News from the Interim:

“To everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven. A time to be born and a time to die, a time to plant and a time to up-root” ([Ecclesiastes 3:1-2](#)).

200th CELEBRATION Update: The 200th Celebration Team will be meeting for the first time after church on Sunday, September 22, 2024. If you are interested, just come to the meeting—whether you signed up or not! There is lots of work BUT lots of fun too!

200th CELEBRATION-Installment #4: 1900-1980 (taken from Robert L. Hoeltzel’s book published in 1982).

The Building:

In 1902, a “hood” was built over the south entrance to the church. After the death of the Burgesses, the studios of Haskins and Collyer of Rochester were commissioned to design and install a stained-glass window which was placed in the north wall and dedicated on Easter Sunday, April 12, 1903. In 1907, it was necessary to enlarge the choir loft as the choir had increased in size.

At the annual meeting on January 5, 1914, there was a resolution to take steps to erect a suitable church edifice. On April 8, 1915, the plans were accepted and adopted by the church and the Trustees were empowered to make arrangements to facilitate the work of the new building. A prominent Rochester architect, Henry Larzelere, was chosen to design the new church. Charles VanBuren was engaged as general contractor. The cornerstone of the new church was laid on July 30, 1915. The following documents were placed in the box in the cornerstone: Names of former pastors, names of all ruling elders, the deacons, the Trustees, the Plans committee, the Building committee, the Finance Committee, the list of all Subscribers, the Financial Statement of 1915, the Program of the Semi-Centennial 1875, the Roll of the Church, the Local Newspapers, a Form of pledge to the Building Committee, a Certificate of payment, a Photograph—interior and exterior of Old Church, a copy of the church Bulletin and a copy of the Program of Laying the Cornerstone.

A new sanctuary was erected to the north of the old church. Directly behind the new sanctuary, and opening into it by six sliding doors, was the main Sunday School room, built after the “Akron Plan” with a semi-circular balcony. A veneer of stucco covered both the older and the new portions of the building; a

new façade of classic design joined the two parts of the building. The organ was rebuilt by C. M. Topliff of Rochester—with a new console, new case, and four new stops. Stained-glass windows were designed and installed by M.T. Lamb of Brooklyn. The pulpit furniture and the pews were constructed by the Dittmar Furniture Co. of Williamsport, Pennsylvania. The total cost was \$72,000. The church was dedicated on February 4, 1917.

In 1947, the dome in the sanctuary was lowered with new light, and the ceiling of the entire sanctuary covered with acoustical tile. The church kitchen was remodeled in 1950. A public address system was installed in the sanctuary in 1954. New carpeting was laid in the sanctuary in 1956. The stuccoed exterior of the church was painted for the first time in the 1960's.

The auditorium could seat 1,000 people; it was the largest auditorium in the village at the time. Beginning in 1919, and continuing for the next twenty years, the Presbyterian Church auditorium was used for all commencement exercises of Newark High School. In 1947, Warner Landfield expressed the need for modern, expanded facilities for the growing Church School. Construction began in early Spring of 1956. What was the old Play Room became the lobby, lounge, and kitchenette; the old office became the pastor's study; the old Nevin Class room provided space for two offices; the old Beginner's Rom and men's restroom were removed and a chapel built; a new men's restroom was built and the ladies' restroom was remodeled. The two floors above were rebuilt along completely new floor plans to provide rooms for the Church School restrooms, storage space and corridors. A fire wall was built where the old folding doors between the sanctuary and Sunday School had been. New entries were built on the South and East sides of the building; new fire-resisting stairwells were installed on the East and West ends of the building, necessitating the elimination of the East balcony. A completely new heating system was installed, and the front steps were rebuilt. The total cost was approximately \$192,000, not including the furnishing of the chapel. The new facilities were dedicated on Sunday, October 14, 1956. The chapel was dedicated on April 7, 1957.

At a congregational meeting on September 24, 1967, the congregation authorized the purchase of a new pipe organ and the renovation of the chancel, redecoration of the main auditorium and other improvements in the main auditorium. The Tellers Organ Co. of Erie, Pennsylvania built a completely new pipe organ and console in the chancel, renovated the echo organ, moved the chimes to the echo organ chamber, and built an antiphonal organ from parts of the old organ. The organ has 19 stops and 23 ranks. The entire organ has 1, 852 pipes. New lighting fixtures were installed, an arch built over the organ chamber, the pews renovated, and the entire sanctuary redecorated. The new chancel and organ and renovated sanctuary were dedicated on December 8, 1968.

The formation of the Handbell Choir was prompted by the gift of a set of Schulmerich Handbells in 1968. In 1966, Harry Chapman deeded 35.435 acres of land on the Bluecut Road, known as the Hauser Farm, to be used by Boy Scouts and Girl Scout Troops for camping or for teaching of youth.

The dining room was renovated in 1977 with a new ceiling and new lighting. New front doors were installed on the north side of the church in 1978. A chairlift was dedicated in 1978. On August 24, 1980, a cabinet to display the Communion silver, was dedicated. It is mounted on the back wall of the sanctuary. The old 1917 pulpit was remodeled to serve as a repository for the gift book and has been installed at the back of the sanctuary.

The Pastors/Leadership:

John Chester Ball began his duties as pastor of Park Presbyterian Church in December of 1900. He was installed on January 2, 1901. Rev. Ball announced his resignation on July 7, 1904, to accept the presidency of Keuka College. The congregation issued a call to the Rev. Carl W. Scovel on January 9, 1905. His installation

took place on March 15, 1905. He announced his resignation on September 19, 1912, to accept a call to the pastorate of the Frist Presbyterian Church of Corland, NY. The call of the Rev. Cyrus M. Creighton was confirmed at a congregational meeting on March 17, 1813. He was installed on April 24, 1913. Rev. Creighton died on October 12, 1926. During his thirteen years at Park, he officiated at 169 baptisms, conducted 314 funerals, and performed 132 weddings. Mr. Willis Richardson Sanderson was installed on February 18, 1927. Rev. Sanderson resigned on April 4, 1946. The Rev. Walter Roberston Hobkirk was installed on October 29, 1946. Rev. Hobkirk retired in October 1978. Rev. Timothy Charles Johnson was installed on September 16, 1979. Mildren L. Robinson was engaged as the Director of Youth at Park Presbyterian Church; this position was contractual with the Fairville Church at 30% of the Fairville pastor's time. She was ordained to the Presbyterian ministry on November 23, 1980, and began her work with the Newark church this same month.

The Members/Congregation:

By 1925, the church membership was approximately 600. Boy Scout Troop 138 was begun about 1925. It is believed to be the first troop organized in Wayne County. In 1930, an act of the General Assembly made it possible for women to become Ruling Elders. Mrs. Thomas E. Elliott and Mrs. Wilford T. Purchase are believed to be the first women elders in the Synod of New York and among the first in the nation. They were ordained on April 17, 1932.

The name of the church was officially changed to Park Presbyterian Church at a special congregational meeting held on March 14, 1955. The baby boom following World War II caused growth in the church school for several years, with enrollment reaching 538 and attendance averaging 230 in 1957 and 1958. In December of 1958, Session established the Memorial fund to which unrestricted gifts and legacies could be channeled. The Glenn R. Stevens Incentive Awards for graduating high school seniors were established in 1977. A new set of by-laws adopted in November of 1980 provided for a unicameral system of government, replacing the Session-Trustees system.

As Ecclesiastes says, *"To everything there is a season..."* As Robert Hoeltzel writes in this book... "as the church approaches its third century, let us remember that, 'others have labored, and you have entered into their labor.' The church continues to need the prayers and devoted service of all its people-clergy and laity alike." (99)

Rally Day

On Rally Day, the focus is on efforts to involve as much of the congregation as possible in Christian formation opportunities. For Park Presbyterian, this starts in small groups: Presbyterian Women, Deacons, Finance, Worship and Music, Christian Fellowship, Mission, and Christian Education are all small groups—most meet monthly. 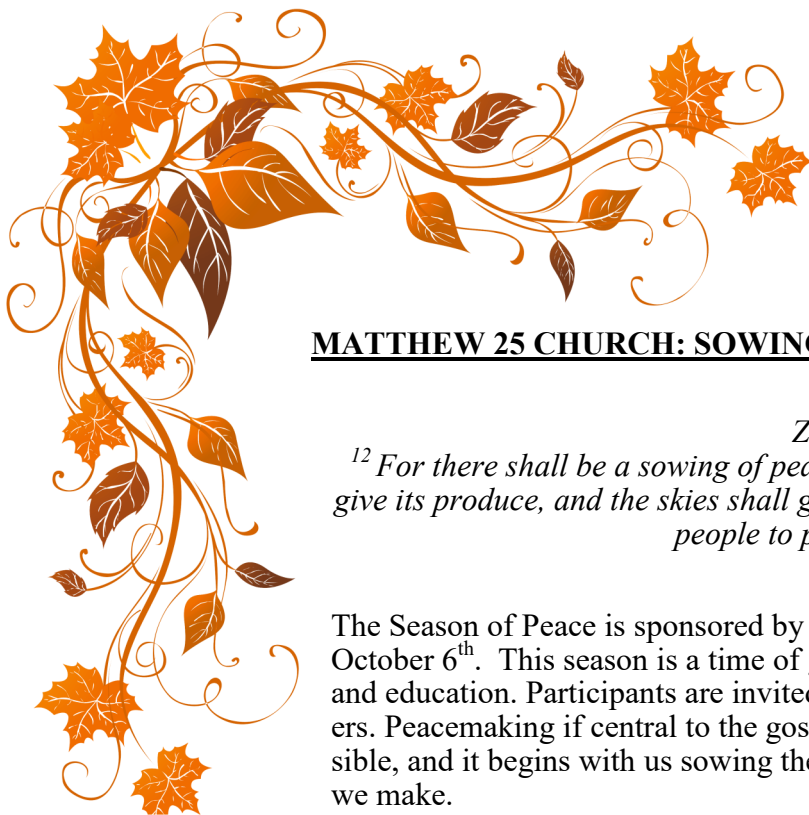


MISSION TEAM

MATTHEW 25 CHURCH: SOWING THE SEEDS OF PEACE

Zechariah 8:12

¹² For there shall be a sowing of peace; the vine shall yield its fruit, the ground shall give its produce, and the skies shall give their dew, and I will cause the remnant of this people to possess all these things.

The Season of Peace is sponsored by the PCUSA; it runs from September 8th through October 6th. This season is a time of growth, encouragement, challenge, inspiration, and education. Participants are invited to define and deepen their calling as peacemakers. Peacemaking is central to the gospel and the mission of the Church. Peace is possible, and it begins with us sowing the seeds of peace in every interaction and decision we make.

The season culminates with the Peace and Global Witness Offering, which is taken on Worldwide Communion Sunday, October 6, 2024. Through participation in the Peace and Global Witness Offering, our church is extending Christ's peace throughout our community and our world. We begin at the communion table, with our siblings in every time and place, and we celebrate the peace we find there and commit to building a more just and peaceful world. God is with us...and God in Christ is with us through the sacrament of Communion, celebrated on world Communion Sunday. We are not alone. Peace begins with each of us.

25% of the offering stays with local congregations, and 25% with mid councils to unit congregation to support peacemaking in their regions. 50% of this offering supports the work for peace and reconciliation being done by Presbyterians across the globe.

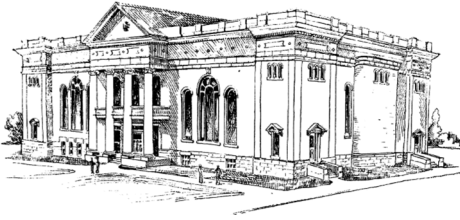
