March comes in like a Lion and goes out like a Lamb

Life is exciting here at St. Paul's. Bear with me for a minute. Do you all know the myth about the Phoenix? A bird that cyclically is born again. It rises from the ashes of it's predecessor. They burst into flames and a new one rises up. Also, did you know that the tears of the Phoenix had healing properties? Interesting.

I see a similarity here, don't you? Christ died and Christ rose from the dead and "by his stripes we are healed" (Isaiah 53:5) Christian faith is all about death and resurrection, out of death, comes new life. There is so much we can learn from this. Really, don't look at it as dying or death, but of recreating oneself. A metamorphosis, if you will. That is how I see things at St. Paul's.

Do you see the glass as half full or half empty? I usually see things half full, which I know can be aggravating to some, but that is how I fly. I find it much less stressful, to look at things positively, than to find the negative in everything. How do you look at that glass? I heard this on a podcast today, where a Professor told the class they were going to have a test, which went like this:

There is a piece of paper with a black dot in the center of the page. Describe what you see. The students did as he said, and after they turned in their papers, he read every single one. Each one described the dot, how far it was from the edges, how dark it was, etc. The Professor told them there was no grade for this test, but he wanted to point out that none in the class had described the white space surrounding the black dot. He went on to explain that this is how we as humans are, we see the dark things in our life and focus on those, instead of the white or positive things in our lives. Think about that.

Our front doors have been rebuilt and look absolutely wonderful and even better still, work! We shouldn't have to struggle with them anymore and worry about them not closing. More repair work will be starting as the weather makes it more conducive. And then we will be painted and looking fresher.

We have started a new program that was born (so to speak) out of the book we are reading -"Signs of Life" by Jay Sidebotham. On the Sunday's that Fr. Leon is here, grab your bulletin or whatever you have handy to write on, is there something in one of the Lessons read, or something in the sermon that makes you wonder, jot it down and after the service talk *Continued on Page 4*

About St. Paul's

The earliest record of Episcopal Church services in this vicinity was 1816 when St. Stephen's Church of Perryville was incorporated. At that time Chittenango was little more than a gathering of frame and log houses. From 1816-1832 rectors from St. Stephen's held missionary services in Chittenango.

Around 1849 a few gentlemen who greatly admired and revered the beautiful services of the Church, agreed to make an effort to have services occasionally held. By the spring of 1855 services began to be held regularly once a month in the Bethel. St. Paul's was officially organized as a parish on June 18, 1855. St. Paul's church was built in 1865 as a Gothic Revival-style structure. The lot, building, furniture and windows cost \$5000. The building was completed in less that six months. The first service was held in the church on Easter Day, April 1, 1866.

On May 12, 1866 the church was consecrated by Bishop Coxe. It was added to the U.S. National Historic Register of National Places in 1996.


