeting on January 9, 1827, it was voted "that this Society build a house of Worship after the pattern of the Presbyterian Meeting House in Waterloo which is 60 feet long and 45 feet wide." At the same meeting, it was noted "that this Society accept the site offered by Joseph Miller which is east and adjoining the public square." Church records show that the Society paid \$100 to Joseph Miller, a trustee of the church, and his wife Polly, through a deed executed April 9, 1828.

The corner stone was laid during the month of June 1827. It contained "The records of the church with some American silver coin amounting to something less than five dollars." This cornerstone was pried off the foundation and the money taken out by parties unknown shortly after. John Kanouse and Benjamin Jenkins built the church. The wood came from Abraham Fairchild on the Fairville Road. The church was rectangular in design and painted white. It faced the park. There were two rows of four windows on either side and two rows of windows of the same size in the rear. The steeple rose from the front gable in two sections. The entrance had two steps and a platform a little wider than the doorway which opened into a vestibule. The floor extended across the church its whole interior width. The main auditorium was entered from the vestibule by two doors, one on each side of the pulpit. The main floor contained four rows of pews painted white. There were sixty-two pews in all. These pews were largely the private property of their occupants; the sale of the pews funded the building of the church. Staircases on either side led to an upper floor with entrance to the gallery. The gallery extended along the sides and across the east end—supported by large pillars. The choir occupied the east end of the gallery. On this level there was a room used for session meetings, prayer, meetings, etc.

The meeting house was completed and dedicated in the Fall of 1827. The first Session meeting was held on December 7, 1827. This house of worship was used for twenty-five years. During the first two years there was no heat in the meeting house except for the foot-warmers brought by some individual members of the congregation. About 1828, Samuel Tracy began leading the singing using a tuning fork. There was no instrumental accompaniment.

The Pastors/Leadership:

For the first year and a half after the founding of the church, there was no regular pastor. Various preachers conducted the services. The Rev. Benjamin Bailey (the window 'Christ in the Temple' was given by his de-





scendants) moderated six of the earliest Session meetings. He was one of two ministers who served the church. The Rev. Mr. Beardsley presided over the first Holy Communion on Sunday, August 14, 1825. He also baptized Henry Theodore—the son of Theodore and Electa Partridge on Friday, August 12, 1825. Before the arrival of the first settled pastor, the church added twenty-five members, nine of whom joined by letter from other churches, and sixteen after membership training. There were five dismissals, and three deaths, increasing the membership from sixty-three to eighty. Peter Cook and Deacon John Kanouse were elected ruling elders on August 12, 1825. The session was thus increased from three to five members.

The first pastor was the Rev. Alfred Campbell. He was installed on Wednesday, November 27, 1826. This was dissolved in September of 1828. His successor was the Rev. Peter Kanouse. He was installed on Wednesday, September 17, 1828. He remained until the Fall of 1830. James Boyle was an evangelist. He was never installed as a pastor. Still he filled a gap—leaving Newark sometime between June and September of 1831. Henry Snyder acted as Stated Supply for five or six months. He left sometime between April and May of 1832. The Rev. Jospeh Ware was never installed. He served as State Supply for three years. George Washington Elliott was installed in August of 1835 after a re-organization of the church in April of 1835. He served about one year. The Rev. David Cushing was installed in 1837. This relationship was dissolved in 1843. The church had become seriously divided and in serious financial straits during his pastorate.

The Members/Congregation:

By 1832, membership was listed as 240. In 1835, the Society was reorganized. There was no change in ecclesiastical organization—but the minutes did include that they voted to proceed and organize a Religious Society. This would be known and distinguished as the Presbyterian Society of Newark. They elected five Trustees. In 1837, they hired a sexton to build fires, to light, and to take care of the meeting house on a part-time basis. In 1838 a Sunday School was organized. In 1844, when Rev. Shumway arrived, the church had a membership of 230. What I did note in the reading over and over, was the church's struggle with mon-ey—with paying pastors and paying the sexton, with keeping up with repairs and brainstorming ways to raise funds. Rev. Cushing had encouraged the building of the bell tower and the buying of the bell—and put personnel funds toward this—so much so that the congregation owed him for the bell when they dissolved their relationship. I also notice a great number of turn-overs of pastors—but perhaps this was way back then. Perhaps Rev. Shumway's description of Newark upon his arrival helps us to understand.

"The population of Newark was about eighteen hundred...No railroad had been built; packets and freight-boats on the canal, and the cumbrous stage, were means of travel and transportation. There was no electric telegraph nor line of express, and news was brought by packet and stage. There were in the village five places of worship-the Methodist Episcopal, Presbyterian, Baptist, Reformed Dutch, and Universalist."


