

News from the Interim: Sunday, April 20, 2025, is Park Presbyterian Church's **200**th Birthday!



Praise the LORD!

It's time to plan a celebration!

Park Presbyterian Church was organized on April 20, 1825. Your 200th Celebration is fast approaching!

I was talking with the Christian Fellowship Team, and they gave me some great ideas—but I need PEOPLE who like to CELEBRATE and who would be willing to form a 200th CELEBRATION TEAM. It's just like when you plan a party—a birthday party or anniversary or a wedding—there are invitations to send out, there's food to plan, and there are "decorations" to set/put-up. Perhaps unlike a birthday or anniversary, there is a consideration for possible speakers. And, on top of this, because this church was formed two-hundred years ago to provide worship in a particular context for the community Newark—the team must make sure that the praise goes to God, the Son, and the Holy Spirit—who have worked in and through the gifts and talents of various pastors, parishioners-members and non-members alike, and through those that have supported the church in many different forms throughout all those years. That is one reason we are considering one other idea—that of a "cornerstone" re-

dedicating the church and the work of the congregation to the mission of Jesus Christ here and now—because Park Presbyterian Church is still here—and that can only be by God's design. So, I believe that this means that there is still work that God wishes done by PPC here in the community of Newark.

The Christian Fellowship Team suggested forming ONE TEAM from which there would be subcommittees who would be responsible for ONE of the following five items:

- Invitations. This subcommittee would be responsible for coming up with a list—a "Homecoming" list—creating an invitation, finding addresses, and sending out the invitations for the BIG day—which just happens to fall on a Sunday of all days! April 20, 2025.
- **Refreshments**. This subcommittee would be responsible for soliciting and preparing the food for the BIG day—along with planning out where—in the lounge or downstairs—how many tables, chairs, party favors, table decorations, plates/cups/silverware, etc.
- **Artifacts**. This subcommittee would be responsible for gathering historical information from around the church—there is a lot stored in different places—and collecting pictures, writings, articles, anything that represents the past 200 years—and planning a display—and possible tour of the church where some artifacts—glass windows—etc. can be found in the church. It was suggested that I talk with our Streaming Technician to see if he might put together a special video presentation…which would also fall under this category.
- **Worship Service/Speaker (s)**—would this be one, or would you have a special worship service with a speaker (s) at different times leading up to April 20th? This subcommittee would make these decisions—and work with the pastor in putting together the worship service for the day-Sunday, April 20, 2025.
- **The Cornerstone**. This subcommittee would work on fleshing out some ideas that the Bridge-builder's Committee had a couple of years ago—creating a little area on the corner of PPC Property across from the Mailbox—with a stone—that Josh McCrossen has found and is ready to donate, engraved or with an engraved plague siting the cornerstone passage—and possible brickwork with garden and engraved bricks with names on them.

There will be a sign-up sheet in the lounge listing the five categories. We need more than one or two people—as you can see, it will take "a village." Please sign-up under your category of interest. If you know someone in our community who might like to help—like a historian—please ask them if they might consider helping out!

I am going to be writing about different aspects of your history—most of it will be taken from parts of Robert L. Hoeltzel's book published in 1982. Still, there is history beyond this.

Installment 1:

Park Presbyterian Church was **organized on Wednesday**, **April 20**, **1825**, as the Presbyterian Church of Newark, Wayne County, New York. It was formally organized by a commission appointed for the purpose by the Presbytery of Geneva. The commission consisted of the Rev. Francis Pomeroy and Elder Ambrose Grow, both of East Palmyra, and the Rev. Henry P. Strong and Elder Enoch Wing, both of Oaks Corners (then called Phelps). There were sixty-three charter members of the Newark Church-thirty-seven from the Church of East Palmyra, twenty-three from the Oaks Corners Church, and three from other churches.

Three ruling elders and two deacons were elected. Arnold Franklin, Pliny Foster, and Theodore Partridge. Theodore was named Clerk of the Session. Arnold Franklin and John Kanouse were elected Deacons. Mr. Kanouse was ordained as part of the day's proceedings.

The following Articles of Faith and a Covenant were presented by the Commissioners from the Presbytery and were duly adopted and subscribed to by the charter members. (remember...these come from 200 years ago!)

Confession of Faith:

- You Believe, That there is one God, who is infinitely perfect, and is the Creator, Preserver, and Governor of all things: That this one God exists mysteriously in three persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, who are the same in substance, and equal in all perfections.
- That the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament are the Word of God, and are the only rule of faith and practice.
- That our first Parents were made perfectly holy; but, by disobedience, fell from the state in which they were created: in consequence of which, all their posterity are, by nature, entirely sinful
- That God, in his infinite and sovereign mercy, has provided a Saviour, even Jesus Christ, his dearly beloved Son, who having become incarnate, by his obedience honored the law, and by his death made a complete atonement for the sin of the whole world: So that, all who belie in Him obtain the forgiveness of their sins, and a sure title to eternal life.
- That salvation is freely offered to all: but that all mankind are naturally so depraved, and such perfect enemies of God and the Saviour, that no one will repent of sin and believe in Christ, until God, according to his eternal purpose give him a new heart by the sovereign and efficacious influence of his Holy Spirit.
- That all true believers persevere in faith and holiness, being kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.
- That the Law of God, which requires perfect holiness of heart and life, is the rule which Christians are bound to observe.
- That Baptism and the Lord's Supper are Christian ordinances: the latter oof which is to be administered to professing believers: and the former to them, and to their households.
- That at the end of the world, there will be a Resurrection of the bodies, of all mankind, and a day of Judgement; when Christ, the Judge, will sentence the wicked to endless punishment, and receive the righteous to life everlasting.

Covenant

You do now, in the presence of the dread Majesty heaven and earth, the Searcher of all hearts, and

before his people solemnly profess to give up yourselves to God, the Father, Son and Holy Ghost. You choose Him for your God, your Father, your Saviour and your Sanctifier.

You renounce all ways of sin as what you truly abhor; and choose the Service of God as your greatest privilege.

You promise, in humble dependence on Divine Grace, to live soberly, righteously and piously, denying all ungodliness and every worldly lust.

You promise and covenant that so long as God, in his holy Providence, shall permit you to remain among us, you will treat the Members of this church with Christian watchfulness and brotherly affection; that you will attend upon it Institutions and Ordinances; Submit to its Discipline; Seek its Prosperity and Peace and that in all your conduct you will adorn the doctrine to God and your Saviour.

With the adoption of the Confession Faith and Covenant, the Church was born, and the meeting was adjourned.


